Dealing with existing collections of arctic wildlife, Mr. Clarke recalls that the Smithsonian Institute is supposed to have dispatched barrels of rum northwards years ago. The idea was that trappers would return pickled specimens, but the story is

that they drank the rum and returned well-prepared collections. He says there are only "five good basic collections for the whole of the Yukon territory." The Northwest Territories are better off, but virgin collecting areas exist on the arctic mainland of Canada, west of ·Hudson bay. Other large gaps exist,






