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Can't Have Boarders in South Trafalgar Homes; to Study Further

Did you know that taking boarders into Trafalgar homes could result in the police calling and asking you to quit breaking the law? If you didn't, you are in good company, as neither did Police Inspector Harry Wilson, nor Chairman Murray Inkster of the Oakville - Trafalgar - Bronte Planning Board, who lives on the Eighth Line North.

"There are a lot in Trafalgar breaking the law, then," commented Mr. Inkster at a board meeting recently, as he queried Dr. E. G. Faludi's revelation that though two boarders per home were allowed in North Trafalgar, from one concession north of the Dundas Highway, the same didn't apply south of the Dundas Highway.

"This is a bombshell," added Mr.

Inkster when he also learned that boarding houses and rooming houses were allowed in R3 areas in South Trafalgar.

The hour of revelation came with the consultant's report on how to control boarding houses in RA areas. His recommendations had been asked by Trafalgar Council.

Not only did the consultant recommend that South Trafalgar zoning regulations be altered, to allow two boarders to each single family dwelling, but he also asked that a boarding house and rooming house be defined in the by-law. He suggested that the rooming house would be so called when the proprietor occupied 10 per cent. of the space. If Trafalgar wanted to keep the much-abused landlords under stricter control, boarding and

rooming houses could be confined to commercial areas.

W. S. Thomson suggested that two boarders per private home be allowed, as was the case in Oakville.

"In the old days, when families were really of good size," said Mayor William Anderson, "the old folks took in boarders after their own children had gone on their way." Then he added philosophically, "What harm was done to anyone?"

Trafalgar Inspector Wilson said police had never been asked to urge owners of single family dwellings in South Trafalgar to invite their paying guests to vacate.

The joint planning board decided to recommend Dr. Faludi's proposals to the Trafalgar Planning Board and Township council.

W.M.S. members honored Miss Grace Wilford on this occasion when it was learned that the day of meeting was a birthday occasion.

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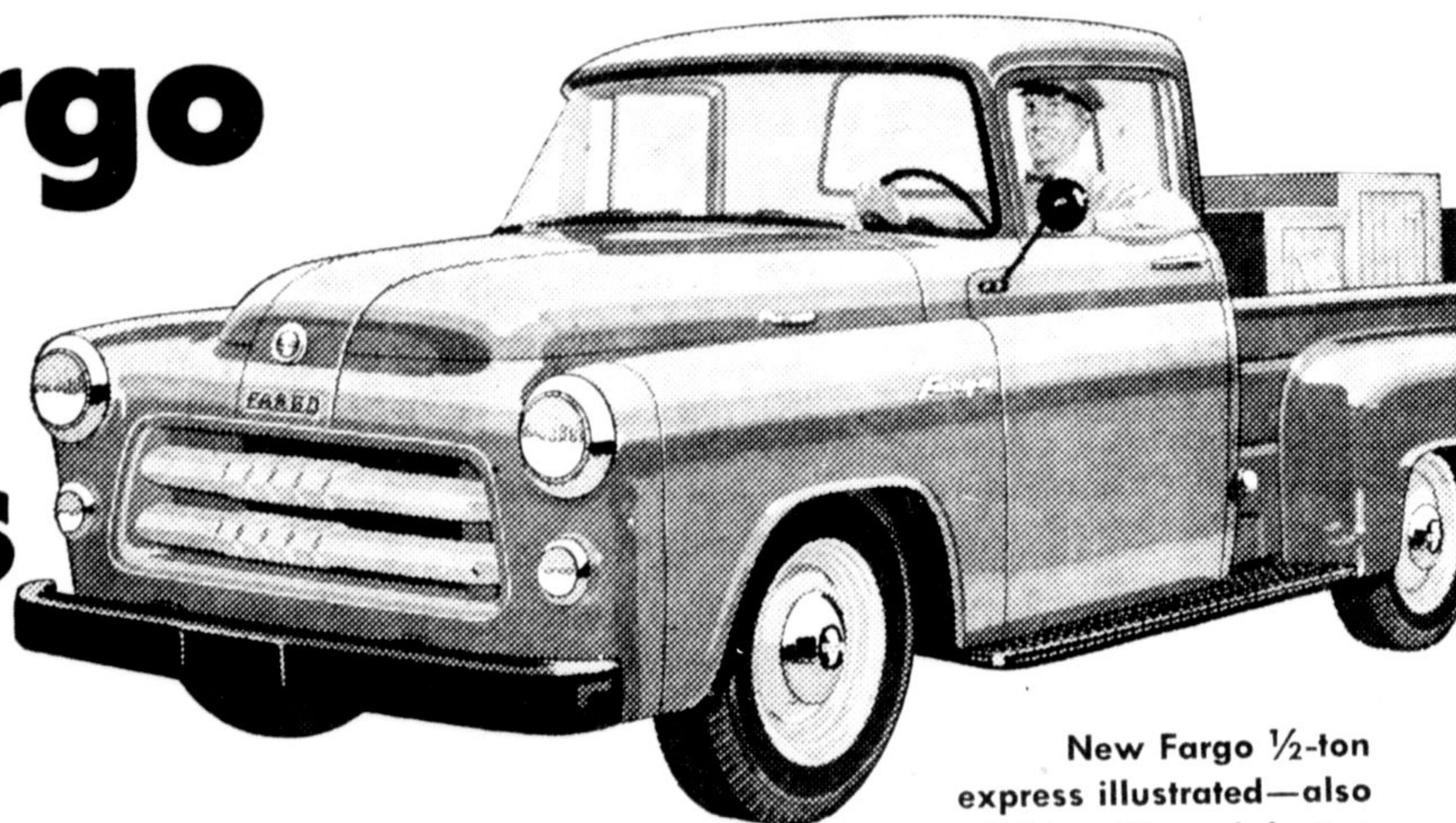
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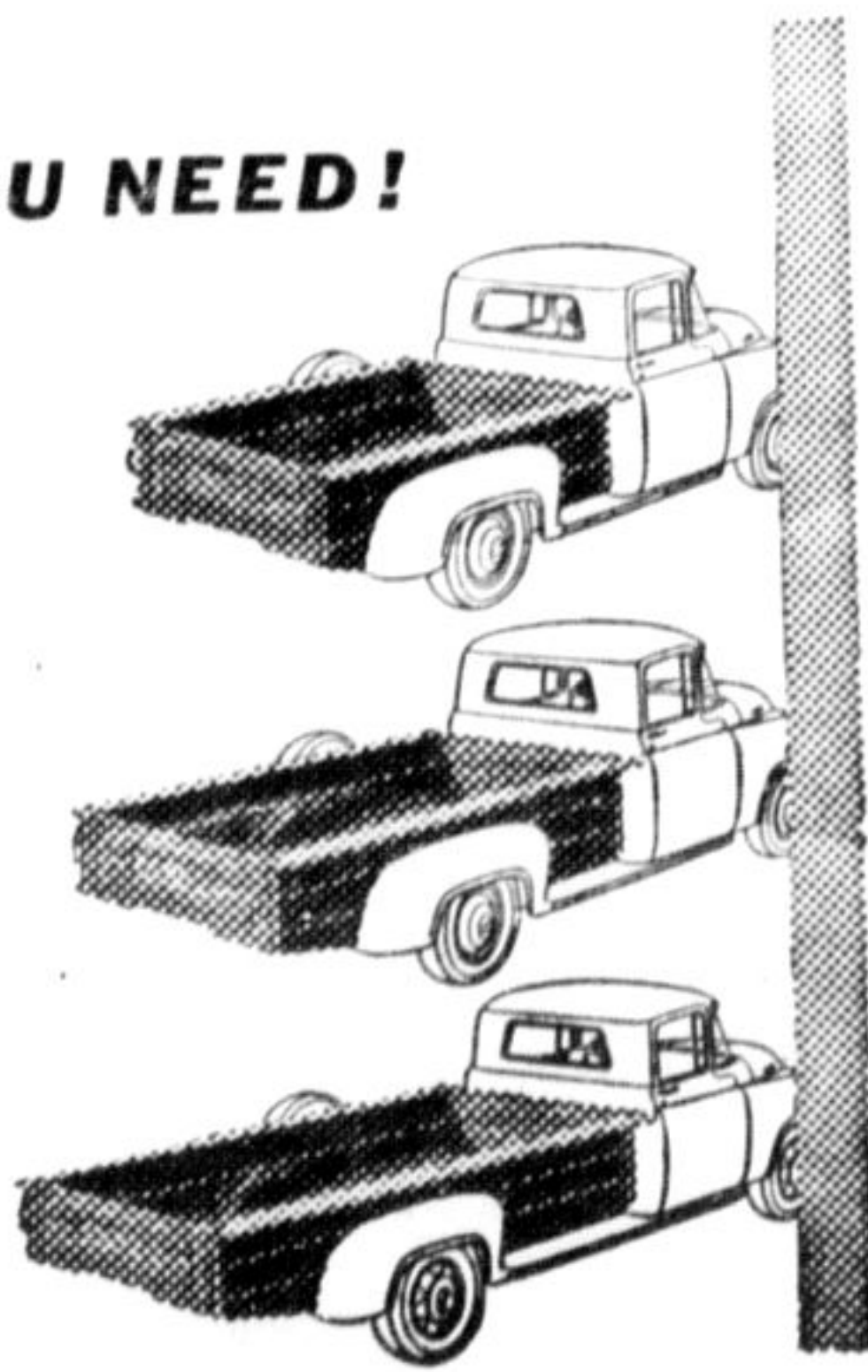


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
