

Price, Grade of First Concern To Shoppers, Halton Forums Say

"Does she put the price tag on?" or in other words, do women shoppers determine the price of farm products? This topic was introduced on National Farm Radio Forum February 11. Three women took part in the broadcast and many expressed approval of the efficient manner in which they expressed their ideas.

Further discussions followed in farm forum groups across the country. The majority of Halton forums thought improved methods of packaging, advertising, etc., would increase the sale of some products. We are more or less influenced by appearance but packaging does not necessarily increase quality. One group said these factors would not increase consumption of food.

Asked to list in order of importance the factors such as price, brand, built-in services such as pre-cooking, etc., which their members considered most important when purchasing food, all placed price and grade as first considerations. Only two groups were unanimous and they placed them this way — grade, price, brand, built-in services.

Two groups suggested convenient parking facilities were quite a consideration when shopping.
