Chiefs Trip Brampton 8-7 Credit Four-Goal Splurge

The Milton Pontiacs almost blew a three goal lead in the third period but managed to hang on and edged the Brampton Consumers 8-7 at the Milton Arena Friday night.

Although the Chiefs were outscored in the first period, they certainly were not outplayed. Colles in the Brampton net came up with some fantastic stops in the first 20 minutes.

The Consumers held a 3-2 lead at the end of the first and the second period ended with the score tied 5-5. The Chiefs rallied for three big goals in the final frame to run the count to 8-5, but Brampton struck for two quick goals in the last three minutes and had the Chiefs on the run as the bell sounded.

Stocky Gord Haddleton was the Chiefs' hero. His four goals paved the way for the Milton victory. Evans, Vaughan, Crawford and Stephenson scored the other Milton goals. For Brampton, Johnny Petro and Woods each shot a brace with Moe Galand, Don Contin and Howie Cox picking up singletons.

The Chiefs had goalie Freddy Lever between the pipes for the first time this season and despite the long lay-off, Lever turned in a fine effort after a shaky first period. Cracker Evans, used sparingly by the Chiefs, opened the scoring, batting home Blackie Clements' rebound at 5:30. Johnny Petro teamed with Contin and Woods to knot the count at 10:26. Haddleton started his rampage at 11:11, tipping in a relay from Joe McCann. The lead was short-lived, however, as Contin scored from a scramble in front of the Chiefs' net. Petro ran the count to 3-2 as he was left uncovered in front of Lever at 16:48, his tally coming with the teams short-handed.

Haddleton finished off a neat three-way passing play at 9:39 of the second period to tie the score, only to have Howie Cox come back four minutes later, scoring on a low whistler from the blue-line, with Haddleton in the sin-bin at the time. Big Hank Stephenson made it 4-4 as he broke from a prolonged scoring slump.

Woods beat Lever cleanly after a rink length dash for a loose puck which appeared to be offside. Haddleton completed his hat trick with five seconds left in the middle session, fooling Colles with a low drive at 19:55.

In the third period, it was all Milton as they ran up a three goal lead with four minutes remaining in the game. Woods picked up his second goal for Brampton to close the gap at 17:06 and Frank Stephenson pulled the "boner" of the game, scoring in his own net at 18:45. Brampton coach Greg Currie pulled the goalie but the Chiefs hung on to salvage the win.

Ice Chips: Some four hundred fans sat in on the fast moving tilt. Of the 20 penalties dished out by referees Hamilton and Barringham, the Chiefs drew 12 of them. Foxy Scatallone, Milton captain, was given a match penalty and removed from the game. The penalty carries an automatic three-game suspension. Scatallone upset referee Bev Hamilton in the third period after protesting a two minute hooking penalty. Lever rose to great heights in the middle period, coming up with some spectacular saves. Brampton were without Buddy Horne and Bobby Paul. Joe "Red Beard" McCann and Johnny Botter played steady games on defense for the Chiefs.

The line of Haddleton, Vaughan and Stephenson were dangerous every time out. Contin, Petro, Woods and Cox carried most of the attack for the losers. The Chiefs wind up the schedule against Georgetown Raiders Friday, February 22. Game time, 9 p.m.
