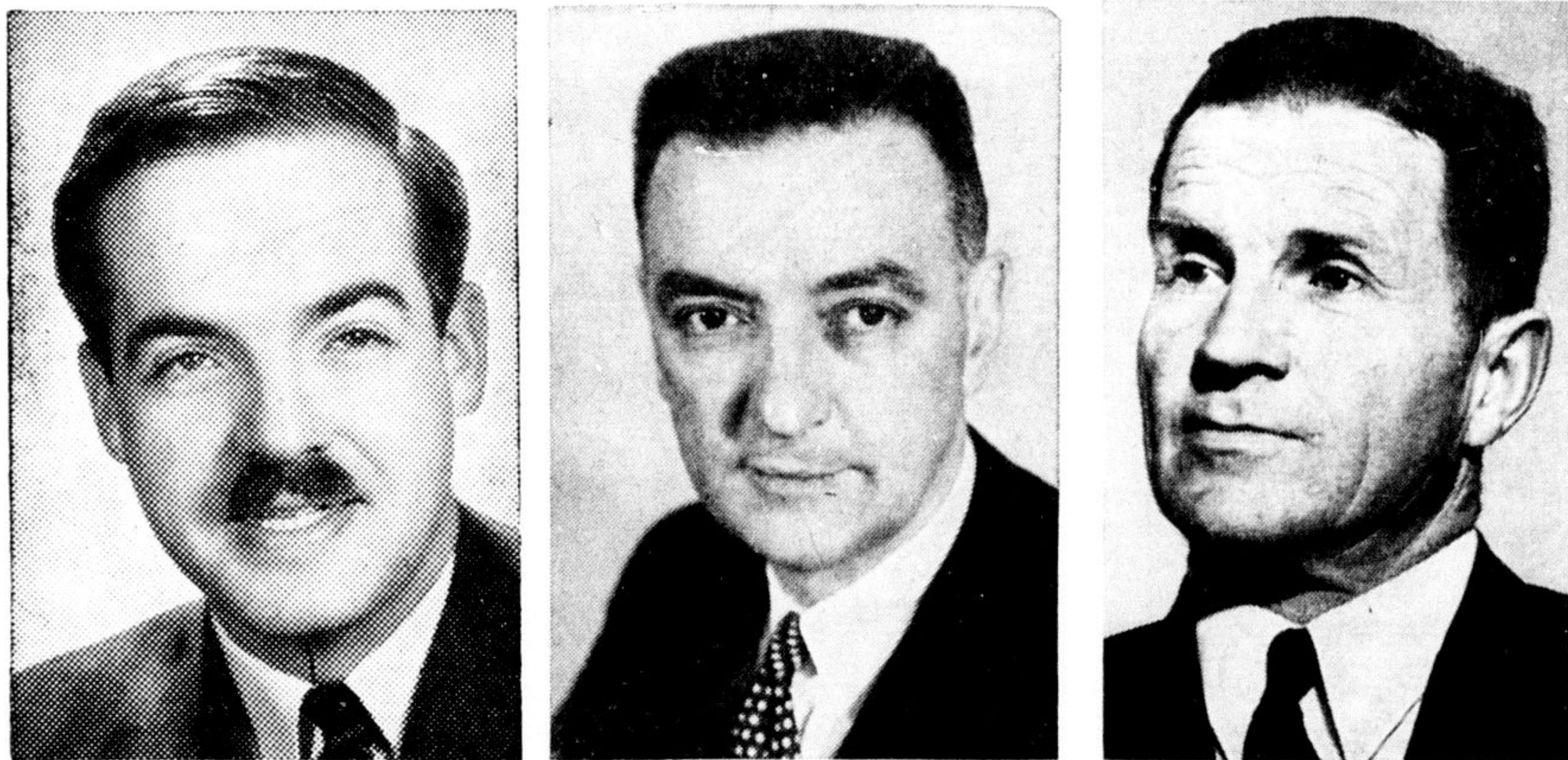
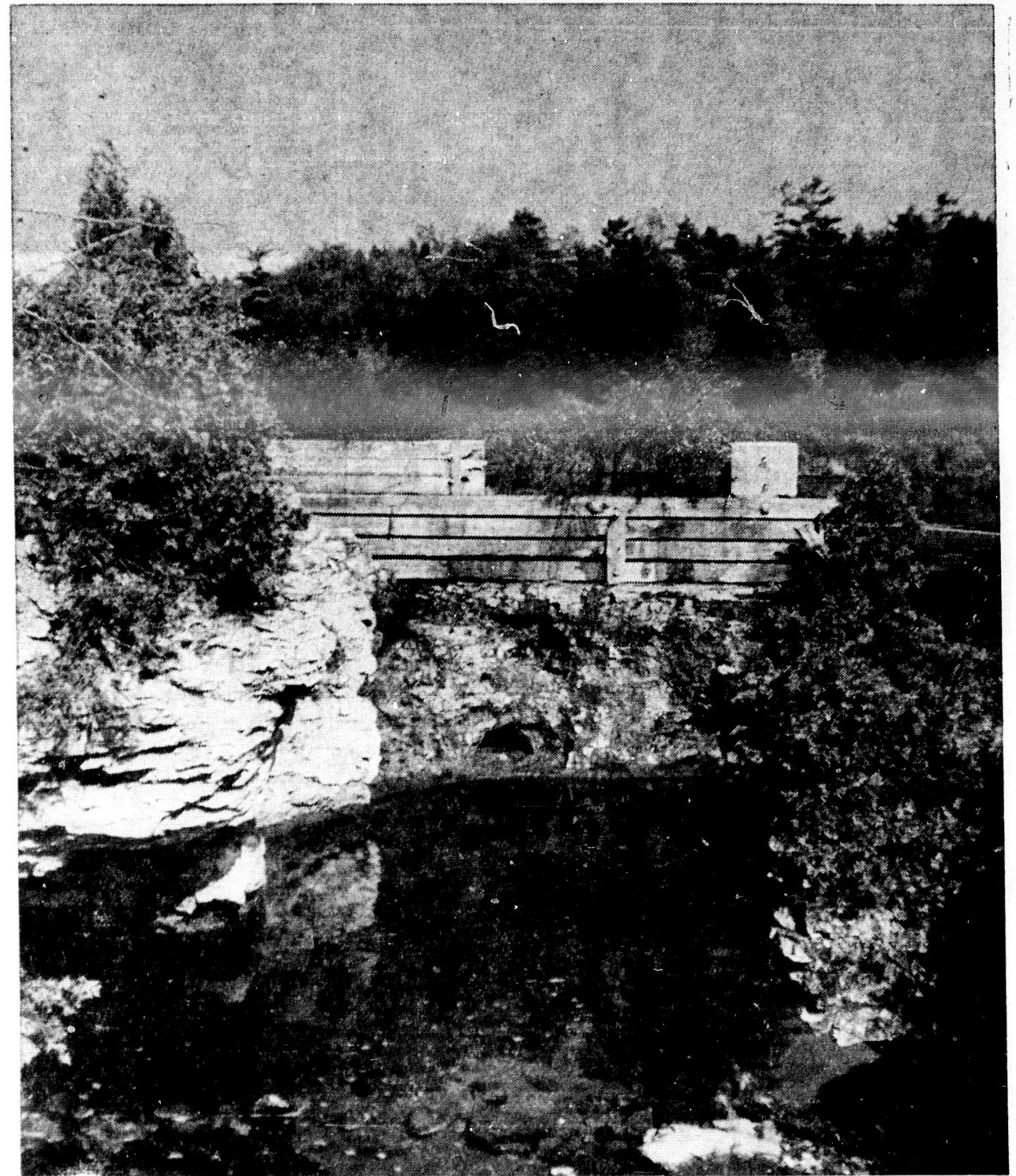

### Forestry Experts Taught at Dorset

DORSET, Ont. (CP) — Ontario's forest ranger school, a unique "university of the bush", has opened for the 1957 term with another 60 students enrolled.

The school, started in 1943 on the shore of St. Nora Lake near this town 100 miles north of Toronto, has given more than 600 men training in all angles of life and work in the woods.

Its six buildings include a large classroom building and a dormitory complete with lounge, showers and washrooms.

Students must be over 19 with a grade 10 education. They include personnel of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, workers in the province's forest industries and forestry students at the University of Toronto.

Surrounding the school is the university's 18,000 acre private forest. Courses include English composition, mathematics, forest protection, fire fighting, timber cruising, surveying, drafting, compass instruction, safety work, identification of soils, aquatic plants, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals, water pollution and study of environmental factors such as climate, vegetation, geology and physiography.

Even research is carried on at the school.

Among the graduates is Paul Johnson, a young cook who developed at the school a method of pre-cooking and freezing complete meals for forest fire fighters.

He went on to supervise the dropping of meals and even cook stoves to fire fighters from department of lands and forests aircraft.

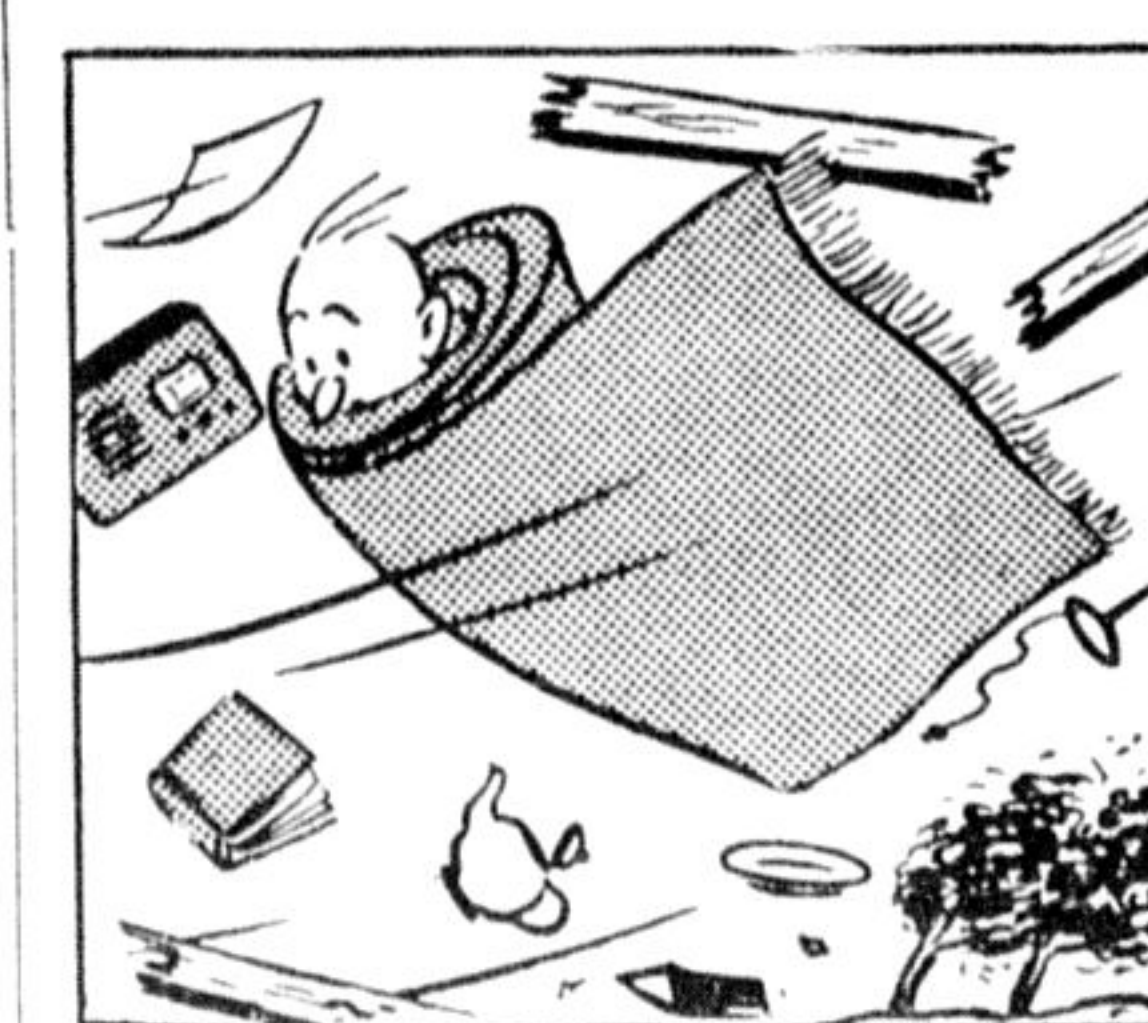

Do not leave ordering your fertilizer too late. Deliveries have been slow to date with all fertilizer manufacturers. If seeding arrives suddenly, they will not be able to give the service and delays in deliveries can be expected. All fertilizer manufacturers will replace any fertilizer which sets hard. Ammonium Nitrate 33 per cent. is cheaper this year than it has been in the past. For that extra growth in your hay and pasture, an application of 100 lbs. per acre will more than compensate for your costs in developing hay and pasture fields besides the extra tonnage available and the potability of the hay and forage.

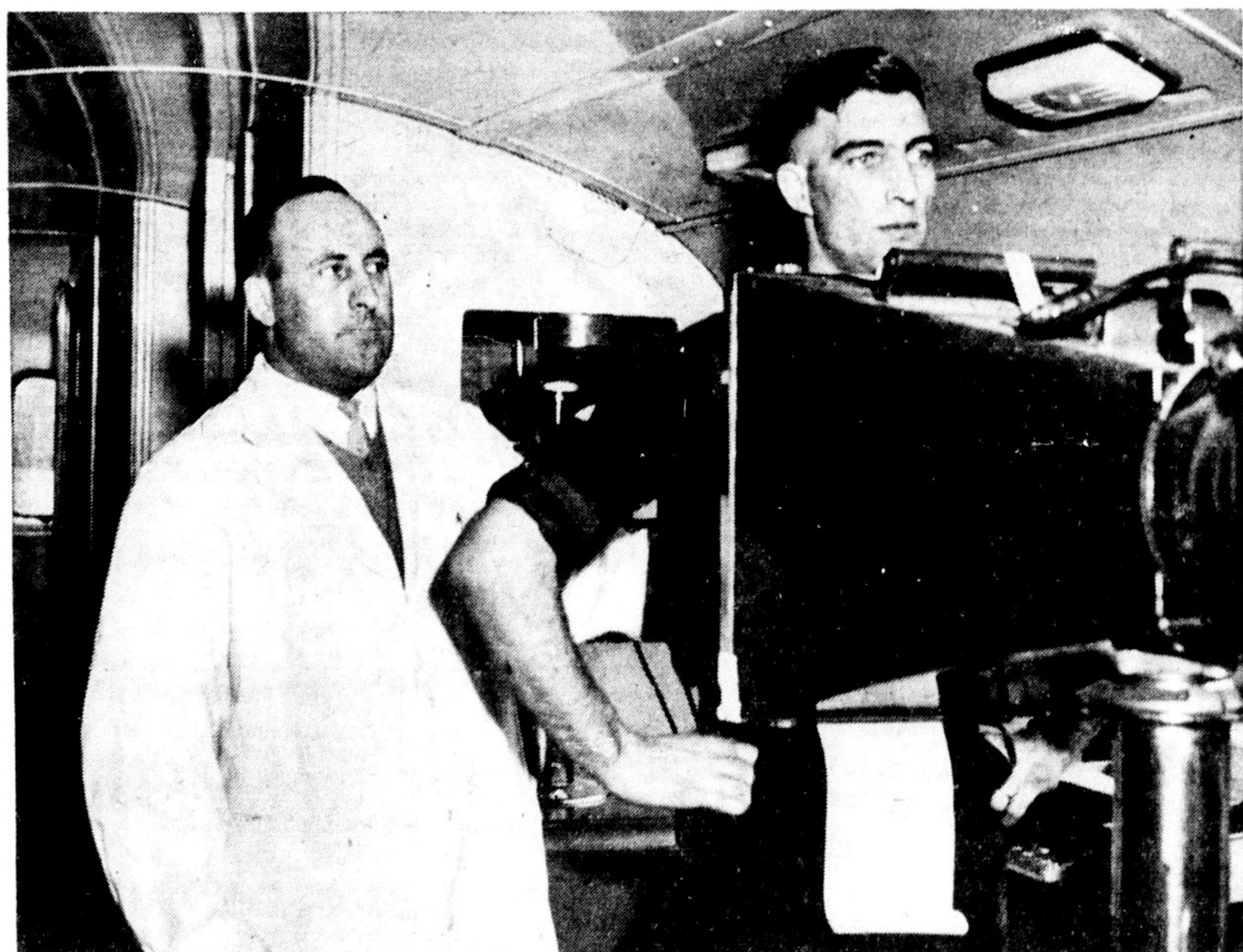
