Plan for Civil Defense Organization on Front

Establishment of a Civil Defence Organization for the Trafalgar-Oakville-Bronte area is now under way. The first step has been accomplished and that is the appointment of a co-ordinator, provision of accommodation and the setting up of a headquarters from which it is possible to direct and supervise the planning and training of personnel necessary to make possible a workable organization to carry out the policy of the Civil Defence authorities, as applicable to the Trafalgar-Oakville-Bronte area.

The co-ordinator appointed to direct and supervise Civil Defence is Brigadier C. E. R. Smith, C.B.E., C.D., recently retired from the Canadian Army, who lives in Oakville. Headquarters is in the Chase building, Oakville.

Board Rejects Shopping Strip

ACTON — Development of the proposed shopping area strip, adjoining the Glenora subdivision, posed a problem for members of Acton Planning Board last week. Mr. Hyde, representing the owner of the property, presented a plan to allow a Tasty Freeze, Shell Service Station and a Brewers Warehouse on the site. He noted the present financial encumbrances on the property could not be cleared until the amount of land had been sold. Presented earlier with a similar plan, members of the board had ruled against including a service station in the area set aside for a shopping centre.

The possibility of a service road parallel to No. 7 highway, with access at Meadowvale Road and Churchhill Road was reviewed and rejected.

Other possibilities on development of the site were considered but the board maintained its original decision not to allow a service station in that area.

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There Is Only One Way To Get Your Money's Worth

JUST AS ACCURATELY as a clock tells the time, the newspapers of Canada reflect public opinion. What they are saying about election issues makes sense to most people.

Here is what the St. Catharines Standard says: "How long must Canadians be held down by over-taxation? How long will Ottawa continue amassing hundreds of millions of dollars in surpluses while the provinces and municipalities go begging, while there is no money for the essential growth of municipalities?"

The Calgary Herald is no less critical of mismanagement at federal level. It says, "The Liberal Government is guilty of sloppy stewardship of the country's treasury. Total value of all goods and services produced in Canada this year is estimated at 31 billion dollars. The Dominion Government will siphon away more than five billion dollars of this for its operations. This is more than \$300 for every man, woman and child in the country. Are we getting our money's worth?"

The rising tide of resentment and anger is mirrored by what the Toronto Globe and Mail has to say. "... The Liberals offer no change whatsoever. Put us back, they say in effect, and everything will go along just as it has been going. They make no promise to do this or that because (they say) there is nothing that needs to be done. ... The Conservatives disagree. They think changes are necessary and have promised to make them."

Do you think everything has been done in Halton that needs to be done? Do you want to go on paying increasingly higher property taxes because our villages and towns are forced to borrow money at high interest rates? The Liberal Government evidently is not concerned about our plight. It gives comparatively little to the provinces and municipalities but insists on amassing annual half-billion-dollar surpluses for its own use.

The Progressive Conservatives promise a thorough re-examination of Canada's tax structure with a view to reducing taxation. Asked how this could be accomplished, John Diefenbaker said half of that 500-million-dollar surplus would be used to bring down taxes, the other half to increase Old Age Pensions.

Will you vote for the Liberals who do nothing to help us, or will you vote for the Progressive Conservatives and be sure of immediate assistance? The answer is obvious.

Fire Chief Reports On Painting Tips

If your spring clean-up plans call for painting, fire chief A. E. Clement has three fire safety suggestions especially for you:

1. Non-flammable solvents for paint removing, brush cleaning and thinning are safest, of course, but if you must use flammable solvents, remember to work with them out of doors or in well ventilated rooms indoors.
2. Take extra care in storing your paint materials. Use only well ventilated places away from furnaces

and also away from exits or under stairways (so you will not be blocked from escaping should these highly combustible materials catch fire).

3. Throw away old paint containers or those holding only small amounts of paint—always use metal containers for paints and solvents as glass jars and bottles have a long, tragic record of cracking or breaking too near some ignition source.

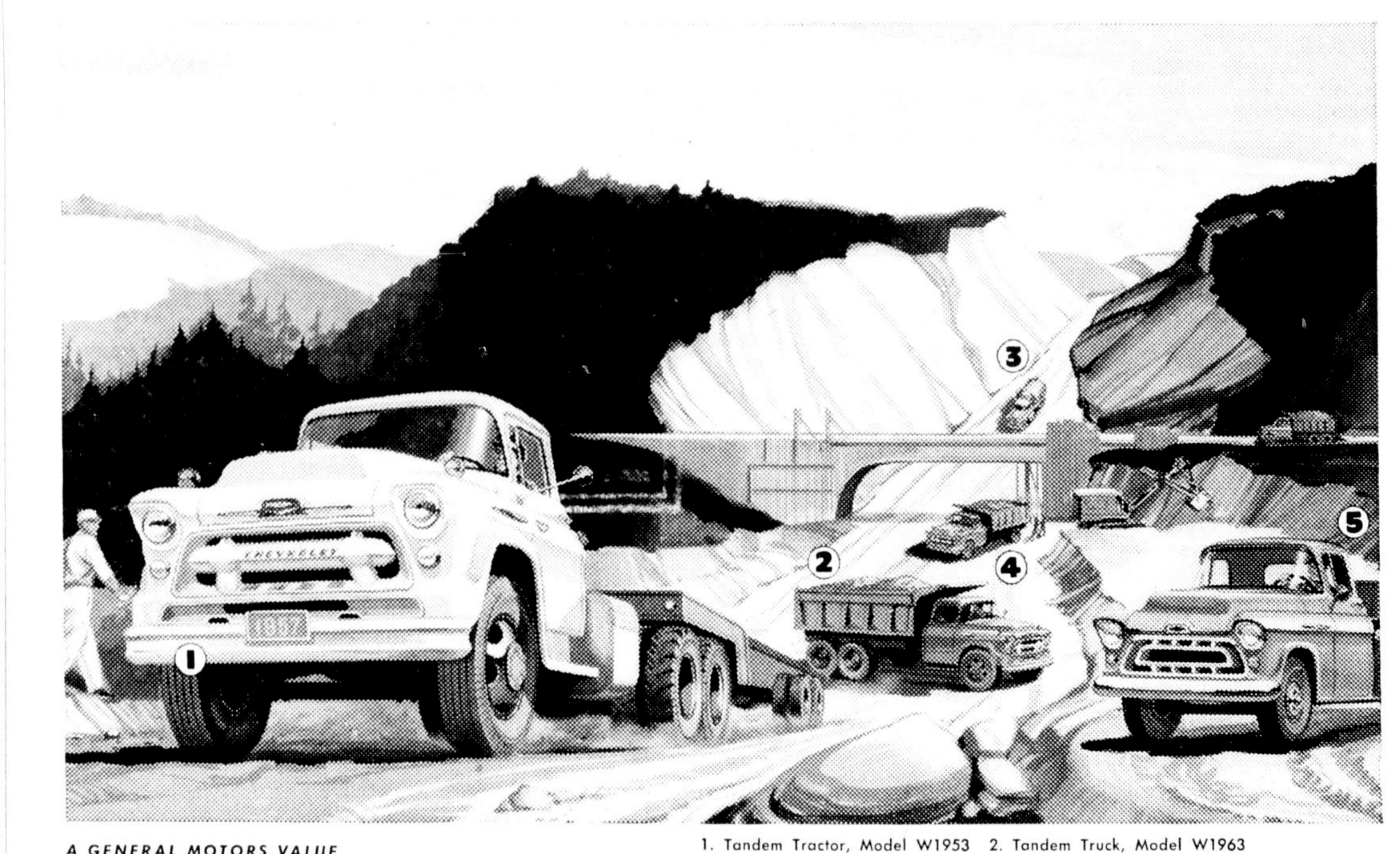
4. Your safest practice with paint or solvent-soiled rags is to completely dispose of them outside of the house, but if you must store paint rags, use a metal container with a tight cover.

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
