Require Certificate
An addition to the by-law approved by the Board is the requirement of a certificate of occupancy that would be granted only when the town was satisfied all the necessary services had been connected to their destination.

The consultant also outlined the necessary procedure in making application for a change in the already-approved land use map and the requirement of a Municipal Board hearing to allow such a change.

Questioned on annexation for the town, the planning consultant pointed out he could make no recommendations until a final water report was received.

Formation of a Safety Council appears next on the list of safety projects, Constable Rupert announced this week following establishment of the first safety patrols.

Service clubs and citizens have been invited to attend a meeting on June 13 in the town hall to proceed with this project that would include supervision of the present safety programs. The council would also investigate hazards and recommend improvements.

Representatives of the Ontario Safety League will be attending the meeting, Constable Rupert explained.

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CARS are my *Line*

It's not really so long since such automobile improvements as the automatic convertible top, or colored cars, or even the self-starter, seemed like impossible concoctions from engineering dreamers.

Who is to say, then, that the television seeing eye that will stop a car before a crash, or swerve it out of harm's way, will not soon be with us? One model has actually been perfected and is working.

The device uses a receiving picture tube that is sensitive to infra-red rays, which the human eye can't see. They bounce right through darkness and fog.

When the picture tube picks up the warning image of another vehicle it sends the image to another picture tube inside the car. A light flickers to tell the driver it's time to glance over at his "safety television".

Who knows, maybe this will be optional equipment in a few years. If it is, I know we'll be among the first to carry it. The whole approach to the optional equipment business has changed in the past few years. Not so long ago the manufacturers used to warn their customers not to clutter up their cars with "extras".

Now there are many "extras" that I think are essential. Like side-vision mirrors—I'd be lost in a car without them. We carry several varieties suitable for every car.


