Drop Arena Manager To Conserve Money
BRAMPTON—Chiff Sutton, recreational director for Brampton, has been relieved of his extra duties as manager of Brampton Memorial Arena. It was announced in town council last week. His assistant, Clarence Riesberry, is currently acting as manager until a permanent arrangement is made.

Councillor R. E. "Russ" Prouse, chairman of the arena board, in making the announcement, stated that he wanted the reasons for the dismissal clearly understood.

"The arena has been losing money for some time now," said Mr. Prouse, "and Mr. Sutton's dismissal is part of a scheme to put the arena back on a paying basis without charging the ratepayer, who built it, more money for its use."

"Chiff had had enough work to do as recreational director during the year without having to worry about the arena too. He has done a fine job, and I don't want anyone to think that this dismissal is casting aspersions on his abilities. A man can only do so much," he added.

In an interview with The Conservator on Tuesday, Mr. Sutton concurred with the board ruling completely. "I understand and appreciate the board's position as I am rather relieved at this decision," he said.

"For a number of months I have been attempting to serve two boards, the recreation and the arena, and every move I made had to be carefully thought out in order that I didn't offend either party. With this decision I will be able to devote all my time to the recreation commission which should be to their greater advantage," he concluded.

"The tentative plan of the arena board is to employ a full-time manager during the winter month and possibly close the arena, or at least limit its activities, during the summer months."
