Inspector A. Witts at Rotary Urges More Driver Education

It isn't an automobile that knocks someone down, it's the driver that does it with an automobile, Inspector Alberts Witts of the Ontario Provincial Police stressed when he addressed members of the Rotary Club of Milton on Tuesday.

The speaker noted accident prevention started with the man behind the wheel. Antagonism built up in earlier years between police and drivers had to be broken down to assist in making driving safe. There has to be a balance between law enforcement and citizens to keep either one from becoming overpowering.

Inspector Witts commented that while motorists were piling up carnage on the highway, they turned to teenagers and presented them with the blame. "It took a lot of fact finding to find these were our children and we had had them all their lives. What they had learned of driving had been learned from us," the speaker noted.

He noted that a child's driving experience begins when, as a baby, he's put in the back seat of the car. Whatever driving experience is gained is gained at the hands of the parents.

\$50,000 Loss In Barn Blaze

A fire causing \$50,000 damage razed a barn owned by Jack and Bill Featherstone of the sixth concession of Trafalgar township Saturday evening.

Flames spread so quickly that a Jersey calf, a year's harvest of straw, hay and grain were lost in the uncontrollable blaze. A greater animal loss was prevented when 100 head of prize Jerseys were turned into an adjoining field.

Men were blowing straw through a cutting box and into the barn when the blaze broke out in the straw loft. Firemen believe that a spark from the machine set off the blaze.

The barn had recently been renovated and new equipment added.

Trafalgar firemen, who were called to the scene to prevent the flames from spreading, called in the Milton brigade to stand by with water.

Trafalgar fire department representatives said they thought sparks from a machine working beside the barn ignited straw in the loft.

Milton Council Monday instructed the industrial committee to begin immediate investigation and preparation of preliminary material for a brochure on Milton.

The action followed receipt of a telegram from the Department of Planning and Development that their supply was exhausted and a subsequent phone call for further information.

The committee chairman, Councillor Pettit, noted many inquiries for similar material and council instructed the committee to investigate costs and prepare the necessary information.

The Main Street will be a little more comfortable, too, following Councillor Pettit's appeal for several benches "to make the town look more friendly" as well as providing comfort for citizens. Mayor Ledwith suggested his firm would provide one bench and Councillor Desjardine volunteered a second bench.

Location of the benches was not established but it was suggested there were several good locations available. Use of these first two benches will determine whether others are added, it was suggested.

Councillor Reid noted two complaints of smoke from the site of the sewage treatment plant where cardboard is burned. After discussion of which way the smoke might blow and its proximity to houses, the town foreman was to be asked to seek a new site for the burning.

Councillor Reid also reported the fire chief had no authority to do anything about smoke unless there was a hazard in the burning being too close to buildings. This followed complaints tabled last week about excessive smoke in some areas from bonfires.

A requisition from the Milton Public School Board for \$14,202.90, was approved following the Board's receipt of the first progress certificate on the W. I. Dick school.

An application for water from W. Shields resulted in a motion to consider applications along the pipe line route if the owner had held land more than 10 years. Water service was granted to Mr. Shields in a subsequent resolution.

Immediately following this action, a resolution was tabled by the chairman of the water committee lifting the lawn watering restrictions on Saturday and Sunday.

Third reading was given the by-law covering the sewage plant addition following assurance it conformed with the requests of the O.M.B. and O.M.I.C.

Mrs. Mule questioned council on whether a \$300 permit would be required to build a house on a property where an earlier building had been destroyed by fire and removed. The matter was to be discussed with the town solicitor.

Jack Zanatta applied for permission to erect a dwelling on the back of his Bronte St. lot that is 66 feet wide and 450 feet deep. He assured council he would make arrangements for a private road to the building and was retaining the two dwellings.

The need for a road along the C.N.R. tracks, which forms the rear boundary of the lot, the ownership of the two dwellings, and present building restrictions were reviewed.

Councillor Reid noted an old building by-law had allowed for only one house on one lot but the newer by-law did not contain that provision.

The requirements of the new zoning by-law were discussed but Councillor Pettit noted it had not been finally approved yet and therefore did not apply.

Members suggested a building permit be obtained and construction proceeded with.

The foreman was instructed to remove branches from a tree on Court St. north and a tree on Commercial St. Mrs. A. Brush was granted a weekly increase of \$5 effective August 1. Councillor Child noted the midgets would be wrestling in the arena August 31. Councillor Charlton asked that additional speed limit signs be erected on the newly paved Bronte St.

A by-law was to be prepared covering the costs of bridge construction and site development of the new W. I. Dick school for capitalization and it was expected a formal requisition would be received from the School Board detailing the costs for application to the Ontario Municipal Board.

A complaint was to be registered with the District Inspector of the O.P.P. that the town was paying for five constables, the fifth being provided to cover holiday periods, and presently only had a three man force.

Council filed the proposal of the Bell Telephone Co. for increased rates.

It is rumored that the Ontario Department of Highways has advertised for tenders for the construction of an overpass over the Canadian National Railway tracks north of the Base Line, where Highway 401 is to cross it.

Reveal Telephone Rates Increased Through Area

Increases of 25 cents per month for two-party residence telephone service in Milton and Campbellville and of 40 cents for one-party residence lines, are proposed in Bell Telephone's application for revised rates filed in Ottawa with the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada, according to D. R. Oliver, the company's manager here.

The proposed increase for one-party flat rate business service is 90c monthly and for two-party business service it is 50c monthly.

Area Holstein Breeders Send Calves to Peru

Three Milton area Holstein breeders contributed pure-breds to a large shipment of Canadian cattle which has just left Oakville for Peru. The shipment, totalling 92 head, included calf heifers from the Ralph I. Ford, G. Leslie Peer and Son, and H. C. Reid farms, all of Milton.

The cattle were chosen by a representative of a Peruvian bank, and will be distributed to select farmers in Peru with the object of improving their present herds by the addition of these foundation animals.
