



Henceforth bulls which have an 2.3 lbs. per day will qualify for a premium of up to \$200 (one-third) of the purchase price). Bulls meeting approved type standards only will be eligible for a premium of 20 per cent. or a maximum of \$120 at the Ontario Bull Sale or \$60 at a local Club sale. Premiums for boars of approved type and out of Advanced Registry qualified dams will be on a sliding scale of \$25 to \$35, depending on the A.R. score of the dam.
