Pontiacs Down Bradford 3-1

Tuesday night the Milton Pontiac Chiefs travelled to Bradford to play the Bradford "Brads" fords' and after spotting them a 1-0 lead, came back to win 3-1.

The only goal the fords were able to get came in the first period when the puck accidentally deflected off defenceman Walt Wilson's stick and into his own net behind surprised goalie Don Rose.

Walt came back minutes later to even things up at one apiece with a screen shot from the blueline that turned the upper left-hand corner. Pollock tallied the second Pontiac marker, giving Milton a 2-1 lead going into the second period.

There was no scoring in the second and Pollock broke through with the clincher midway through the third period.

OBITUARY "Kelly" McEachern In Garage 25 Years

After operating a service station in Milton for nearly 25 years, John Leslie McEachern died suddenly at his residence, Bronte Street, Milton, on Friday, December 27, "Kelly", as he was known to everyone, was in his 58th year.

Born in Erin, Ontario, Mr. McEachern came to Milton shortly after and first worked at a brick plant. In March of 1933 he opened his gasoline station at the corner of Bronte and Main Streets. Surviving are his wife Rhea and one daughter, Mrs. Larry Tyrer (Wilma) of Hamilton, and grandchildren Carol and Brent Tyrer. Brothers Claude and George of Milton and Clarence of Toronto, and sister Mrs. Stan Fay (Mary) of Milton also survive. Two brothers, Archie of Toronto and Neil of Milton, predeceased him.

23 at Yule Party for Halton Manor Staff

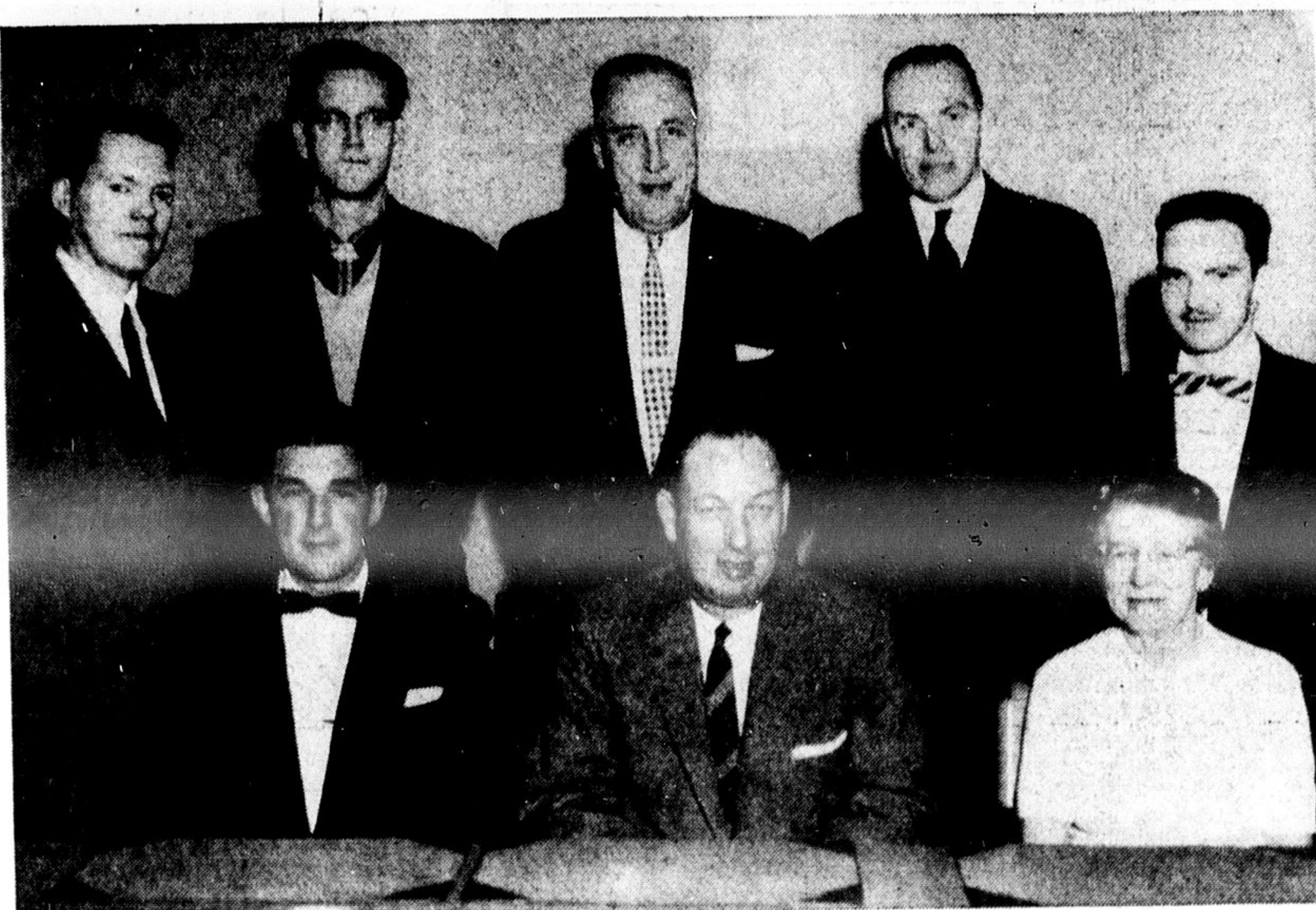

Local Mothers to Take Part In "March of Dimes" Canvass

Milton is in need of a total of 125 Marching Mothers to take part in the "Mothers' March" on January 29th. Money collected will be used in the rehabilitation program for handicapped persons.

Chief Marching Mother for the one-hour "blitz" is Mrs. Mary S. Pettit. A committee to organize the March is under the direction of Mrs. Pettit, and is composed of Mrs. Audrey Brush, Mrs. Marg. Bailey and Mrs. Barbara Durnan. The campaign is sponsored locally by the Kinette Club. The Milton Mothers' March will be one of more than 100 held throughout the province. As the hour of seven o'clock approaches, it is estimated that over 100,000 mothers will be pinning on their lapel badges, picking up their receipt books, and starting out to call on from 10 to 15 of their neighbors. Farthest east point will be Alexandria, close to the Quebec border on the west, Rainy River and Fort Frances; farthest north will be Kapuskasing and Sioux Lookout.

Mrs. Pettit, Chief Marching Mother, says: "I was astounded when I learned how complicated the process of rehabilitation can be, and how effective it can be in making people active. When doctors provide their skills to help these people, with no remuneration whatever, then the rest of us

can pitch in once a year and make sure there's enough money raised to pay for the appliances to follow up the surgeon's skill."

Mrs. Pettit emphasized that everything has been planned to take the work out of raising funds. "Our March is so organized that we keep a good element of 'fun' in fund-raising. For instance, we have kept the captain's districts as small as possible; and each Marching Mother is only asked to do from 10 to 15 homes, so she can complete her calls on the 29th and be back home again in one hour or less."

Mayor Lockhart himself experienced difficulty in growing accustomed to his large new chain of office which hung around his neck and banged heavily on the table each time he sat down. The chain, incidentally, was one borrowed from the Stoney Creek Chamber of Commerce because Burlington's chain was not ready in time for the meeting.

Mayor Jackson, at his humorous best, explained to Mayor Lockhart that Hamilton council had considered presenting the chain of office but the Burlington Chamber had got in ahead of them. So the city council had decided to have a Mayor's chair made for Mr. Lockhart on the morning of the Burlington meeting and so it was not yet ready. "I could have brought a token of it like a stool or something..." the dignitary quipped.

Warden Millward, in expressing congratulations of the County to the new council, quipped "I hope you don't get any ideas about breaking away from this fine county of Halton."

The first motion passed by the new municipal council of Canada's largest town was a motion to thank Rev. Mansfield for conducting the devotional service.
