

RIGHT AROUND HOME

Regardless of the occasion, any night is a wonderful time to have a party. Enjoy yourself and still be able to serve a substantial late-night supper. When excitement is high, appetites will be stimulated, too.

Your guests will all agree that this "Party Night Casserole" is a hearty and satisfying dish. Combine diced cooked turkey or chicken with spaghetti in tomato sauce and top with grated cheese. It is a dish so good everyone will think you spent hours preparing it. Yet, most of the ingredients are ready and waiting on your pantry shelf.

If you wish, combine the ingredients early in the day and refrigerate it until it is time to bake.

PARTY NIGHT CASSEROLE
2 cups diced cooked turkey or chicken
2 cans (15 oz. size) spaghetti in tomato sauce with cheese
2 tablespoons finely chopped pimiento
1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
One-eighth teaspoon garlic salt
Dash of cayenne pepper
1/2 cup grated sharp cheese

Lightly combine turkey or chicken with all other ingredients except cheese. Spoon mixture into a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 20 minutes; then sprinkle with cheese and bake 10 minutes longer. (If refrigerated before baking increase cooking time to 45 minutes.) Makes 6 servings.

PARTY NIGHT CASSEROLE

While we're on the subject of casseroles, here are two others you might like to try:

SAUSAGE & RICE CASSEROLE
1 cup raw rice
2 tablespoons chopped onion
2 tablespoons diced celery
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 1/2 cups canned tomatoes
2 4-oz. tins sausage
One-third cup bread crumbs
1/4 cup grated cheese

Cook the rice in boiling salted water to which 1 tablespoon of vinegar has been added. When tender, rinse the rice with cold water and drain thoroughly. Combine the cooked rice, onion, celery, salt, pepper and tomatoes and place in a casserole dish. Arrange the sausage on the rice and tomato mixture. Sprinkle the crumbs and grated cheese over the top. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 25 minutes. Serves 6.

HOT WIENER & POTATO SALAD CASSEROLE
4 wieners
4 cups thinly sliced cooked potatoes
1 1/2 teaspoons salt

One-eighth teaspoon pepper
One-third cup salad oil
3 tablespoons vinegar
1 1/2 cups cooked green beans
1/4 cup thinly sliced onion

Simmer wieners for 8 minutes. Drain. Combine next 5 ingredients. Drain green beans. Arrange in bottom of greased 1 1/2 quart covered casserole. Over them arrange potato salad in alternate layers with onions and sliced wieners. Cover and bake. Cook at 400 degrees F. for 35-40 minutes. Serves 4.

When washing a duster, place 1 teaspoon of raw linseed oil or 2 tablespoons of kerosene in the last rinse water and hang it up to dry. The result: a "dustless duster."

No crumbs fly when you place a paper bag over the end of your meat grinder and secure with an elastic band. It's a good idea to grind dried bread or toasted crusts for stuffings and casserole toppings ahead of time, then store in sealer.

Cleaning a grater is easy with a vegetable brush. It removes all the bits which might get mixed up with other food being grated.
