Milton pee wees and Orangeville bantams and junior bantams emerged champions of the annual fourtown minor hockey tournament held in Milton arena Saturday, after nine gruelling games of boys' hockey were played by entries from these two towns, Acton and Georgetown.

Dave Brush's local pee wees won their honors by whipping the pants off a luckless and underage Acton squad in the first game of the day by an 8-0 count. Following the game, crests were handed to all team members of the winning entries, and championship trophies were presented to captains of the day's big winners.

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


