### Milton Residents for 28 Years Couple Marks 50th Anniversary

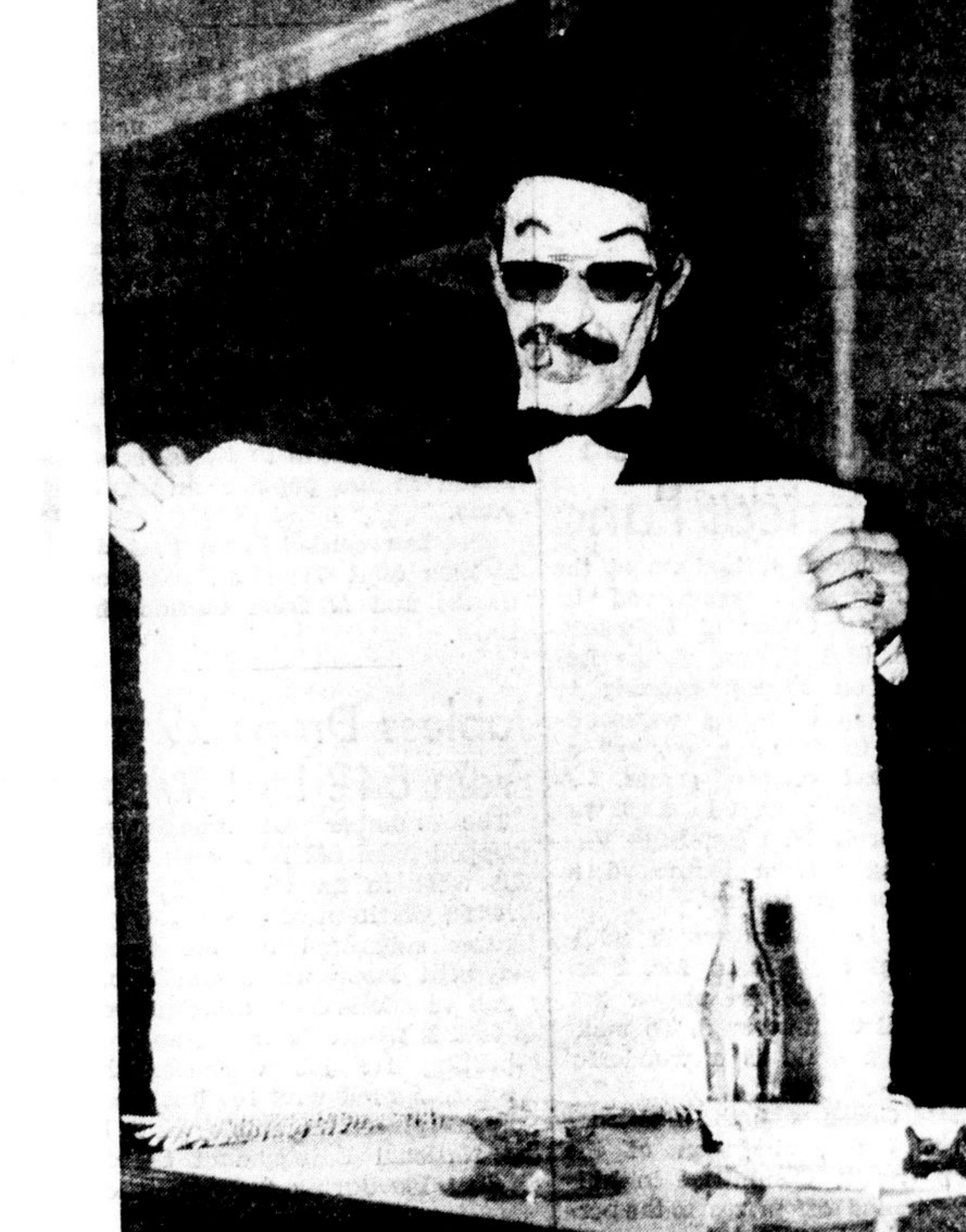

### Acton Plastic Industry To Build New Factory

ACTON—Micro Plastics Division of Frybrook Ltd., will construct a new 40,000 square foot building on a 14 acre site purchased several years ago on Main Street North, vice-president J. H. Reid announced last week.  
It was revealed in an interview the new plant, expected to be completed by November, would employ 60 in addition to the 20 that would continue at the existing plant.  
The vice-president pointed out the present plant would continue to manufacture Carlon pipe with custom extrusions and sheetings the main products of the new plant.  
The new building will be approximately 175 feet by 225 feet plus office buildings and about one and a half acres of the present site will be affected. Further expansion is being considered. Two acres of the 14 acre site are within the town boundaries.
