Pearl Sinclair Anderson, wife of the late David Hartley, passed away after a lingering illness at Milton Private Hospital on Monday, July 28.

Health Unit Now 10 Years Old Reaps Benefit of Early Plans

ing X-rayed. Of these, 347 had abnormal shadowing, 13 were found to have tuberculosis and four had active tuberculosis. Those with active disease were admitted to hospital for treatment and those with abnormal films were re-examined at regular chest clinics.

A total of 14,319 pre-school children received immunizations, the report states.

The Halton County Health Unit in school medical services provides the children with a complete physical examination to each student in his first year in elementary or high school. Immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis is carried out as necessary. Advice is offered by the medical and nursing staffs to solve specific disease problems.

23,000 Injections

In Halton County, school children aged five to 19 received shots, 20,026 were given injections of poliomyelitis vaccine, 2,258 were given injections of diphtheria and tetanus toxoid and there were 744 smallpox vaccinations.

4,000 Tested

The number with no defects was 1,537 out of 4,100, with the average number of untreated cavities per child, 3.75, the report explained.

The nursing service is an integration of many health activities. Public health nurses work with people of all ages, of all economic, educational and cultural backgrounds.

The inspection staff has been able to carry on both the milk and meat inspection programs in spite of the demands of a rapid growth in population and an increased building program, he noted. They made 13,915 inspections in 15 various fields as well as 673 meetings and conferences.
