Wrong Car

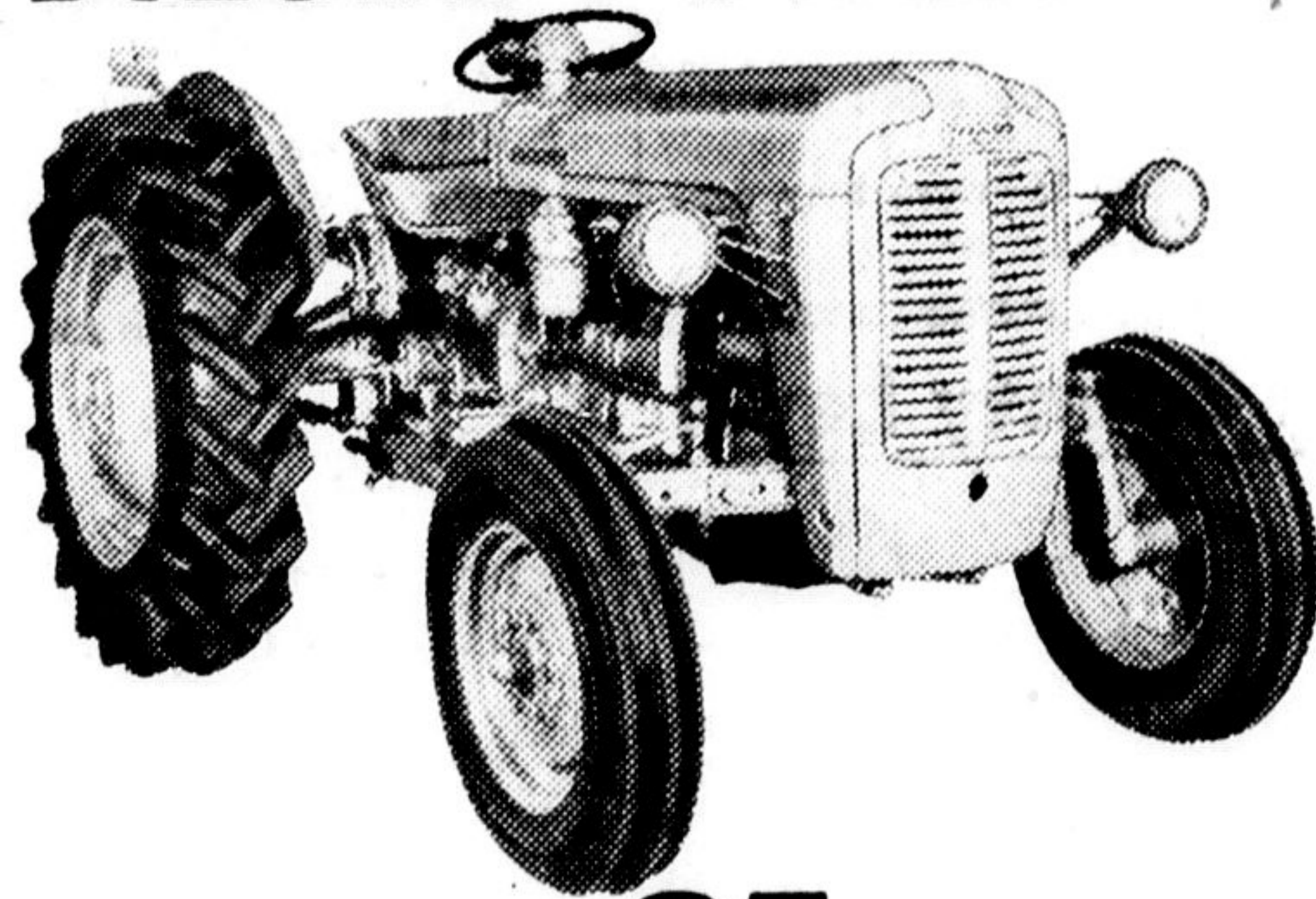
An escapee from the Brampton reformatory picked the wrong car to thumb a ride on Friday evening at Hornby.

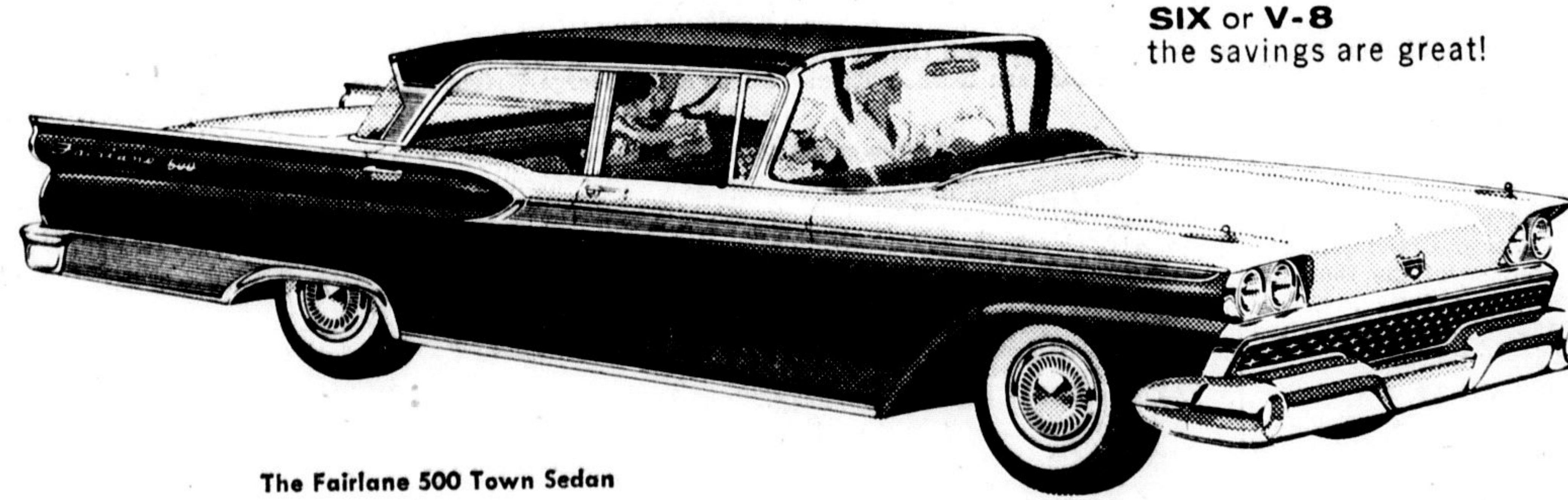

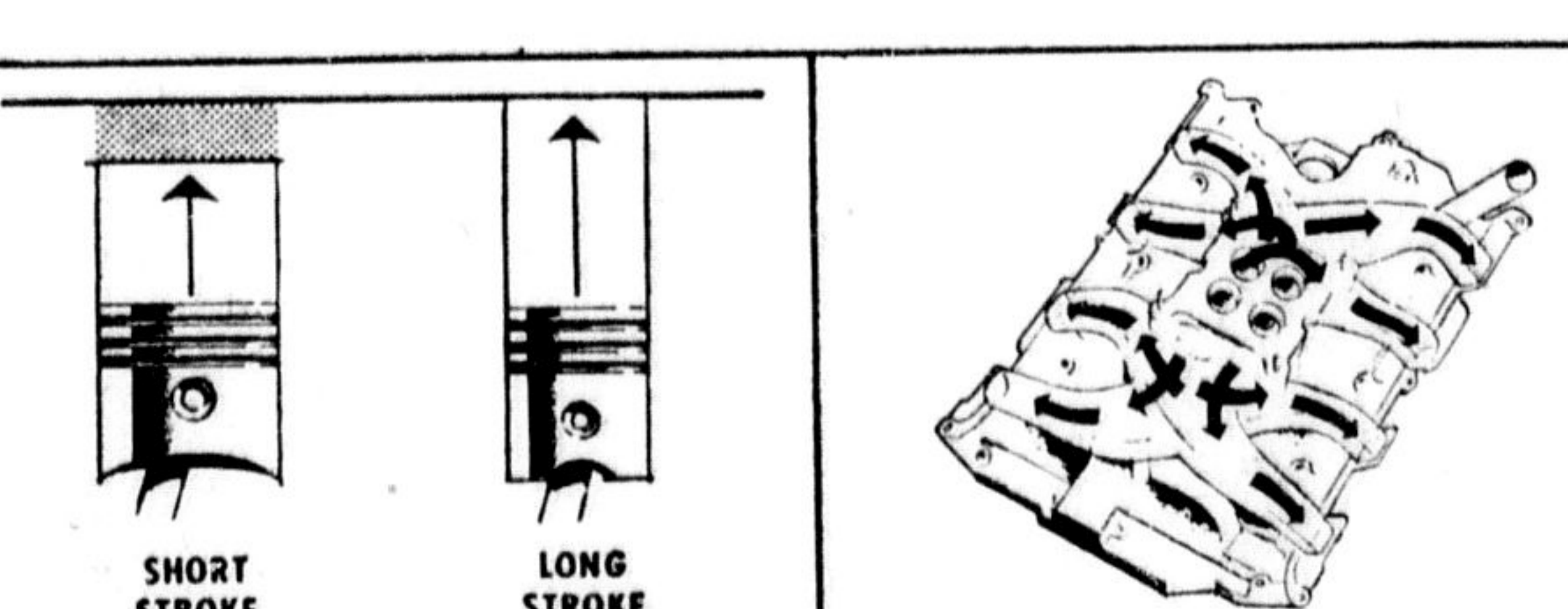
