

Board Accepts Bids Totalling \$642,161 For Acton, Georgetown School Additions

Low bids totalling \$642,161 were accepted by the North Halton High School District Board at a meeting in Acton on Monday evening, for the construction of additions to the Acton and Georgetown High Schools. The bids were accepted subject to reconsideration of the stage lighting and subject to the Department of Education, and Ontario Municipal Board approvals.

Andeen Construction, Brampton, lowest of ten bidders for the three room second story addition plus auditorium at the Acton High School received the contract at \$211,451.

H. Lostranco, Toronto, received the Georgetown High School contract with his low bid of \$430,710. This was for a 12 room addition to the Georgetown High School, an auditorium and demolition of the present old section of the school.

Architect Barnett promised drawings of the new Milton 12 room High School with auditorium in four to six weeks.

The 10 bids on the Acton addition ranged from the bid accepted to a high of \$253,893. The six bids for the Georgetown building ranged to a high of \$499,997.

In reviewing the Georgetown bid the architects noted the difficulties in construction since some sections had to be built before the old section could be demolished to make way for the addition that replaces it.

The need for the existing boiler to continue serving the entire school during the construction also increased the difficulties, the architect reported.

Reconsideration of the stage lighting for the auditorium was assured when the architect agreed to submit prices on comparative installations. It was noted specifications in the call for bids had been enlarged after discussions with the Georgetown principal and members sought further costs.

A subtrade bid directed to the architect rather than to the bid depository was to be returned unop-

ened since this method of filing the bid did not comply with the call for bids.

August Finish
Completion dates promised in both construction contracts was August of 1959.

M. M. Coles reported to the board members on his attendance at a meeting of the Associated High School Boards of Ontario, at Alliston. He stressed the organization was very worthwhile and suggested consideration for next year of a demerit system on pupil conduct similar to that being operated in Salfleet. Mr. Coles explained the plan had proven itself there and

pupils had indicated their desire for normal discipline through their acceptance of the plan. Out of 1100 pupils at Salfleet there had been only three expulsions.

Accumulate Demerits
The system as outlined by the trustee provided that when a pupil accumulated 25 demerits the parents were called in; 35 demerits required a meeting with the board and 50 demerits resulted in expulsion.

Chairman J. Hall suggested the plan appeared quite worthwhile and was worthy of study. Outlines of the plan were to be provided for principals.

Earlier in the meeting the clerk had reported four expulsions from Georgetown and one from Milton. Acton representatives were authorized to purchase a 26 foot wide strip of land from the Acton Public School Board to conform with the existing zoning by-law if necessary. It was explained construction of the new high school auditorium would place the building very close to the property line. The zoning by-law requires a set back from the line equal to the distance from the grounds to the eaves of the building.

The public school board agreed to sell the land to the high school board at the cost of the original land purchase subject to immediate leasing of the land to the public school board at \$1 a year. Members agreed this arrangement was satisfactory.

It was noted final approval from the Ontario Municipal Board for the annexation to the town of the Milton High School 10 acre site had been received.

A town suggestion that three fifths of an acre be deeded to the town to allow extension of Williams Ave. was left until the town controlled the planning of further lands in the vicinity. Members noted there didn't appear to be any urgency but it should be done when the town requires the land.

The 15 man board met in the Acton High School.

with the auditor to discuss financing of future water plans, councillor Jack Charlton said the auditor saw only two methods of raising funds; either by a direct charge against the water system or by using a "fairly healthy surplus" expected from this year's water operations.

Board Would Query
He said financing on the water system would mean a large upset in the rate structure and would be queried by the Ontario Municipal Board.

A discussion followed on the advisability of meters and the costs of installing them, and whether or not council should continue its water study.

Sites of possible new wells were also discussed, with no decisions formulated.

Waterline Tender
The tender of Carroll-Sharp construction in the amount of \$7,419.20 for the installation of the Ontario St. water mains was accepted, subject to municipal board approval. The solicitor was authorized

to borrow the money from the bank to speed up the installation.

Foreman Bruce McKerr was given permission to have the town workmen install the sewer service to the new Milton District Hospital, a length of 325 feet. The work by town men will result in a saving of labor costs to the hospital. Work will begin when the hospital board sends a formal request.

Revise Specs
Dunluc Estates submitted specifications for the roads in the planned subdivision. After reviewing the plans, council asked that the two foot shoulders of the roads be stoned with 5/8 inch crusher run stone, rolled level with the hard-topping.

Solicitor K. Y. Dick reported the Department of Highways had held up the \$18,000 Mill Street paving job for two months, and the Municipal Board would now set a date for a local public hearing to dispense with a vote of the ratepayers.

Permission was granted the Milton Girls' Pipe Band to use the rear room in the town hall for practices, Saturday afternoon
