Andeen Construction, Brampton, lowest of ten bidders for the three room second story addition plus auditorium at the Acton High School received the contract at \$211,451.

Architect Barnett promised drawings of the new Milton 12 room High School with auditorium in four to six weeks.

The 10 bids on the Acton addition ranged from the bid accepted to a high of \$253,893. The six bids for the Georgetown building ranged to a high of \$499,997.

In reviewing the Georgetown bid the architects noted the difficulties in construction since some sections had to be built before the old section could be demolished to make way for the addition that replaces it. The need for the existing boiler to continue serving the entire school during the construction also increased the difficulties, the architest reported.
