In short, before an educations program can be effective, it is necessary to get the facts.

Recently we noted 'data which the Toronto market. reveals that in an eight year perveys were taken, the follow-up educational programs has resulted in a decrease of all the way from 20 to 40 per cent. in the number of farm accidents.

So if you are requested this coming year to co-operate in the Ontario survey of farm accidents, just bear in mind that if educational programs which follow will reduce the number of farm accidents by even 25 or 30 per cent., it is a job well worth doing.






