"Must Put House in Order" Burlington Council Warned

BURLINGTON—A Burlington resident told members of the town council this week that it was time it "put its house in order" and inform the public in advance of what business was on council agenda.

Allan C. Wright said that he was very pleased to learn that Mayor John Lockhart had suggested that one day's notice be given council when citizens wished to appear at a meeting.

A motion that \$300 be sent to Springhill by council was approved unanimously.

Mr. Hourigan informed council members that all members had agreed to match this contribution together, dollar for dollar.

A letter from the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities concerning the federal government's offer to share the cost of payroll expenses for works projects this winter, was read out by Clerk W. K. Sims.

David M. Duncan, solicitor, appeared on behalf of H. Durham and Co. Ltd., regarding a survey off Dyne's Road, between the CNR tracks and New Street. This area, Mr. Duncan recalled, had just been zoned R2 by council, and this, he said was manifestly unfair.

The council referred the matter to the Planning Committee for consideration, and asked Mr. Duncan to appear before the committee.

Mr. Duncan had maintained that the area should be zoned R3, as was much of the area surrounding it.

Council Also:

- Approved the issue of debentures in the amount of \$63,000, subject to OMB approval, for a new fire hall in the Aldershot area.
- Agreed to a tender of \$57,711 from Wilchar Construction Co. Ltd. Hamilton for fire hall on Waterdown Road after Councillor Bennett explained the tender accepted from a lower bidder had left out paving work (valued at over \$3,000) and the Wilchar bid was now the best offer.
- Agreed to award a pen and pencil set, engraved with the town's crest, to Robert Hawthorne, who returned to Burlington from Europe where he became the world's fly-casting champion.
- Deferred a decision on the purchase of a \$22,000 pumper for the fire services, pending representations by company salesmen to be made to the committee.
- Approved in third reading the construction of a covered reservoir on the Waterdown Road, already approved by the O.M.B.
- Noted a request by the Board of Education for \$134,000 to build an eight room addition to King's Road public school. The board emphasized that this was \$26,000 less than had been asked for in August.
- Referred to the appropriate committee a letter from L. D. Dingle, Q.C., protesting that a parking lot he had built at the rear of his premises at 2021 James Street four years ago had been virtually useless to him because motorists persisted in blocking the entrance.
- And finally, the council decided to ask the solicitor to investigate the possibility of preventing subdivision developers from removing trees and top-soil from new building areas, by having a clause in any agreements with the town.

Councillor Harry Allen praised the mayor, Mr. Lockhart, for what he called "your bearing, and dignity in the way you conducted yourself over the naming of the Skyway Bridge. You were a credit to us and to the town by your refusal to take sides."

"Hear hear!" echoed other councillors.

Open 401 from 10 to 27, Milton Leg Next

With the official opening of the six and a half miles of Highway 401 on Monday from highway 27 to highway 10, the total mileage of 401 now in use is 220 miles.

T. L. Kennedy, M.P.P. for Peel, cut the ribbon opening the additional link that will eventually connect with Milton at highway 25 possibly next year.

In Sections
Highway 401 is being constructed in sections, each of which is a complete entity in that it joins two existing King's Highways and can be put into service as soon as it is completed. Priority is given to these sections on the basis of the amount of relief which will be afforded for traffic congestion on other highways.

Costs involved in completing this new highway includes \$1500,000 for land since the department began purchasing the right-of-way in June 1954 and \$4,600,000 for construction of the six and a half mile link including the interchange and structures.

Paved Portion
Each two-lane paved portion of the new 401 is 24 feet wide throughout on each side of a 34 ft. median strip with 10 foot shoulders outside and three foot shoulders inside.

The interchange requirements at the junction of highway 401 and 27 plus the fact that it was necessary to channel Mimico Creek at five different locations under the interchange legs at this junction made it necessary to construct one of the most complex interchanges ever designed by the department.

Three bridges were required and five separate 45 foot diameter concrete barrel arch structures.
