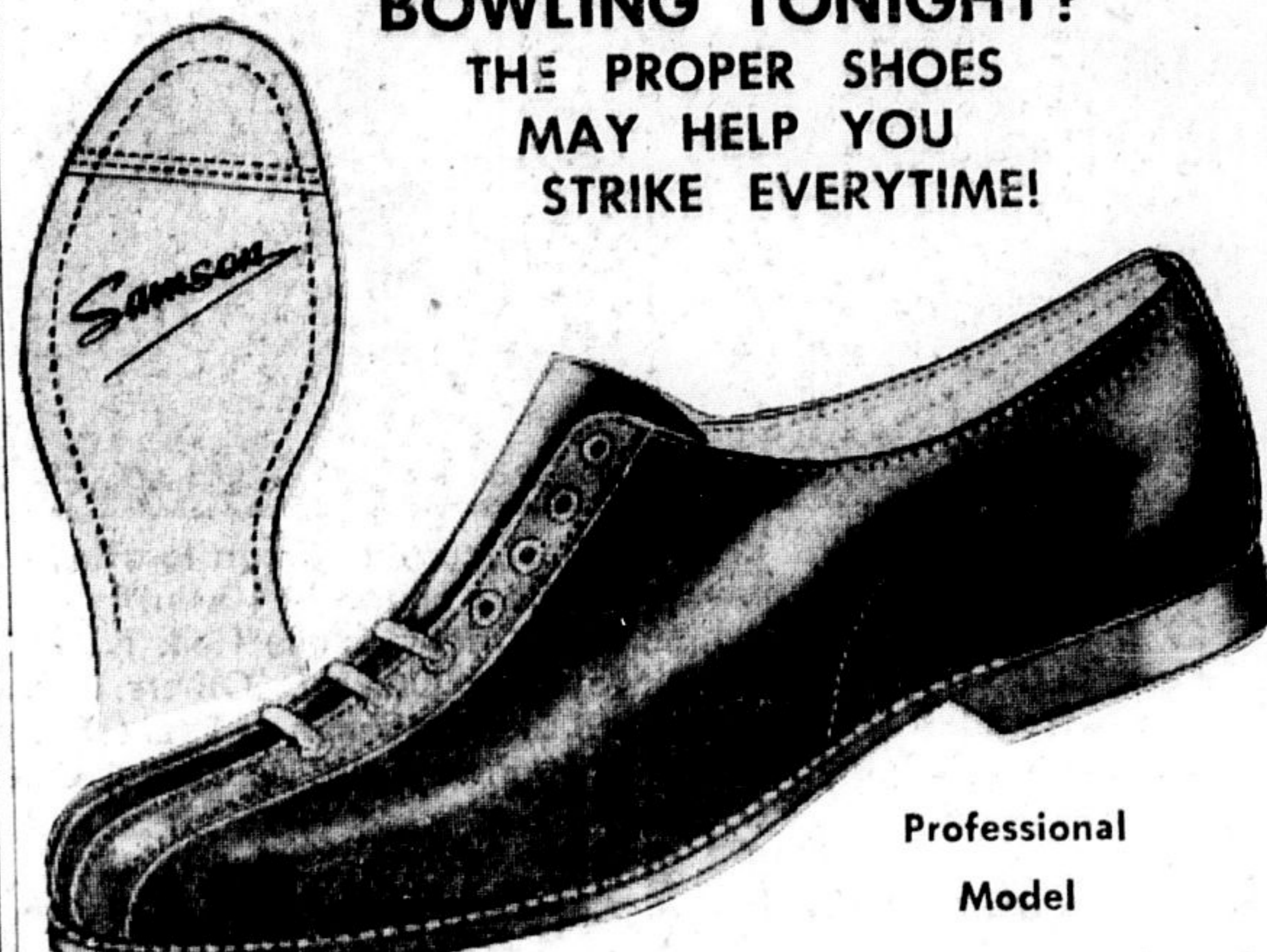
Mr. and Mrs. William Pickett, Mr. and Mrs. Smith Currie, and Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Freeman were

Mrs. Adolf Parchem entertained to a pantry shower in honor of Mrs. Robert McLaren on Tuesday evening.

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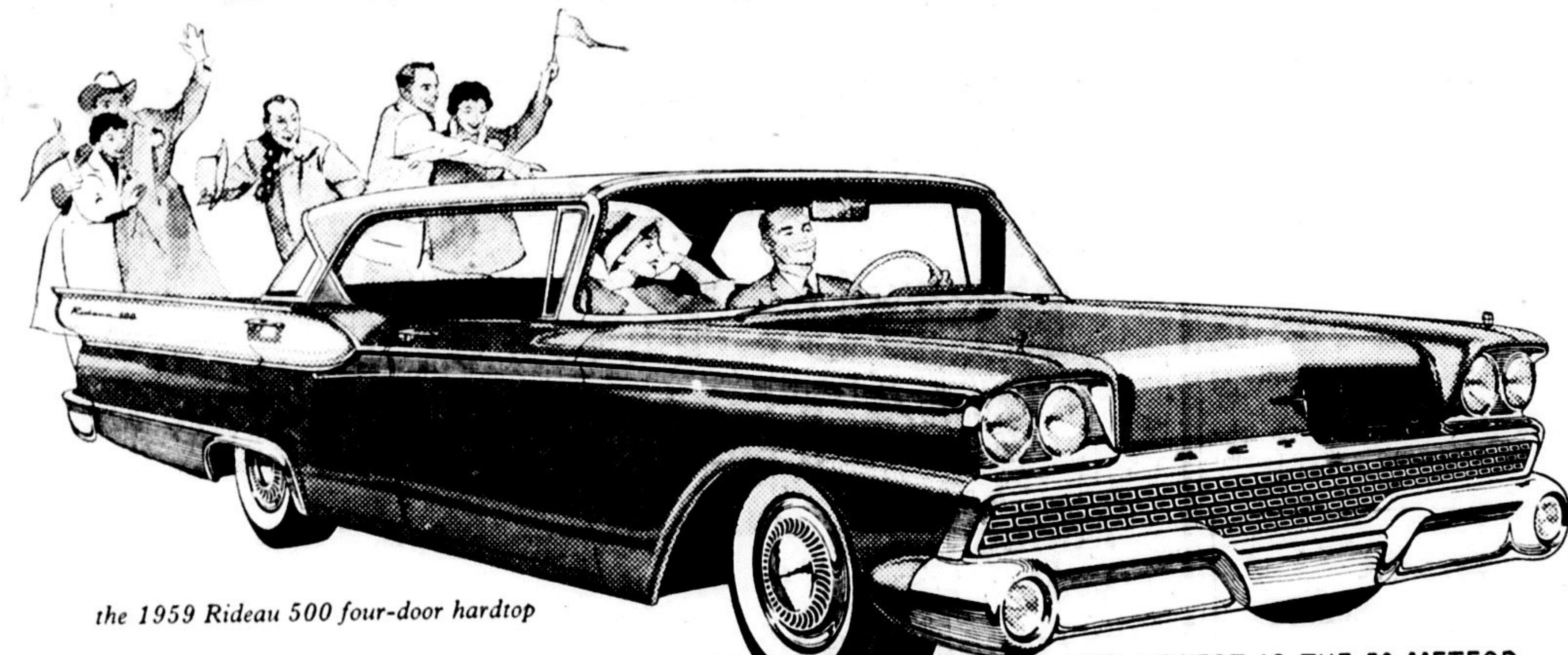
Primary iron and steel pays the highest wages of any major Canadian industry, an average of \$2.10 per hour in Nova Scotia and \$2.29 in Ontario.
