## Overheating, Overeating Mar Holiday Pleasure

Overheating is as much a holi- is a must if you're entertaining a day hazard as overeating.

It's the rigorous round of too- perts. Open the window wide for crowded parties and the hot, stuf- a moment or two to let the clean fy rooms that cause as many cases of "holiday-itis' as the spicy foods, the rich desserts and the extra "spirits".

To avoid the usual post-holiday of water. letdown, it's wise to protect the comfort and health of your family and guests by keeping your home well ventilated and pleasantly warm-not hot.

If you're expecting a group for a party, turn the thermostat setting down a few degrees as soon as the numbers begin to increase, warn experts. Body heat provided by the guests will contribute plenty of warmth-too much if the room is hot at the start.

By just standing around chatting, experts point out, a person generates almost as much heat as a 200-watt bulb, and in a stuffy room the heat literally has no place to go. The results: a feeling of lethargy and fatigue.

Keep the thermostat setting at 68 degrees while the party is in progress, then as the crowd dwindles and finally departs, reset the dial to the degree you find the most comfortable for relaxing.






