Board Studies Plans for Addition Suggests Changes; Seek Dept. OK

A special meeting of the Milton Public School Board on Tuesday evening reviewed preliminary plans for the six room addition at the J. M. Denyes Public School with C. McLean.

The proposed addition would extend east and include four classrooms and two kindergarten rooms as well as lavatories.

Discuss Arrangement

Detailed discussion on the possible arrangement of the building to the best advantage resulted in four recommended changes before the plans are submitted to the Department of Education for the necessary approval of sketch plans.

Chairman G. C. Gowland stressed the importance of having the addition completed by September to avoid any staggered class problem. The plans were to be submitted to the Department as soon as the recommended changes had been incorporated.

Seek Advice

Chairman Gowland and vice chairman J. Ostler were delegated to seek the advice of the Architect's Association concerning the Board's hiring of an architect. It was noted the board felt an account from architect Laing was not in order since he had not been engaged by the board to prepare plans. By resolution the board has indicated its intention of hiring C. McLean.

Fast Wood Cutting Done Without Horse

Regarded as a record in North Bay for early completion of woods cutting operations, work begun by a company in Vogt township on October 1 with 60 men ended December 16. Also, there wasn't a horse in camp.

The completely mechanized operation used tractors to skid and eight trucks for the seven mile haul with 10 gangs cutting. The cut was 63,302 pieces of red and white pine, 6,064,578 F.B.M.

R. T. Fraser of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests, said: "We believe this is the first time in this district that an operation of this size was completed in this period, and final scaling returns on file in the district office on December 30."

Retiring Prexy Talks at Annual

Maurice C. Beaty of Milton, retiring president of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, gave his presidential address at the annual meeting held in Toronto on Tuesday.

Milk Demand Up

In his message Mr. Beaty noted the higher demand for Jersey milk and the fact that 1958 saw more Jerseys classified than in any previous year.

"Not only is classification at a new high, but the number of twenty-five percent," he declared. "Other highs that are an indication of increased interest in our breed, are the fact that the average number of Jerseys shown at the Royal Winter Fair for the past five years has been higher than any other dairy breed; our Sale of Stars average in 1958 of \$1,157.00 per head was a new high over the past number of years. This increased value of Jerseys is not confined to a few hand-picked cattle. The inventory of every Jersey cattle owner has very definitely gone up during the past two years."

Opportunity Apparent

In concluding the local breeder promised "I feel the future in the Jersey business holds for us both opportunities and obligations. The opportunities most apparent are the wonderful possibilities of expanding both our milk and cattle markets. Our obligations are to safeguard the high quality of the milk shipped from the farm and to see that cattle of inferior quality do not find their way into the herds of new breeders."

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The Board approved the continuation of a safety program in the schools with the details to be worked out with Supervising Principal E. W. Foster, the Safety Council and the chairman of the Board.
