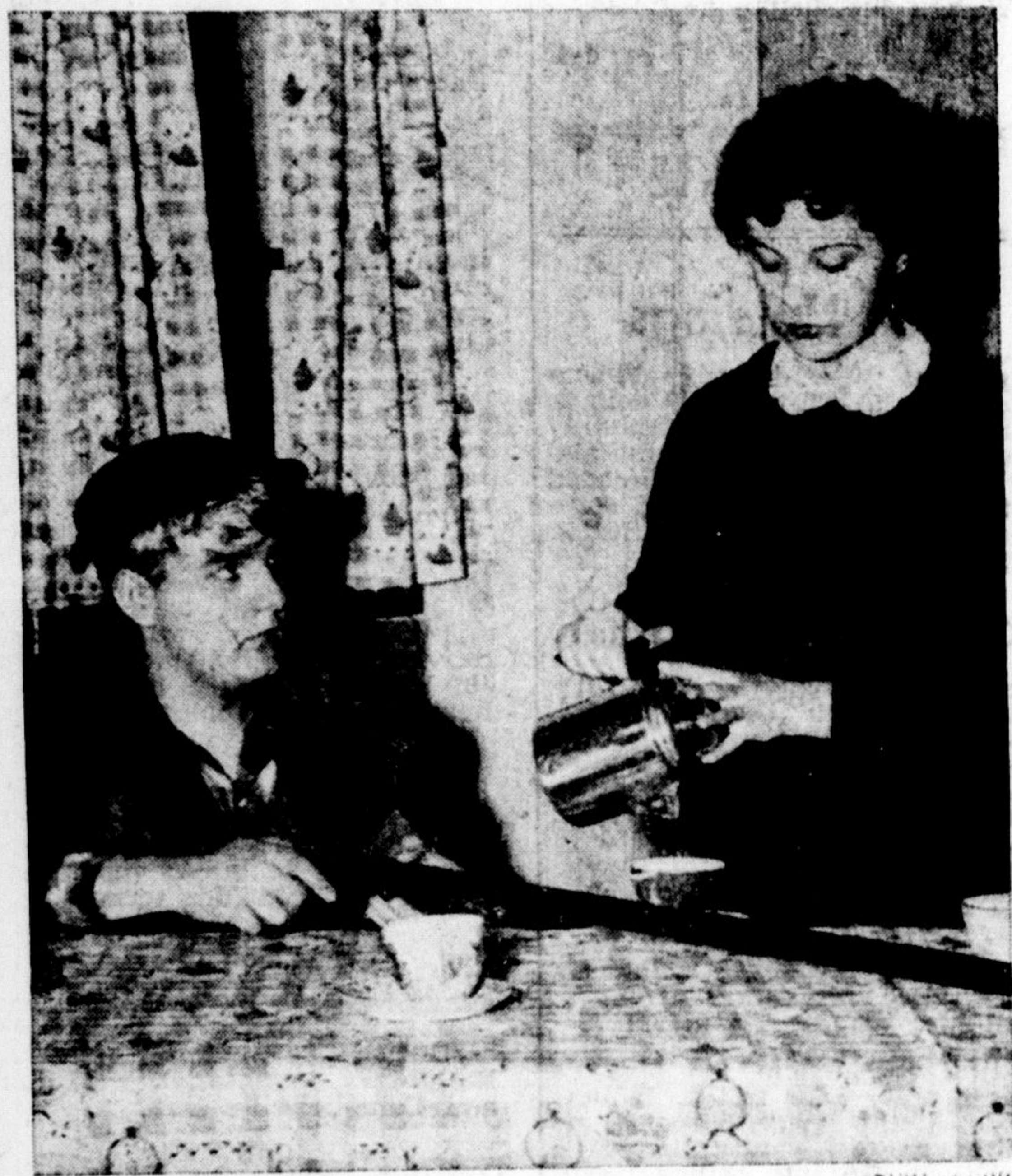

Jobless Resident Raps Roads He's "Available for Work"

Mr. G. A. Dills, Editor, The Canadian Champion, Milton, Ont. Dear Sir:

Although I am not one to normally criticize the work of any elected government, I feel that this is a well chosen exception.

The apathetic attitude of the Milton Council has allowed the roads in some of the residential areas of this town to degenerate into a condition bordering on criminal neglect. Two sterling examples are Thomas St., and Heslop Road.

These roads are safe neither to pedestrians, motorists nor their vehicles and constitute a continual hazard to the children of this and probably other areas. I must admit however, that care has been taken of the business area, Martin St. and Bronte St., and apparently in that order.

The fact that almost 25% of the working force of this town was unemployed until very recently does not appear to have had any effect on the town's road maintenance programme.

As an ex-Orenda employee, who is still unemployed, I for one am available for work.

BURLINGTON — Raymond C. Bryant of Burlington has been re-elected chairman of the Twelve Mile Creek Conservation Authority.

Ralph Sherwood of Puslinch Township is vice-chairman and Harold Speers of Lowville, secretary-treasurer.

The Authority, like others in the province, has been alerted to a possible flood threat this spring.

A budget totalling \$20,000 has been approved. It will be shared on a 50-50 basis by the provincial government and participating municipalities.

The authority is considering the purchase of land in East Flamboro or Puslinch Township for reforestation purposes.

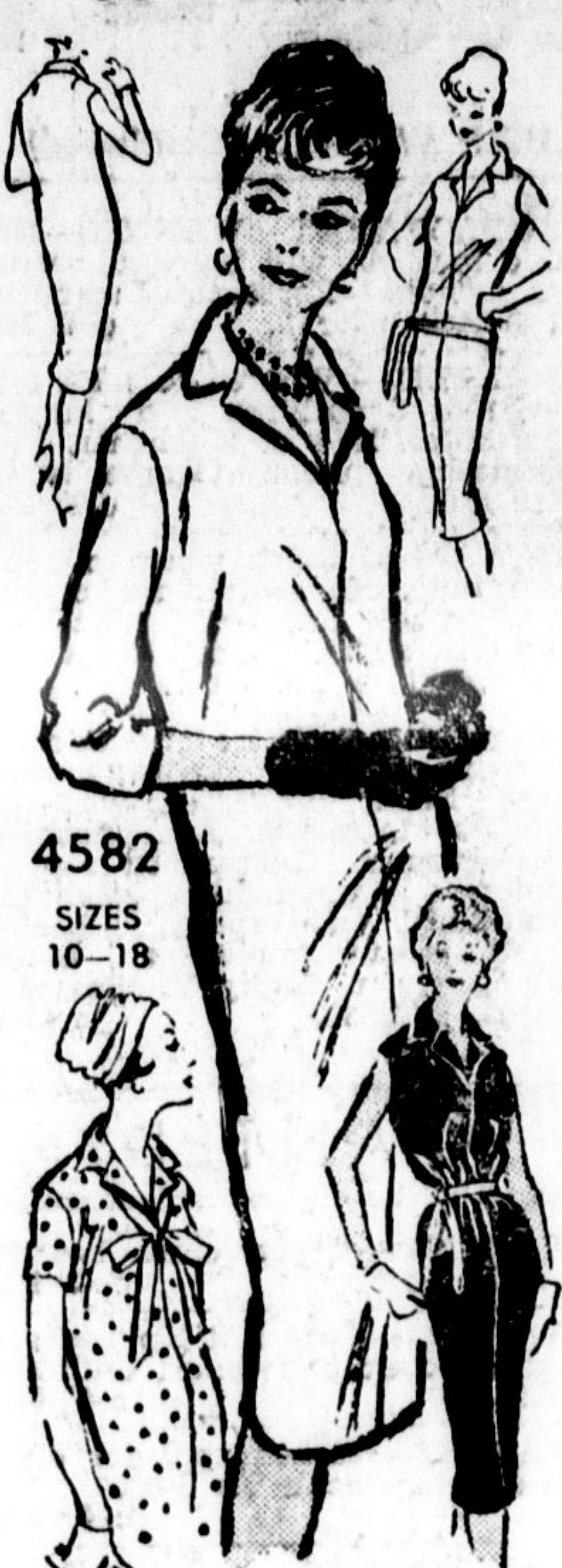
