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Here's Why

Forest Fires Finish Fishing

Forest Fires Finish Fishing. Why? Here's the answer any conservation officer will give you: When forest fires burn the trees and bushes over large areas around a lake, there is nothing left to hold the rainfall and so most of it runs off the land into the lake, carrying with it not only the top soil but also the ashes from the fire.
Water Unlivable
This sediment, plus the lye from the ashes, makes the water unlivable for many of Ontario's game fish.
Result is that fishing in that particular lake is ruined for years to come.
That's why forest protection officials of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests urge every-

one travelling through forested areas to be most careful with fire in any form.
"Die Horribly"
"If you like fishing," they advise, "remember that fish can't live in fire-polluted streams and lakes. Furthermore, many birds and animals die horribly whenever fire ravages the woods."

Horticultural Notes

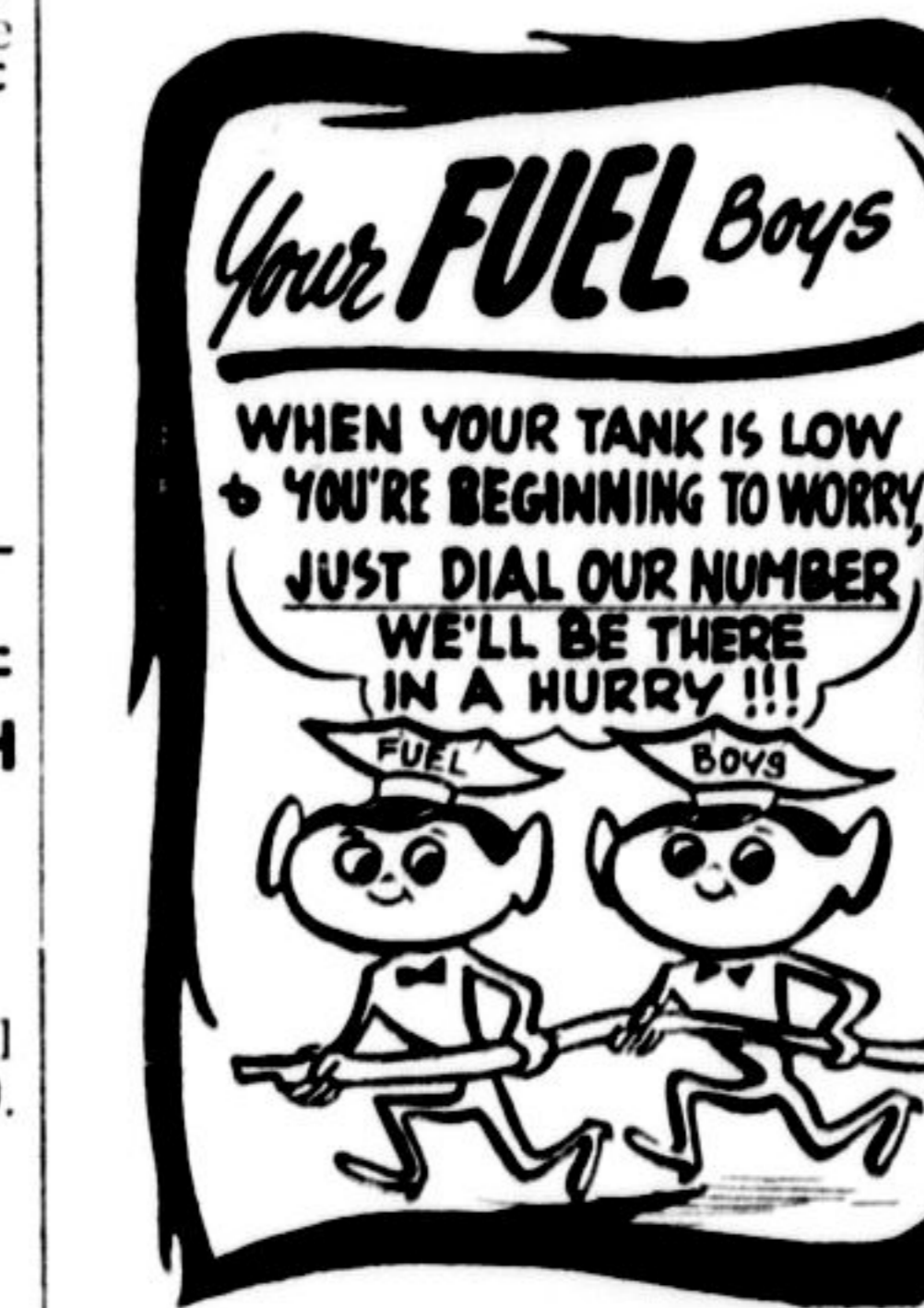

Hold Moisture
Mulching grass clippings and similar bloom with grass clippings or straw help hold the moisture and keeps the weeds under control.
FIRE CAUSES
Of 25,606 fires in Ontario in 1958, 9,973 were caused by smokers' carelessness; fires caused by electricity resulted in the biggest fire loss, \$3.2 million; lightning caused 1,035 fires; spontaneous combustion 175; gas fired appliances caused only 151.
Keep Dead Growth Off
We all know our flowering friends do better when dead bloom is kept removed so the plant strength won't go to growing seed pods. Some such as violas, pansies, etc. can stand to be cut back quite close to the ground to get a fresh start on life. Other plants produce better bloom if they are kept disbudded, zinnias and various types of marigolds are in this class.
Dahlias benefit from a good soaking of soapy water and speaking of watering give every thing a good soaking down to a depth of 4-5". Check this with a trowel.

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
