Mr. Barber succeeds Mr. McCormick as president of the 725-member association. An honor bestowed infrequently on "white men" by this particular branch of the Cree Nation, this was viewed by the 400 delegates to the convention as a fine tribute to the understanding attitude of Canada's country editors toward Canadian Indians. Mr. Barber assumes the name of a 90-year-old Indian, Wagiah Doupe, and becomes Chief Four Thunder. Mr. McCormick, as Chief Eagle Born, is now known to the tribe as Chief Keno Kahnitowiket.

Teacher, War Veteran C. E. Stephens Dies

Funeral services for the late Charles Edward Stephens of Woodbridge, who passed away on Monday, July 27, aged 59 years, were held on Thursday, July 29, from Christ Church (Anglican) Woodbridge, at 2 p.m. The Rev. A. B. Cathcart officiated and interment took place at Prospect cemetery, Toronto.

Pallbearers were Blair Williams, Gordon Grogan, Charles Lavelle, Robert Charters, Charles Armstrong and Frank Kellam.

Mr. Stephens is survived by his wife, the former Ruth Adella Weston, his mother, Mrs. William J.

Stephens, Islington; his brother, William L. Stephens of Woodlea, Woodbridge; his sister Marjory (Mrs. George Soulsby) Islington; his brother Glenholme R. Stephens, Toronto. He is predeceased by his father, William J. Stephens, in 1943.

He was born in Toronto and attended Weston Collegiate Institute. He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1928 and after graduation from the Ontario College of Education was on the staff of Brampton high school from 1930 to 1941. He served as a flight-lieutenant in the air forces overseas in World War II. He lived in Milton from 1945 until 1954 and then moved to Woodbridge. He was associated as a partner in Vornado Sales, Ont.
