## RIGHT AROUND HOME

During our recent trip to Regina the convention was entertained at a barbecue and Indian pow-wow at the Indian Head Experimental Farm. Preceding the barbecue we toured Regina seeing the Parliament Buildings, its beautiful gardens and the man made lake which they told us was made a month earlier. Also a visit was made to the Museum of Natural History which displayed the animals of Saskatchewan in their natural environment.

The buses then drove through the famed Qu'Appelle valley, a beautiful valley cut through the prairie containing numerous lakes and unusual hills. The hills to us look like pyramids, tireless except where two or more hills came together. Arriving at the Experimental Farm we enjoyed barbecued steak, spare-ribs, salad and coffee. The man who was in charge of the barbecue had begun barbecuing as a hobby. Now he has about seventeen fellow employees who help him.

The barbecue sauce, we were told was a recent recipe which took seven hours to prepare at a cost of about \$25 per gallon. Whatever it contained it certainly added to the flavor of the steaks and spare ribs. The evening was climaxed by an Indian pow-wow by the tribe of the district. An evening we won't soon forget.

Barbecuing in recent years has become a favorite hobby for many people. Almost any type of meal can be prepared from the simplest hot dogs and hamburgers to more elaborate meals even including desert. With a little imagination and ingenuity you can prepare an appetizing and eye appealing meal.

Here is a recipe you might like to try. It is a whole meal cooked in individual servings in aluminum foil. This dinner can also be cooked in the oven.

**Individual Chicken Dinners**  
cut up chicken (2 1/2 to 3 lb.)  
3 cups cooked rice  
1 pkg. onion soup mix  
1/2 cup evaporated milk  
4 teaspoons butter  
Cut four 18 x 12 inch pieces heavy aluminum foil (or use double thickness of light-weight foil).

Put a fourth of the rice in centre of each piece of foil. Sprinkle a tablespoon of onion soup mix over each. Put chicken pieces on rice. On each pour 2 tablespoons milk, sprinkle 1 tablespoon onion soup mix, add 1 teaspoon butter, salt and pepper. Bring together the 2 short sides of each piece of foil; fold under twice. Then fold up ends to seal tightly. Place over low fire and cook for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

Serve right in aluminum foil. If cooking in the oven bake on cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes.

If you prefer vegetables with your chicken instead of rice try this recipe.

Following the general directions of the above recipe substitute 1 medium carrot, 1 medium potato, cut in half, 1 small onion and tomato wedges for the rice. Omit the milk. Dot with butter and salt and pepper and seal foil as above. Cook over low coals for 1 1/2 to 2 hours or till tender. Serve in foil packages. When using aluminum foil for outdoor cooking, seal the foil tightly so the steam will not escape and the food will not burn or dry out. Leave a little room around food so the steam can expand. This way, the foil serves as a miniature pressure cooker.
