Photo Class is New Feature

There's a prize of \$3.00 for the best acceptable picture submitted in each of eight classes, including new structures, general photos of the grounds, junior or 4-H exhibits (not livestock), livestock by 4-H or regular entrants, hay display, interior of the general exhibits building, baking show and flower show.

Officials said the best photos of Milton Fair would be submitted in November for a province-wide competition against pictures from other fairs, and could win the Halton Agricultural Society a cash prize.

Other new classes added to this year's September 25 and 26 fair are two new goat breeds, a new horse class for small Shetland ponies, and of course, the Champion-sponsored jam and jelly competition.

Yes, Milton Fair promises to be just as big as ever this year. Officials are hoping for good weather.
