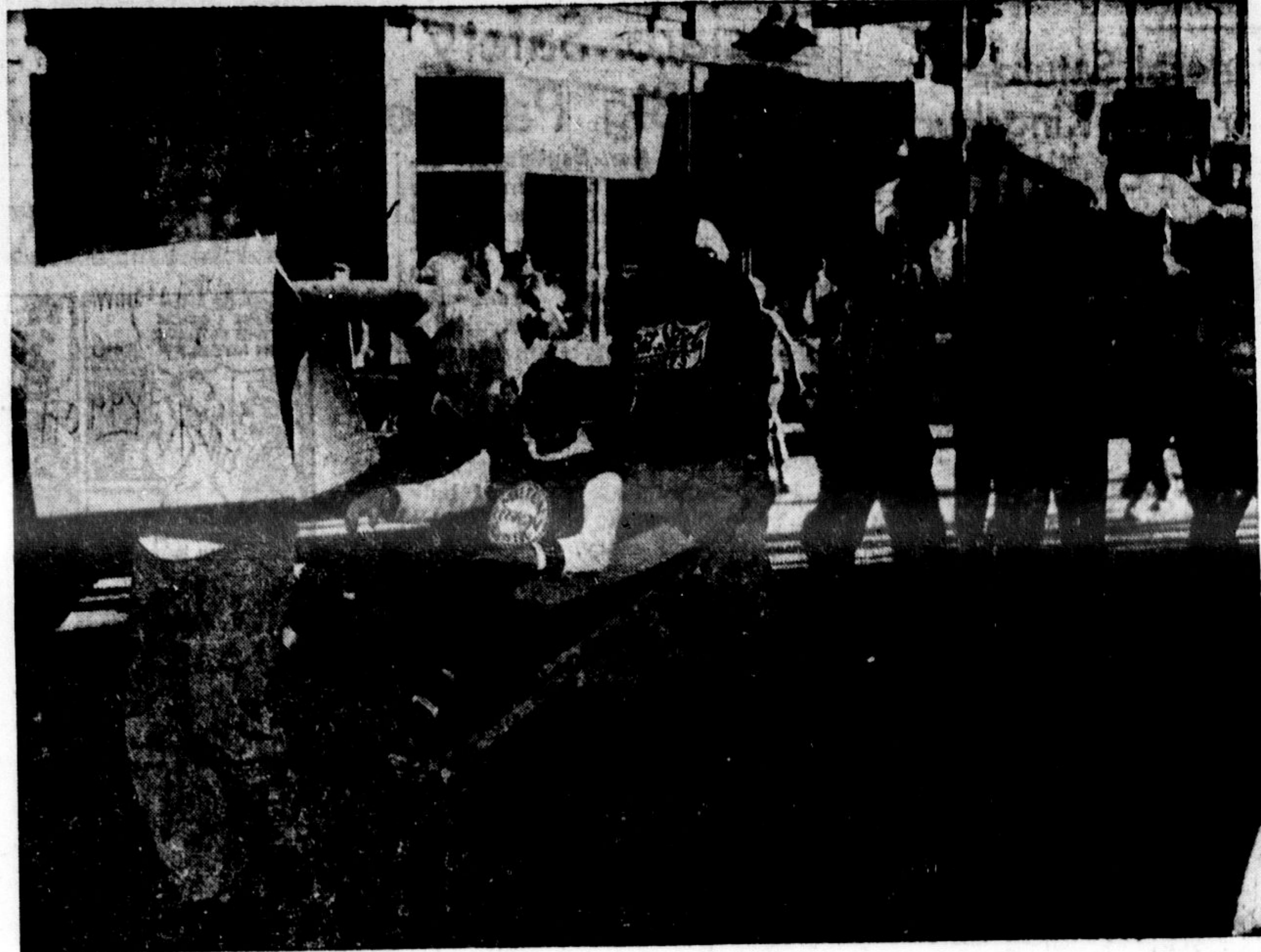

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**Milton Represented**

**Road Safety Workshop Proves Very Interesting, Informative**

Two delegates — Safety Council president Tim Milloy and treasurer Jack Schill — attended the Department of Transport Road Safety Workshop held in Toronto Wednesday and Thursday of last week, and reported the workshops "very interesting and informative."

They were pleased when a local safety council motion was accepted at the conference. It said "realizing that the uniformed constable is a key to any department recognize local O.P.P. detachment constables participation in community safety and encourage said participation."

**Representative Groups**

Theme of the conference was "What can I do for road safety?" and although 500 were expected, 700 delegates from Ontario organizations attended. They included representative groups and community leaders from all walks of life, Mr. Milloy reported.

First day was devoted to lectures for the delegates on what is being done for safety by the Government, auto manufacturers and communities. On the second day, the delegates split up into eight workshops, to discuss problems in their particular fields. Resolutions and recommendations passed by each group were tabled at a general afternoon meeting, and the thought-provoking discussions of each group were evidenced in the large number of resolutions adopted.

**More "Moral" Sermons**

These included compulsory breathalyzer tests, more emphasis

promotion was in their field, and endorsed more sermons on the moral responsibility of their people.

The local Safety Council president noted, from figures received at the workshops, that there had been more accidents and more property damage, yet less fatalities in the first six months of 1959 compared to the similar period in 1958.

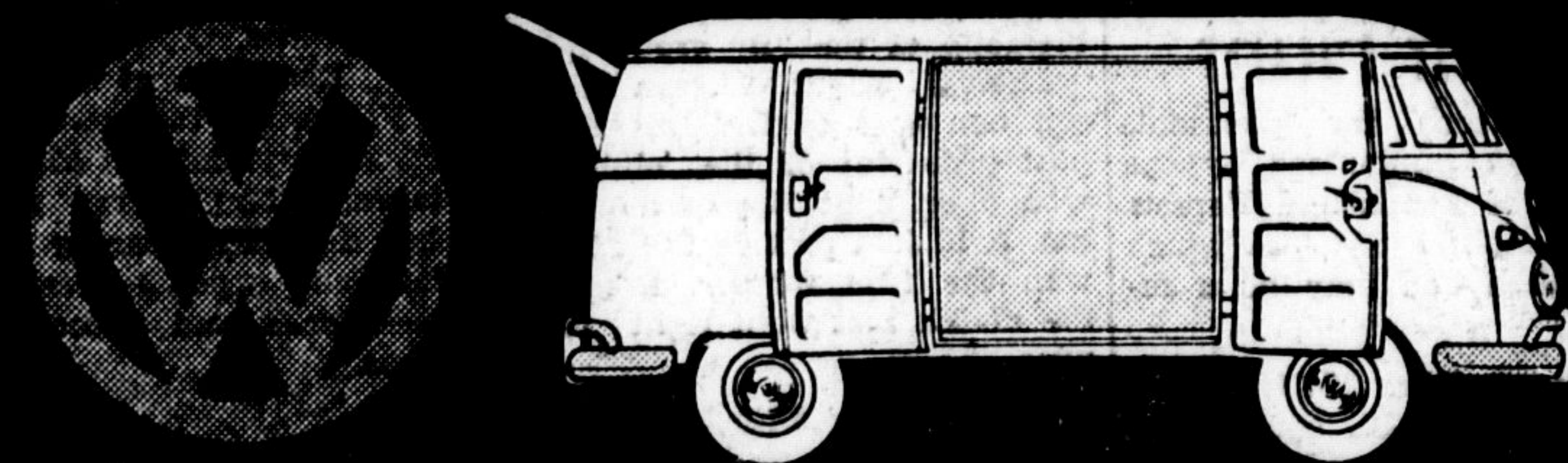
**Parents Must Help**

He said the accident rate of children aged one to 14 years is up, yet fatalities are lower. "It just goes to show that children of pre-school and school age must be taught more safety," Mr. Milloy said. "Parents should help more by teaching their children, and lending their support to the various safety projects."

During the workshop, Mr. Milloy was interviewed by a CBC reporter and the interview was broadcast on Saturday evening over CJBC. In the broadcast, Mr. Milloy spoke of the Milton Safety Council's work in town safety projects.
