A linen shower was held by Mrs. Don Colling on August 29. Miss Eurice Ewart was hostess at a kitchen shower on September 8.

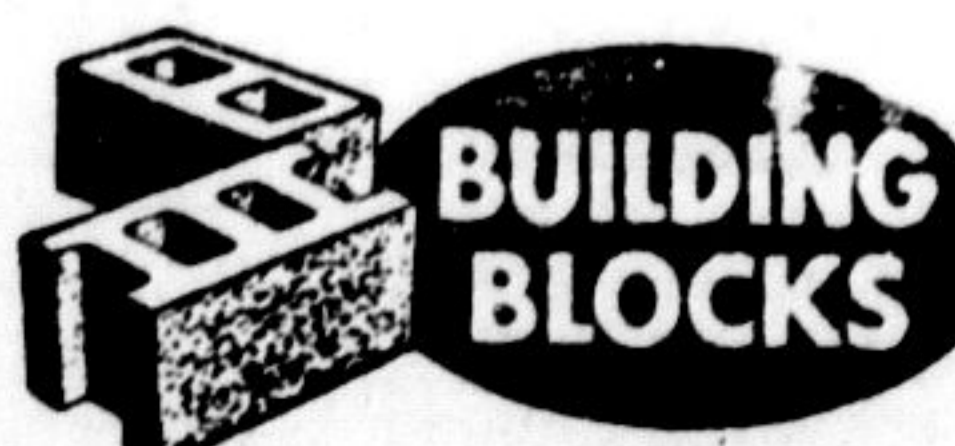
Zimmerman community held a miscellaneous shower on September 12. Another miscellaneous shower was held by the Richardson family at their home on September 17.

ACTON—Work has started on the Main Street C.N.R. crossing signals and last week workmen have installed cement footings for the bell signal boxes.

The installation was approved by the C.N.R. and Department of Transport some months ago after a coroner's jury brought in a recommendation following the death of C. Boylan, an employee of the Disston Saw plant in Acton, who was killed by a C.N.R. locomotive.

When completed, the new signal service will give ample warning to drivers approaching from north or south as they ascend the rise to cross the tracks.

Horticultural Notes

Prepared by the Milton and District Horticultural Society

This is transplanting and dividing month. The ground should be well prepared and fertilized beforehand. If you had started pansies, forget-me-nots or English daisies in an open spot, transplant now to a raised frame or bed. Perhaps the most important member in this class is the peony. Three to five "eyes" or buds should remain on each division and these buds should be covered only two inches deep in heavy soil or three inches in light soil. For quick, showy effect, do not divide the root dump.

Peony Varieties
Some varieties of peonies are: Baroness Schroeder, Festiva Marina, Le Cygne, Marie Lemoine—all whites; Therese, Tourangelle, Martha Bullock, Monsieur Jules Elie, also in the rose hues.

Adolph Rousseau, Karl Rosenfeld and Lady Alexander Duff are all in red. It is surprising how few white peonies we see in comparison with the number available.

Plant Now in Soil
Spring-flowering bulbs such as snowdrops, crocuses, scillas, chionodoxas and narcissus may be planted now in soil four times their own size in depth. The smaller the bulb the more shallow the hole.

Cultured Pearl Drops

time to develop size, the spaces in between could be planted in annuals for a year or two. Annual planting around young foundation shrubs helps for a while also—what would we do without petunias, zinnias and similar types of flowering abundance?

As you are cleaning up your vegetable garden this fall, perhaps it would be a good start for a compost heap making use of tomato vines etc. with layers alternating with grass clippings and manure. Some compost piles are fancy affairs with enclosures of cement blocks or boards. However, just as many are just plain "heaps" in some out-of-sight spot near the garden.

Fall Leaves Best
One of the best mulches is the easiest to get. What a shame to burn all those fall leaves. They should not be used alone as they may mat and cause smothering. Use them with brush or straw. If the urge to burn is one of your favorite fall activities, at least dig the ashes into a flower bed somewhere. Please!

Our personal method of handling leaves on the lawn is to go over them time and again with the rotary lawn mower and in no time they have worked their way down into the grass and are working to our benefit and the lawn's good.

Cedar boughs placed along flower beds and leaves allowed to work down through them is excellent protection for everything from your perennial bed to rose bushes.

If you would like to move a large tree or are looking forward to the delivery of one from the nursery, now is the time to dig the required hole before the ground "freezes-up". Later a trench should be dug around the tree to be moved. This should be far enough out from the trunk to leave sufficient roots.

"When this 'ball of earth' is frozen solid, lift the tree and place in the prepared hole. In spring as soon as it thaws, the soil should be carefully packed around the tree. It is time well spent if you support the tree with guy-wires from the prevailing winds. Don't worry about the cutting of the tree roots during digging. This can be beneficial.

VISION FOR BEAUTY
Perhaps you are in the process of foundation planting—or due to winter damage and we had a lot of damage this past winter—you are replanting your evergreens and ornamental shrubs. To do this properly, there has to be vision and good planning in order to have uniformity and beauty the year round.
