Campbellville took a commanding lead in the best of five final series for the Ontario Int. "A" Major title when they whipped Hamilton 8-2 in Campbellville on Saturday to take a 2-0 lead in games.

Schools Drilled

Fire Prevention Week Begins

Fire Prevention Week in Milton and district got off to a fair start on Monday when fire chief A. E. Clement and members of the Milton brigade conducted school drills and inspections in all rural schools in the district they serve. Local schools were to be drilled today.

Chief Clement said some schools had practiced fire drills and the brigade's call on Monday went off without a hitch as some schools were emptied in record time. Others, he said, had received no drills and teachers were asked to assist the brigade in preparing the children for emptying schools in the event of a fire.

Find Many Hazards
One school furnace with a "definite fire hazard" with no control for drafts and poor pipes. One school had all cleaning mops and equipment in a cupboard under a stairway, and in the event of a fire starting there the upstairs pupils would not be able to get out. Other schools had wiring not up to standard and rubbish lying around in basements and back rooms.

Others, he said, were in excellent shape.
