Two Homes

Two new homes comprised the bulk of the \$17,400. in building permits issued by building inspector Frank McNiven during October. Shop additions and a private garage were the only other works undertaken in town.

This brings the 1959 total to \$1,940,400. November's figure is expected to rise as permits have already been issued for 10 new homes on Heslop Drive.

In Nassagaweya, \$36,900. worth of permits were issued in October, bringing the year's total to \$282,900. Three homes were included in the figure, making 26 new homes for the township this

Still Objection to Land Fill Site Opposition to the site of the sanitary land fill garbage disposal on the disposal plant site was reported to Milton Council Monday when Reeve R. C. Cunningham explained residents had objected to

the site. Councillor Johnson noted the move was a temporary one and it was hoped land would soon be acquired on the Parkway Drive extension that would be used for the filling.

Not Pit Fill Reeve Cunningham reported a proposal to him that some pits be filled but members recalled the difficulty of getting permission from neighboring municipalities for dumping. "What's against it", Councillor Wilson queried referring to the
