FELLOW TAXPAYERS of Trafalgar:

I come before you again with the same plea, for lower taxes on our homes and farms, and believe me this is possible if you send to Council, tax Conscious representatives, whose sole objective is your welfare. I sometimes wonder why you good people sit so complacently by, and pay and pay without any questions as to where your taxes go. In the last four years taxes have gone up from 13 to 20% depending on the area you live in, and there is no end in sight, unless you rise and make your indignation felt at the Polls on December 5th. You may wonder how these taxes are spent and often

wasted. Well here is just one instance of wastage of \$40,000 and if time permitted I could name you many more of such useless spending of your money, in other parts of your Township. There is in this Township a section of land comprising 144 acres and called Oakville Gardens. This parcel of land

and its people have been not only ignored for the past twenty years, but more often than not ridiculed and referred to as Wrangel Islanders, by your different Councils. Suddenly this year for some unknown reason, this land and its people became of prime and urgent importance to the Township. The land had to be re-developed, and a By-

law-drawn up giving the Council power to expropriate any or all of this property should it be deemed advisable. The people concerned were invited to draw up a plan and submit same to Council. This they did and their plan was accepted, as such. This land had been surveyed by Provincial Government Engineers, its contours and topography was already mapped out on plans in the Township office, all that was left to be done, was for an Ontario Land Surveyor to move in, survey the lots, plot them, and turn this plot plan over to the Township Engineers for them to put in roads,

sewers, and water. Was that correct and inexpensive procedure carried out?

Instead, a young Consulting Firm was called in and ordered "to prepare a plan" for these 144 acres, and they were awarded the sum of approximately \$40,000 for this plan preparation, to say nothing of what their next contract to supervise this construction will cost.

Now we have a large engineering staff, I believe we have 5 Professional Engineers plus their subordinates, which with their salaries and expenses cost at least \$50,000 per year. Now with this more than adequate staff, why should Consulting Engineers be called in to look after glorified culvert construction and other picayune work at these tremendous fees? If our engineers are not capable of doing these simple jobs, then they should be replaced with engineers who are qualified to do the jobs. We cannot affort a huge straff plus several consulting firms as well. My advice is to dispense with these smaller consulting firms and turn the work over to our own Engineering Staff, and so give them something to do to earn the salaries we are paying them. Anyway, we already have a permanent Consulting Engineering Firm, one of the best in Canada, so why clutter their work up with firms of lesser stature and experience. I told you in 1954 when on Council, that you would soon be having a Secretary to a Secretary to a Secretary, well you now have that right across your Township. Lawyers to consulting lawyers to consulting lawyers. Are you now going to have Consulting Engineer to a Consulting Engineer to a Consulting Engineer, you will if you don't wake up. Now lets talk about the \$40,000 mistake on the Utilities

Building which was built in the wrong place, had to be torn down and replaced. We were told the Architects had reimbursed the Township. As it wasn't the Architects' fault, I do not believe they ever re-imbursed this \$40,000. and like you, until I see their cancelled cheque for this amount "I'm from Missouri". For the last two years your Council have been at logger-

heads, one half often not knowing what was being done, at times deliberately kept in the dark. I know this to be true because two of them have repeatedly told me so, and still another one has so complained to his friends. There is no need whatsoever for closed meetings, the taxpayers business should be always conducted on top of the table at all times. If anything personal comes up, Council only

has to suggest to the Press present not to print it in their

papers, and they dont. I have never known the press to do otherwise. In the meantime don't believe all this Pie in the Sky propaganda put out about all the industry coming in. You know, and I know, industry is not coming in, and the only reason they are not is our high taxes, get taxes down, and industry will flock to your Township, and you won't have to send our Council and employees on parties to the Royal York to entertain prospective industries that never materialize, as you have been doing this past year. To you men who are hesitant about voting for a woman, look to your bordering Townships-Reeve Mary Fix, Reeve Marie Curtis, Lady Mayor of Brampton, all successful in reducing their taxes for three years hand running, and in the case of Mrs. Fix and Mrs. Curtis, who have so much industry knocking at their doors that they are hard pressed to accommodate them. That's what lower taxes does in the fight for industry.

Get a couple of women on your council, some people claim they would scratch each other's eyes out. I don't think so, but I am sure that they wouldn't scratch each other's backs as the men do, and they would keep you advised as to what was going on behind the scene, which of course you are entitled to know at all times.

Well, Fellow Taxpayers, if you want to be represented in Council by someone who is content to sit like a bump on a log, and vote when the boss councillor nods, or a pressure group winks, if you want to be represented by a Party who is content to "Let George Do It, either over or under the table," | if you want a representative who thinks the welfare of the employees and pressure groups are of more importance after election day, than the taxpayers, well don't vote for me, I'm not that kind of person.

All I offer you is 100% sincerity in looking after your money and your interests as carefully as I look after my own budget and I promise if elected I will work for a reduction in taxes, because it can be done without interfering with any essential services, but by cutting out wasteful extravagances and duplication.

Councillor "Bulmer", your Financial Boy Wonder says the Township's bonded indebtedness is \$10,000,000. Councillor "Cond" says it isn't so it's \$11,000.000 plus almost another \$4,000,000 owed to Banks and other sources,


