Jackets, Championship Trophy Tribute Sox

Take a championship baseball team, the members' wives and girlfriends, a couple of trophies, executives, a lovely beef dinner, a dance hall and a guest speaker who tells pretty funny jokes . . . and you've got a good recipe for a bangup night of fun.

That's just what the Milton Red Sox did on Saturday night at the Legion Hall, when the team gathered to glean the official honors for winning Ontario's coveted Intermediate "B" championship this past summer. They brought along their better halves and lady friends, sat down to a big meal whipped up by the ladies of the Legion Auxiliary, then danced into the wee small hours after each member of the team had been suitably honored for his part in bringing back the Dominion Life Assurance trophy.

Jests Wow Guests
Guest speaker of the night was Little Jim Millman, a public relations type from a London Brewery. He wowed his audience with jests about team members and executives and played a hot piano, much to the delight of all the guests.

Mayor Childs congratulated the team for bringing the O.B.A. championship to Milton and Sox president, Len Ste. Marie said it was only hard work and team spirit which brought the win. "Team effort and co-operation have been lacking, but we got it back this year," said the president.

\$100 For Hospital
Jim Black, first vice-president of the Halton executive, praised the Milton team as one of the Oakville club's best competitors. He announced that the H.C.B.A. executive had, that afternoon, decided to donate \$100 to the Milton District Hospital for use as the hospital sees fit. Pete McMullen, president of both the O.B.A. and H.C.B.A., praised the move of the executive as a fine gesture.

Milton insurance agent Bob McCuaig presented the most valuable player trophy to Doug Hyatt, star catcher up from Sarnia. Doug was

chosen by his teammates as their most valuable man in a close vote. Local sports figure, Dooney Evans was on hand to give out the new blue jackets and crests to all members of the team. He reviewed the accomplishments of all the players in presenting them with the jackets.

The O.B.A. prexy handed the "B" ball trophy to the club captain Art Melanson. Milton, Mr. McMullen recalled, had won the trophy first after the O.B.A.'s incorporation in 1930 and took it again in 1947 after a close series with Fort Erie.
