

# G. Currie, C. Sinclair Seek Reeve's Job Esquensing Votes Monday on Trustees

Esquensing township voters will trek to the polls next Monday, December 7 for their first municipal vote in three years. A real battle is shaping up for the post of Reeve of the township, with 30 year council veteran George Currie, incumbent Reeve, challenged by present Deputy-Reeve Campbell Sinclair.

Mr. Sinclair advocated a road construction program over a long term basis, rather than repeated treatments with calcium on gravel roads.

A member of the Credit conservation authority, he told of the purchase of Belfountain Park but warned conservation costs would have to be kept down in future.

**Grader Purchased**  
Councillor Bird reviewed the purchase of a new \$20,000 grader, on which the old grader was traded for \$10,000 and the balance is payable over three years. One new bridge was erected at a cost of \$4,200 and another received a new top, he said.

Flowing cost \$18,490, sanding \$9,400 and weed spraying \$2,200 last year, the new Deputy-Reeve noted. He also reviewed his work on the Sixteen conservation authority, and pointed out the need of new office accommodation for the township.

**No City Dumping**  
Councillor Linham reviewed his 10 years in council and told of 20,000 tons of gravel laid at 65 cents a ton this past year, and \$5,118 being spent on dust layer. He said cities were asking for dumping grounds in township but a by-law had set out Limehouse dump as the only dump. All union school sections but one have been dissolved, he said, and he credited the board with building the new graded school at Speyside.

Mr. Linham explained he served on the Acton Fire Area Board and the total township loss last year was \$5,900. He gave credit to the clerk and other officials for their work in the past year.

**Would Stand**  
Councillor Leslie was absent from the meeting, but sent his intentions to stand for the post.

School board chairman R. J. Cunningham outlined school costs and noted a \$19,713 estimated balance on this year's operations. Many schools, he said, were overcrowded and it would have been wasted money to spend anything on the old buildings.

**School Report**  
M. M. Coles, township representative and chairman of the district high school board, reported on the dissolution of the area board into three smaller boards. "The board has had one aim—to provide the best possible facilities for the rising generation, that they may be enabled to get best possible equipment for living," he said. He also conveyed his thanks to council for the appointment to the Acton area board next year.

Wilfred Leslie said he had no fault to find with council, and

would support the work to the best of his ability.

Incumbent school board trustee Stanley J. Brown explained that the board's balance showed a healthy picture.

**Debtore Half Cost**  
Clarence Coles said it was good business to have cash on hand, and that part of the cost of the new five-room Speyside school was coming from the current account. Contract price of the job, he said had been \$38,000 and the board felt it could be furnished and opened under a cost of \$100,000. Debtors are to be issued for half the cost of the school.

Future progress in the township's educational system, he promised, included more schools in the northern end.

**Interested**  
Mae Sprowl said he had been interested in school work since 1955 when he was connected with a government school study. He said he would contest the three available board seats.

At the conclusion of the meeting, a few questions were asked of the candidates.

## Retarded Topic First Meeting Bruce St. Group

The first monthly meeting of the newly formed Bruce Street Home and School Association was held at the school on Monday, November 16. Robert Mackay presided.

**Attendance Poor**  
The meeting was poorly supported but the people who did attend were fortunate enough to see a fine film dealing with the care and training of retarded children and to hear a short address by Gerry Addison of the Milton Retarded Children Association plus an inspiring demonstration of how music is being used as a therapy to assist the retarded children in achieving movements and functions.

This demonstration was under the guidance of Mrs. R. Buckner of Acton, who was ably assisted by three normal children trained by her to perform the various musical exercises for the purpose of such demonstrations. Mrs. George Elliott was at the piano.

**Lifetime of Study**  
Mrs. Buckner, a former graduate of the Royal Academy of Music, London, England, has devoted a lifetime of study and effort on musical therapy and its application to retarded children.

### Hydro's New Truck Has Hydraulic Boom

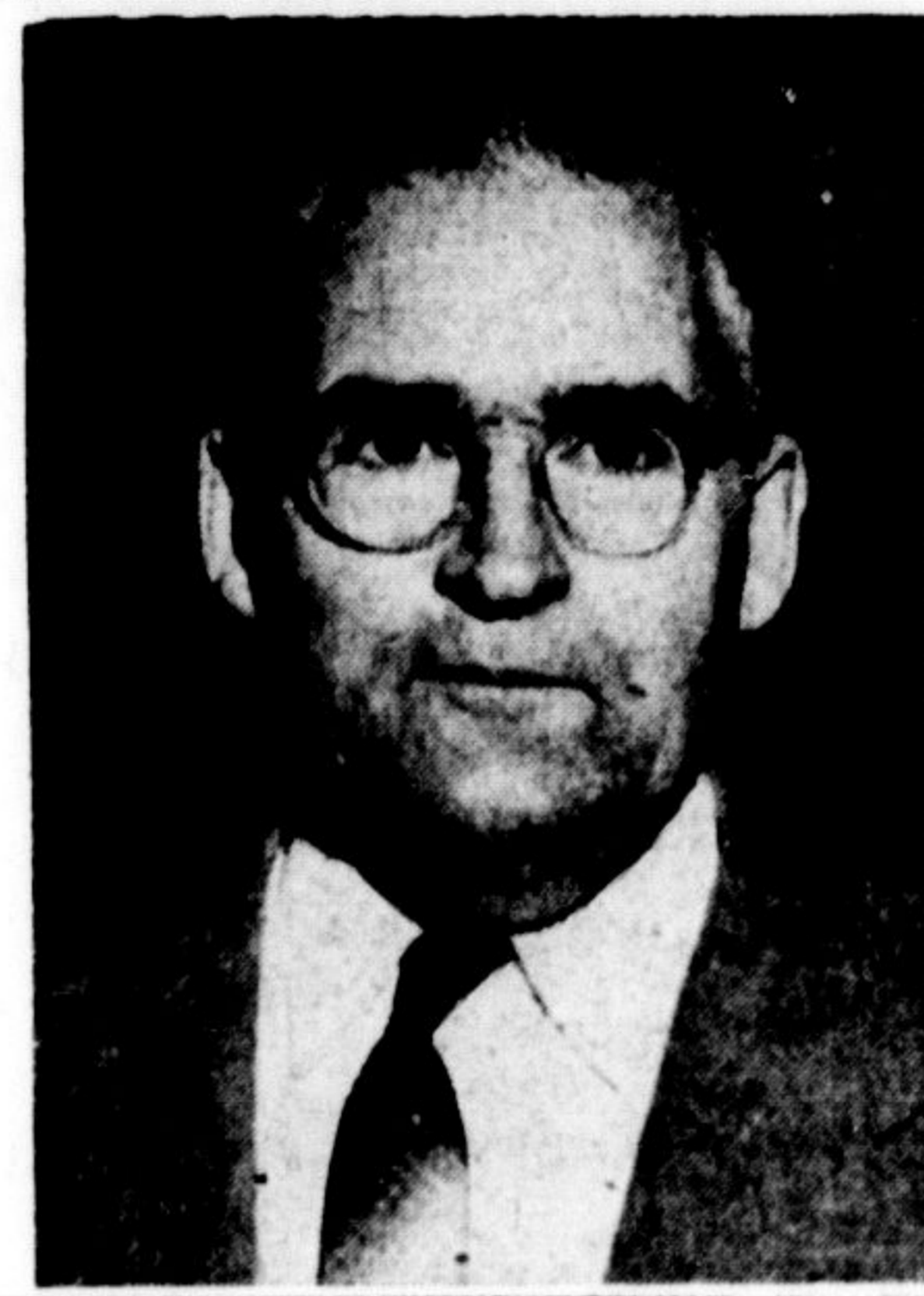

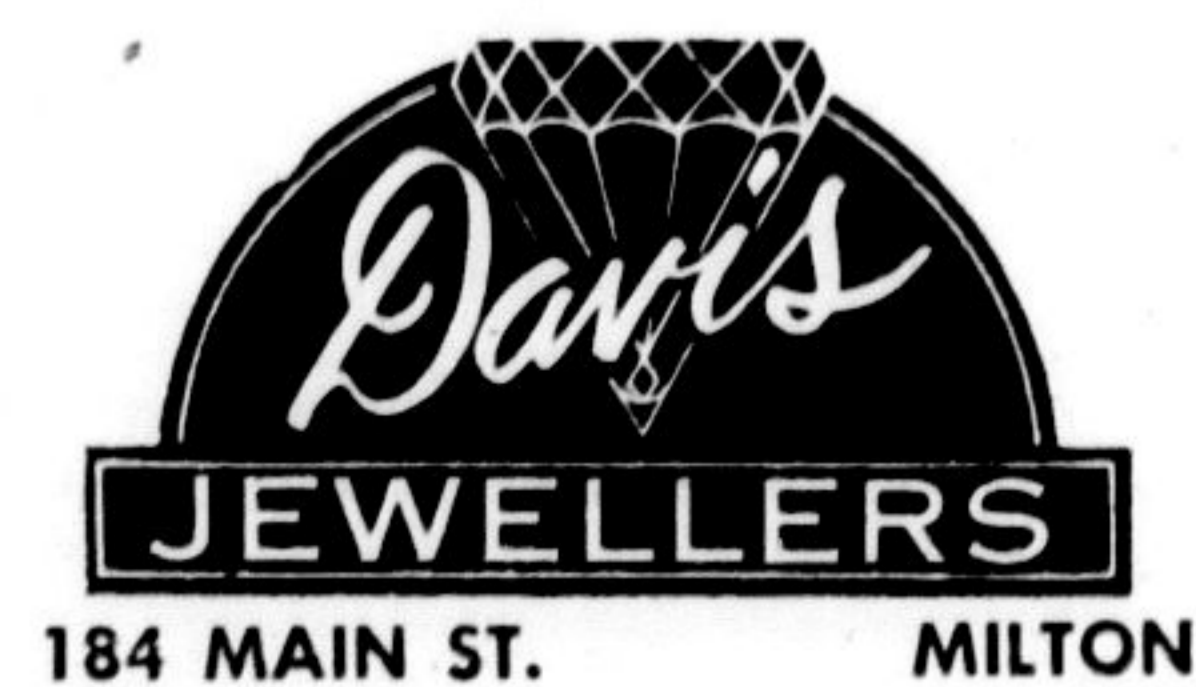

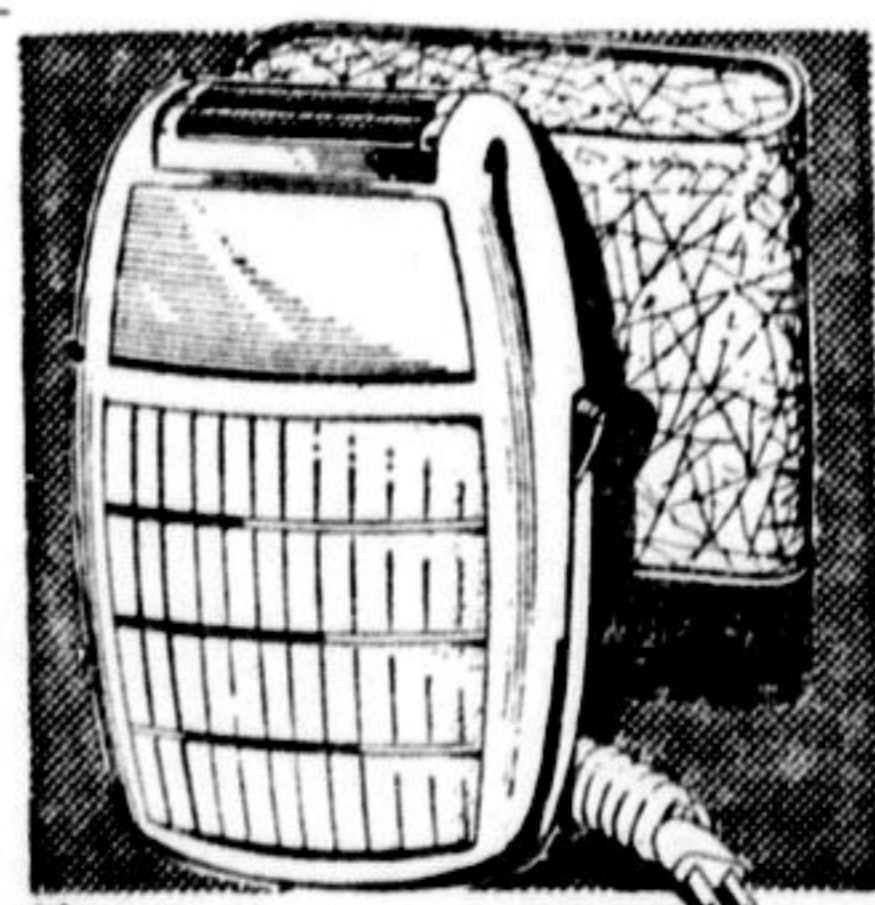
