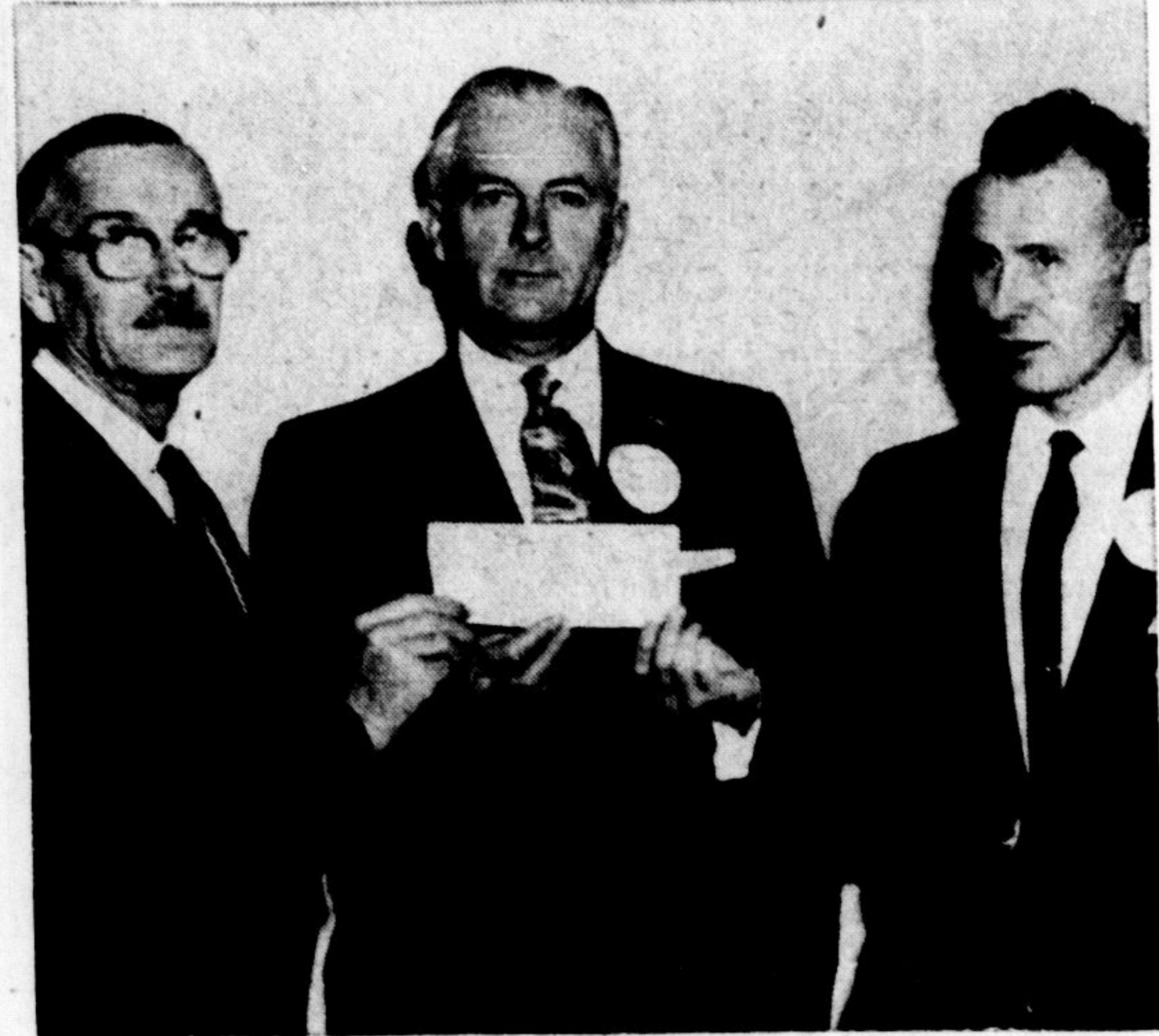
is almost the opposite. It is wonderful that there are so many converts. There are many problems to solve.
