BLOWER OR BRAKER?

Some wise apple once cracked that the general run of pedestrians was entirely too slow. Bet he was one of those guys who uses his horn to make up for poor driving abilities. Speaking of horn blowers I guess the city once most famous for this ear-shattering offense was Paris, France. Paris taxi drivers have even been regaled in song for their horn leaning and erratic driving habits.

But when the traffic toll began to soar even higher the gendarmes decided that Paris drivers would henceforth have to start leaning on their brakes and not their horns. So they outlawed the blowing of those famous horns.

There was a great difference of opinion about this... as a lot of people thought the accident rate would climb even higher. After all, a horn blast was at least a warning to run for cover.

But surprisingly, the anti-horn decree has the opposite effect. Although, at the time, the number of vehicles in Paris was increasing by almost 8,000 a month—the number of accidents after the ban-on-blowing dropped as much as 25 percent.

That was the average for all types of streets accidents... and the number of accidents to motorists decreased an astonishing 32 per cent.

So, whenever I'm deafened by horn-happy motorists I can't help wondering if we shouldn't take a page from the reformed French. Of course, there are times when horn blowing is an essential safety device... but it seems to me that more of us could break bad horn habits and use the brakes instead.

## Rams Manage 9-9 Tie Queenston Edges C.T.C.

The Oakville Red Rams came up with one of their best showings of the year in the first game of Industrial league hockey Thursday night and almost took a win from the front running P. L. Robertson club. They were ahead 9-7 with less than five minutes to go in the game but couldn't hang on as the Robertson sharpies came through with a pair of goals to tie the count.

In the other game of the evening, 13 more goals were scored for a total of 31 on the night with Queenston Motors of Hamilton the winners in a 7-6 contest that saw Burlington CTC's come from behind four times in the game only to lose out by a single Queenston goal in the third period.

**Robertson's Luck**
