**Standards of Teachers in Hands Of Government, Assembly Told**

Delegates to the annual Christmas Assembly of the Ontario Public School Men Teachers' Federation were told it was time they wrestled control of the standards of the teacher from the hands of the government.

The three-day assembly concluded Wednesday evening of last week in Toronto. Guest speaker at the annual dinner was Arnold Edinborough, television panelist on Fighting Words and editor of Saturday Night.

"The government controls you," he told the delegates, "and tells you what standards you must have to be a teacher. I commend to you to do some real housecleaning to bring true professionalism to your organization."

Some 155 men gave up half their Christmas holidays to represent 7,000 fellow men teachers and discuss educational matters of vital concern for the pupils and schools of the province of Ontario.

**NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO THE LEGISLATURE**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Corporation of the Town of Oakville and the Corporation of the Township of Trafalgar intend to apply to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario for an Act:

(a) Establishing a joint public utilities commission consisting of five members of whom two are to be elected at large by the electors of Oakville and two to be elected at large by the electors of Trafalgar and the fifth (the chairman) to be appointed by the elected members or in default of such appointment to be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

(b) Entrusting to the Commission the control and management of the water production and distribution systems of both municipalities and of the electricity supply system of Oakville and of a part of all of that of Trafalgar as may be appropriate after a study thereof by the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario, giving to the Commission the control and management of other public utilities and like services in the two municipalities whenever such may be entrusted by by-laws passed concurrently by both municipalities.

(c) Providing for the payment of operating and capital costs of the Commission insofar as they are not provided out of the rates charged by it and for the construction of future capital works by the Commission and the provision of the money required therefor by the two municipalities in proportion to their respective assessments or as may be otherwise agreed between them or ordered by The Ontario Municipal Board.

(d) Governing the establishment of rates to be charged by the Commission for the services supplied by it and the application of its revenues and generally regulating the operations of the Commission and giving it the powers necessary to enable it to control and manage the public utilities and other services entrusted to it in the interest of the inhabitants of both municipalities.

To encourage top grade 13 students to enter the teaching profession, the federation decided to offer eight scholarships of \$500 each to male students attending Provincial Teachers' Colleges. Loans bearing only two per cent interest are also available for student teachers.

Chairman of the various sessions was Robert L. Ship of South Porcupine. New president elected for 1960 is David G. Dewar, Scarborough. Vice-presidents are George H. Waldrum, Guelph and Garnet L. McDiarmid, Richmond Hill.

Elected to the provincial executive and the board of governors of the Ontario Teachers' Federation were Thomas E. Bedford, Trenton; Howard E. Gillies, St. Catharines; E. Cecil Longmuir, Toronto; Sylvio S. Sauro, Etobicoke and W. Earl Sparks, Simcoe.

The federation awarded its annual Meritorious Award to Vernon N. Ames, former superintendent of public schools in Hamilton.

Federation members also decided to set up their own credit union on a provincial basis, and to investigate establishing their own medical program.
