## Easter Juvenile Tournament Here

An executive was set up recently to study the idea of holding the juvenile hockey tournament (that was so successful in its initial start last year) for a second time this Easter.

Plans were formulated and although arenas in this area noted their intention of vying for the honor of holding the tourney, the event will nevertheless be held back in Milton for another year. This was made possible with the okaying of the idea by the arena board here, in which an arrangement for payment of the use of the arena was set up.

The Easter weekend tourney will again be limited to 20 entries which will be battling for one of three honors, the "A" Division trophy, the "B" division trophy or the Consolation award. The latter grouping was added this year to give the clubs competing more of an interest in the affair and the club which wins its first game in the tournament but loses its second start will be allowed into the consolation round.

**Only Eight to Go**

To date 12 entries have been received by convener Art Snarr with teams from Burlington, Georgetown, Brampton, Elmira, and Oakville entered in the "A" group. In the "B" group Port Dover, Aylmer, Hespeler, Paris, Collingwood and our own Milton club have made entries. Last year 37 teams made application into the tourney which was held in aid of the Listowel tragedy in which seven pee wee hockey players and the recreation director were killed when the arena roof collapsed. The event proved so popular that it is being held again this year and it is the only juvenile tournament held in Canada.

Simcoe won the top title last year with Milton taking the "B" honor. The two clubs met in a battle Saturday night for the top team and after several hundred fans had been in the rink in the two days of 15 games, a good amount returned for the final battle.

April 14, 15 and 16 are the dates set with a Thursday night start getting things rolling. Hockey is scheduled all day Friday and Saturday.
