McGibbon Herd Places Second

A herd of Shorthorns owned by A. H. McGibbon of R.R. 3, Milton, placed as runner-up in the "A" Division of the National Herd Competition sponsored by the Canadian Dual Purpose Shorthorn Society.

The award was announced at the recent annual meeting in Guelph. It placed the McGibbon entry second to a Quebec entry. The 17 cows produced an average of 8,198 lbs. of milk.

J. E. Whitelock Addresses Club

The Halton Jersey Cattle Breeders' Club held their annual meeting at the Esqueping Township Hall at Stewarston on Wednesday, January 20. The meeting commenced with the noon banquet at which J. E. Whitelock, former agricultural representative, discussed tour highlights of Arizona and California.

Outlining his trip to the southwestern states, Mr. Whitelock stressed his impressions of the dairy industry in that area. He concluded by making a comparison of the industry in that area with Ontario dairy production.

Additional speakers included James Bremner, secretary of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. Mr. Bremner gave an outline of activities carried on by that association.

The election of officers resulted in Ernest Davies of Guelph, R. R. 4, being elected as president. Don Matthews of Acton was elected first vice-president, and Bruce Nixon, Norval, second vice-president. J. A. Francis, agricultural representative for Halton county, was appointed secretary.

The 1960 4-H club work in Halton County has started with the organization of a 4-H Forestry Club. One of the purposes of the Forestry Club is to demonstrate forestry management practices as they apply to farms in the county.

The club program is under the direction of D. E. Jackson, assistant agricultural representative, and R. C. Cunningham, zone forester of the Ontario Department of Land and Forests. Club leader for the project is David Murray, field officer with the Twelve and Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authorities.

R. Cunningham Speaks
At the second meeting of the club held on Thursday evening, January 21, R. Cunningham discussed shelter belts and windbreaks, the handling of trees for planting and various planting methods.

As a project, the club member will establish a plantation, or shelter belt, or mark the farm woodlot for management practices.

Committee Formed

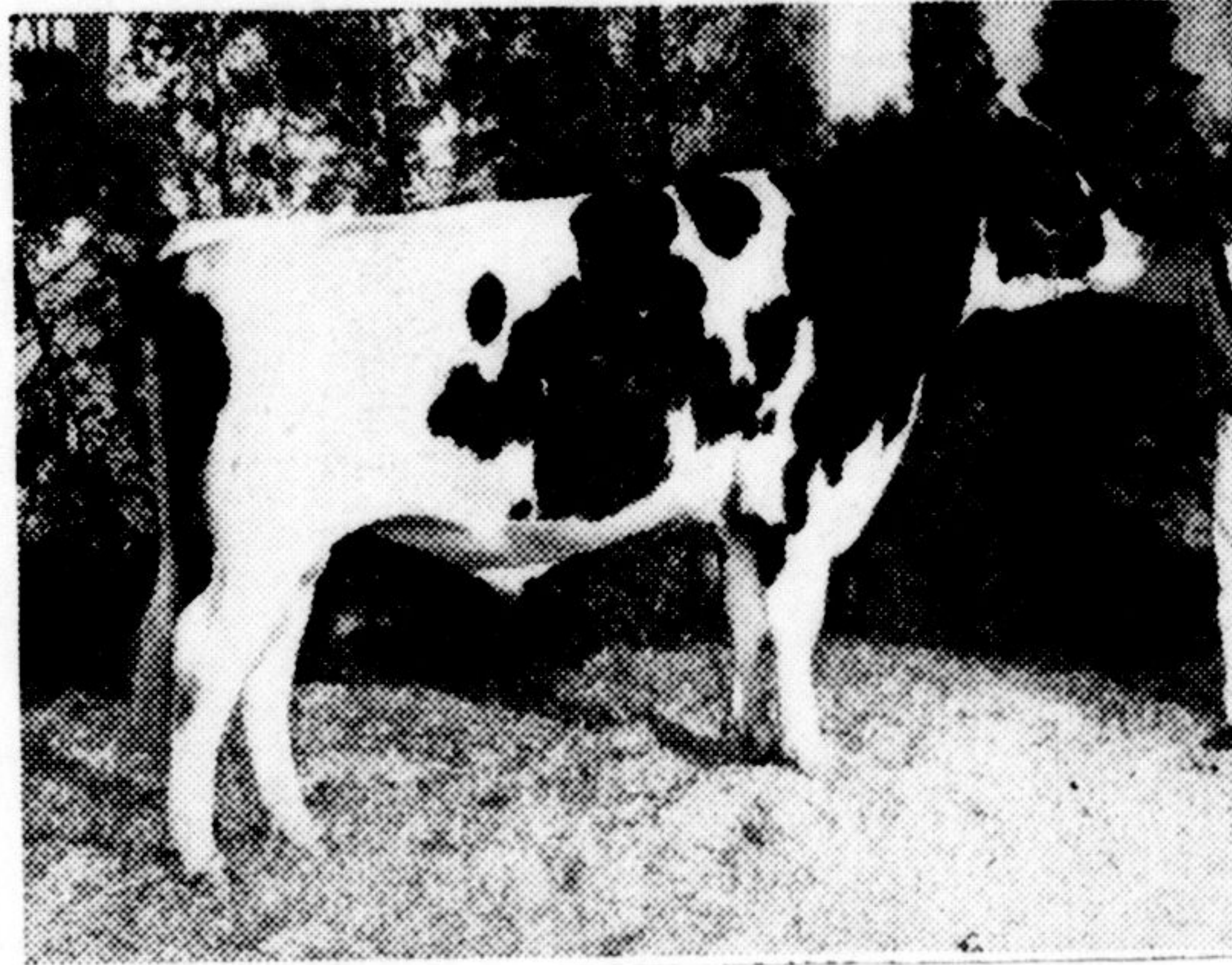
A Valentine Dance is planned for February 13.

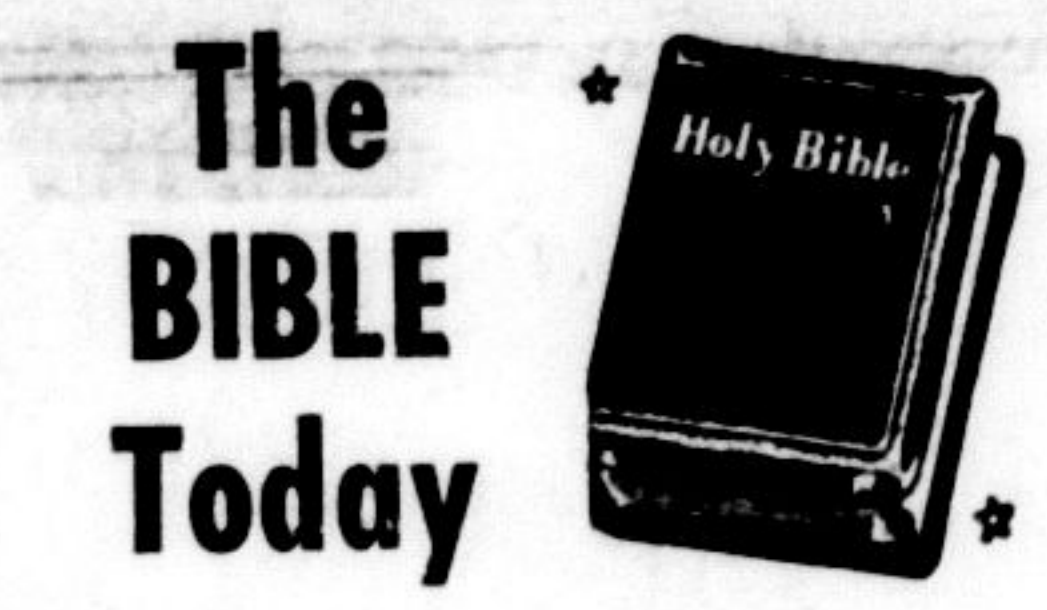
Cheerful Staff

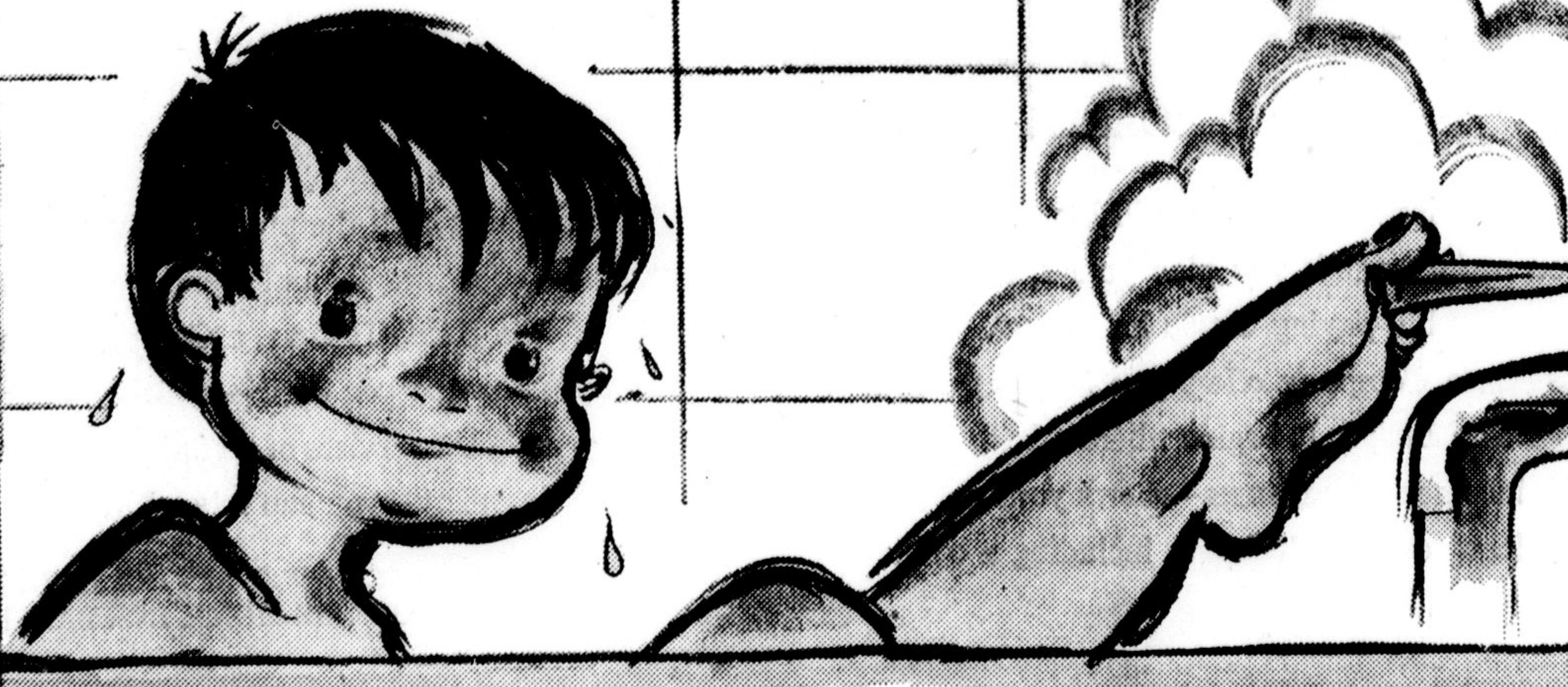
