Big Expansion in Six Years

The move is just one new note of expansion for the company which began its Milton operation with 6,000 square feet of space six years ago. When the office is completed, the expansion over the past six years will have upped this total to 13,000 square feet. Main feature of the new office will be a large laboratory with all the latest, up-to-date apparatus. The old laboratory was gutted by fire about three weeks ago and has since been out
