Town Budget in Two Weeks

Architects Plan School for Deaf

The provincial school for the deaf at Milton is now in the hands of architects, it was announced Monday from Queen's Park by the Hon. John Robarts, Ontario Minister of Education.

"Procrastination"

The Minister made the statement when Reg Gisbourn (C.C.F. Wentworth East) scolded the Department for "procrastination" on the project. Mr. Robarts said the architects are now drawing plans. The site of the school—the Kingdon farm on Ontario St. just south of Hulton Centennial Manor—was chosen last year.

No date was given for start of construction of opening of the school.

No Predictions

There were no predictions on just how much of an increase Milton ratepayers might face until presentation of the budget. Last year's rate was 62 mills for residential and 65 mills for industrial and commercial.

Main increases in the 1960 budget would cover education, Councillor Charlton noted, with both the high school and public school budgets increased over the last year.

The town auditor was expected this week to review last year's operations, prepare the annual audit report and assist in preparation of the 1960 budget.

Collect \$850 Mel Brown Fund

The Mel Brown family Relief Fund at Kilbride hit the \$850 mark this week as more collections were turned in and many officials and groups gave financial support for the family which was burned out of their Kilbride home two weeks ago.

More Donations

There are still collections to be made in the district and a few more large donations are expected. The L.A. of the Girl Guides raised \$100 at a dance Friday night and this Friday another dance is planned by the Kilbride Recreation Club. The Cedar Springs community donated \$95 and Mr. Roda a former employee of Mr. Brown, gave a \$100 donation.

Contributions could still be sent to Mrs. George Hardsand, fund treasurer, at Kilbride.

C.N.R. Will Cut Passenger Runs

Mayor Childs reported to Milton Council Monday night that passenger service on the C.N.R. line would be discontinued.

The mayor explained meetings with railway officials revealed a loss of \$42,200 in passenger service on the line since last year with passengers averaging four travelling north and six south.

Councillor Charlton recalled the time when there used to be five passenger trains a day on the C.N. line, as members agreed that method of travel was not as popular now as the automobile.

Mayor Childs noted plans were being made for installation of a double track on the line to connect with the marshalling yards north of Brampton.

Plans were announced this week for a new office building for the Canadian Felling Zinc Oxide plant, Milton. Company manager Glyn Roberts said tenders would be called this week and construction should be underway in April for occupancy later this summer.

Big Expansion in Six Years

The move is just one new note of expansion for the company which began its Milton operation with 6,000 square feet of space six years ago. When the office is completed, the expansion over the past six years will have added this total to 13,000 square feet.

Main feature of the new office will be a large laboratory with all the latest, up-to-date apparatus. The old laboratory was gutted by fire about three weeks ago and has since been out of use.

Brick with Glass Front

The building will be brick with glass-in front, and accommodate one large general office, laboratory, washrooms and three smaller offices. Size is 45 x 30 feet with 11 foot ceilings. Architects are Parrott, Taming and Witmer, Toronto.

Thousands of Voices in Song 29th Music Festival Arrives

Thousands of voices will ring out with song on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday of next week throughout the whole North Hulton area, as pupils from town and country schools compete in the 29th annual music festival.

For rural schools, the preliminaries have been set for Tuesday for Esqueving Township, at Stewarttown hall; for Nassagaweya township, at Brookville hall.

Their final competition will be held Friday at the Robert Little school, Acton, all day.

Urban schools (including Acton, Milton, Glen Williams, Norval,

Campbellville and Stewarttown) will hold their finals at the Robert Little school, Acton on Wednesday. Then on Friday evening, a festival concert of winners will be presented at the same school.

Dr. Leslie Bell has been invited to adjudicate the three competitions which will also be held that evening.

The above dates cover only North Hulton schools. The South Hulton finals will be held every day from Monday to Thursday, with a festival concert in the T. A. Blake school on Friday evening.

\$323,000 Kelso Dam Project To Receive Further Council Study

Milton Council's participation in the \$323,000 Kelso Dam Project of the Sixteen Mile Creek Conservation Authority was held over a week for further discussion when members learned their share in the project over the next two years would be \$21,770.

The breakdown suggested about \$1,200 would be required in 1960 with the balance the following year. Clarification was to be sought on the break-down. The project calls for construction of an 800 foot dam to flood 80 acres of land on a site north-west of Milton. It would increase by four times the summer flow in the Sixteen through Milton.

Study Park Plan

The Parks Committee was instructed to study possible plans for ratepayer-town co-operation on developing the park area in Kingsleigh Court and evolve a plan that could be applied in other sections as well. The action following interest expressed by Kingsleigh Court ratepayers to the Recreation Committee, in improving the park in that section of the town.

The Road committee was to report further on a drainage problem in Fallingbrook and suggest a plan that would protect the road from flooding.

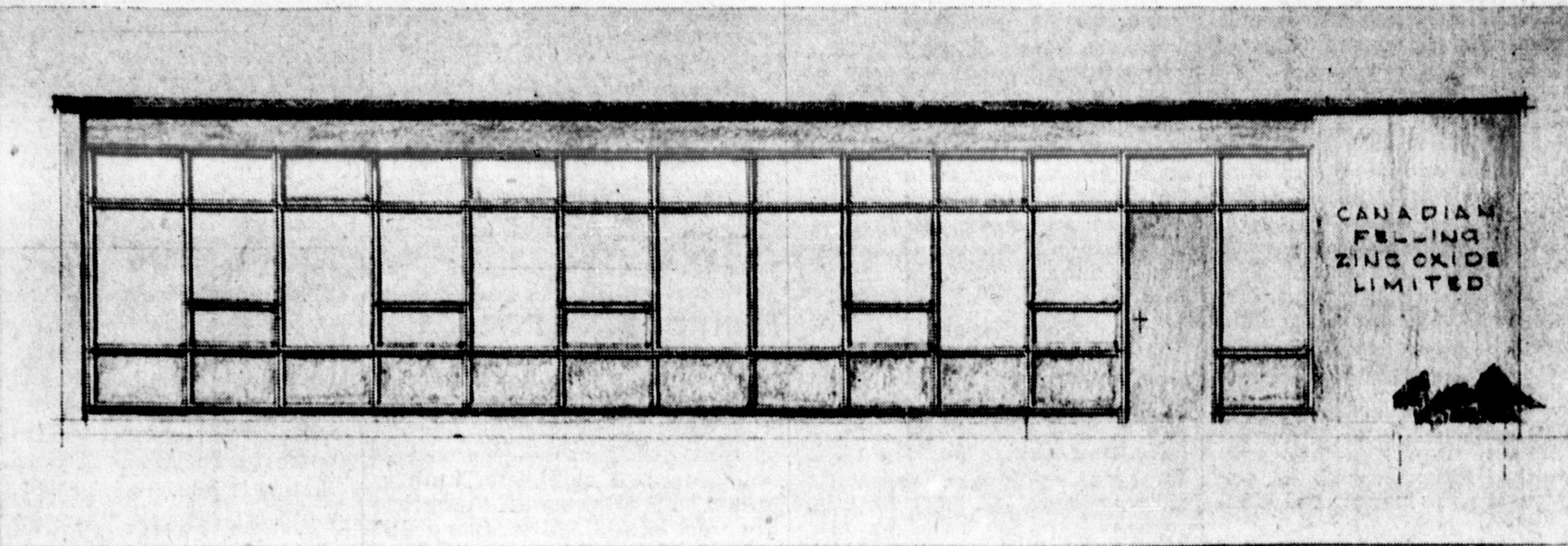
Study Garbage Collection

Councillor Charlton asked the sanitation committee to study the costs of the town garbage collection system. He noted the annual charge was between \$21,000 and \$22,000 and he wondered if some economies could be effected. He praised the service in effect.

Ratepayers Demand Fire Hall in Kilbride

Members of the Upper Burlington Citizens' Forum are upset about inadequate fire protection in the Lowville-Kilbride area.

"We are paying for fire protection and getting nothing for our money," a ratepayer charged Monday night at a meeting of the Forum. "It is a useless trip for any fire department to come to us—they cannot get here in time to save anything," the charge continued.

Still Eyeing Go-Kart Racing

Esqueving Township may not be the scene of Go-Kart racing, it appears, as council last week held off a decision on granting the Georgejown Go-Kart club permission to use a site near Glen Williams. A petition against the club was received, bearing the names of most residents of the district, who objected to possible noise, traffic and Sunday nuisance.

A second application for permission to allow a commercial race track owner a licence, has been dropped.

Dogs Loose

Norval school board complained to council that dogs were running loose around the school and asked action. The matter is to be investigated.

Council should group the three fire area charges (Acton, Milton and Georgetown) and average the tax rate on the total, clerk K. C. Lindsay told council. He said the three areas now pay different rates, according to the town's fire budgets. He said he felt this could also be applied to the three high school areas.

\$78,000 for Roads

The township's road expenditures for 1960—\$78,000—will be \$53,000 for maintenance and \$25,000 for construction. A by-law was approved for subsidy purposes.

Council agreed to paying up to \$1,000 as a share of lights at Hornby Ball Park. Road employees were granted a five cents an hour raise, effective February 1, 1960.

Milton area fire brigade, but firemen couldn't get to fires soon enough after a call. The Burlington brigade only comes as far north as the No. 5 sideroad.

The association executive recently suggested that the old Kilbride School could be inexpensively converted to a fire hall and equipment could be manned by area volunteers. One day after the suggestion was made, a Kilbride house burned to the ground and members stated it took 17 minutes for the Milton fire truck to arrive. President G. F. Harshman explained he wrote council to see if a hall could be arranged, but council had turned down the request.

"Not Good"

"We should keep this subject alive... the cost would be quite heavy to start with but I think it is important to all the people in this area to have good fire protection," stated executive member George Brenholtz. "It is not good fire protection if the brigade has to come from Milton."

"We get the poorest protection and we pay the most money," said the president. "If you have a fire in your house, you might as well just walk outside and take pictures of it," he added. "The firemen have to come seven miles. They try their best, but it is an impossibility," he said.

Collect Funds

Member William Watson asked why the Forum couldn't take a collection and turn it over to council as a start on a new hall. "Make them realize how badly we need it," he said.

The only objection was raised by V. McArthur, who warned against increasing the tax rate any more than the present figure. "We're already beefing about the mill rate... to build a fire hall would cost a lot," he said.

Members agreed to have the executive continue pressing the council, in hopes some action might be taken by next year.

Hydro at Lowville

Word that a new hydro station would be built at Lowville and provide better power service to the district was welcomed at the meeting. Earlier, members had complained to the Burlington P.U.C. that frequent blackouts were annoying, and the town officials blamed the breaks on the Milton station.

Improvement in dangerous curves, narrow bridges and culverts and roads was urged by the Forum, to provide safer school bus routes for the children. Members

The meeting approved the appointment of Earl Black as the auditor for the association.
