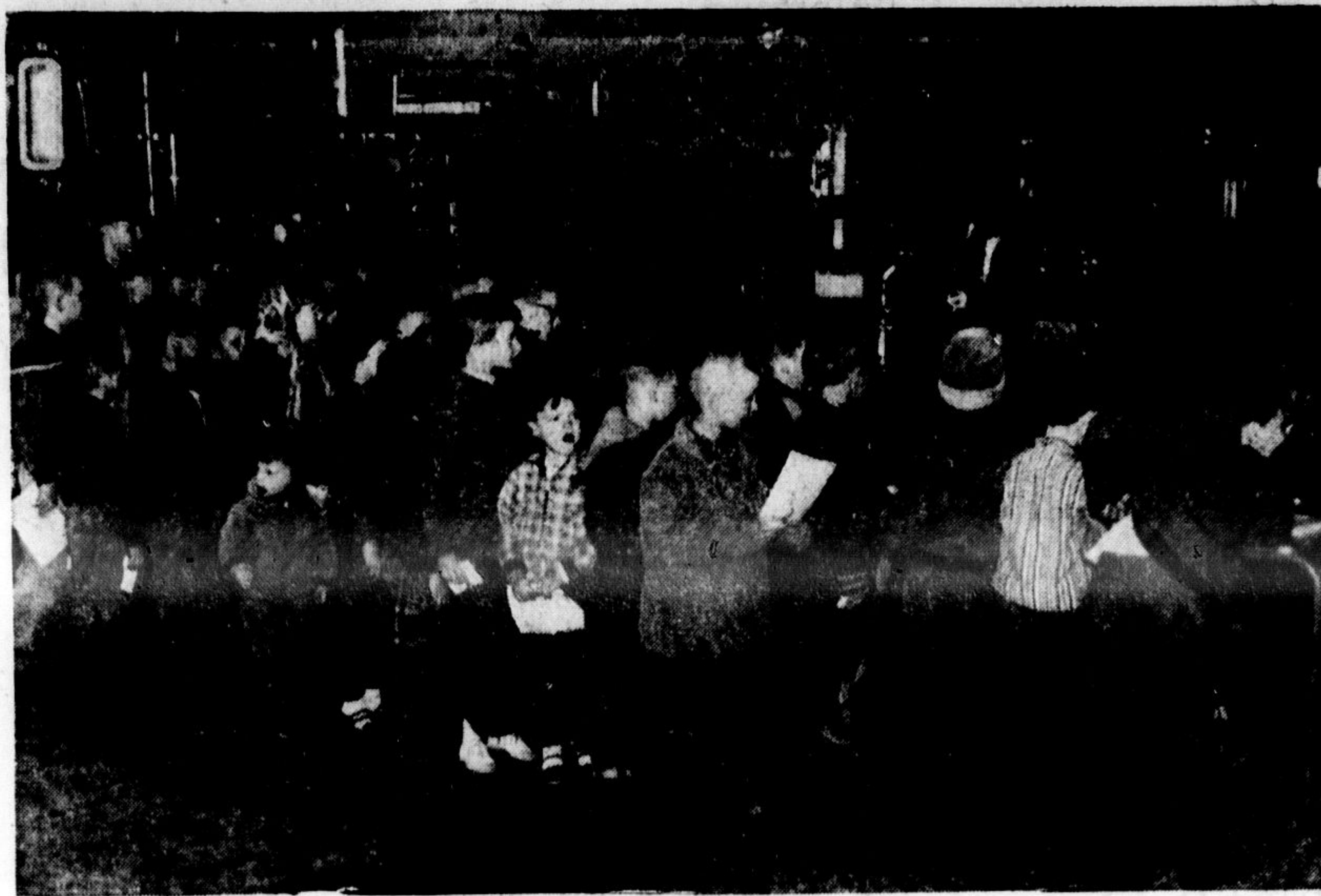

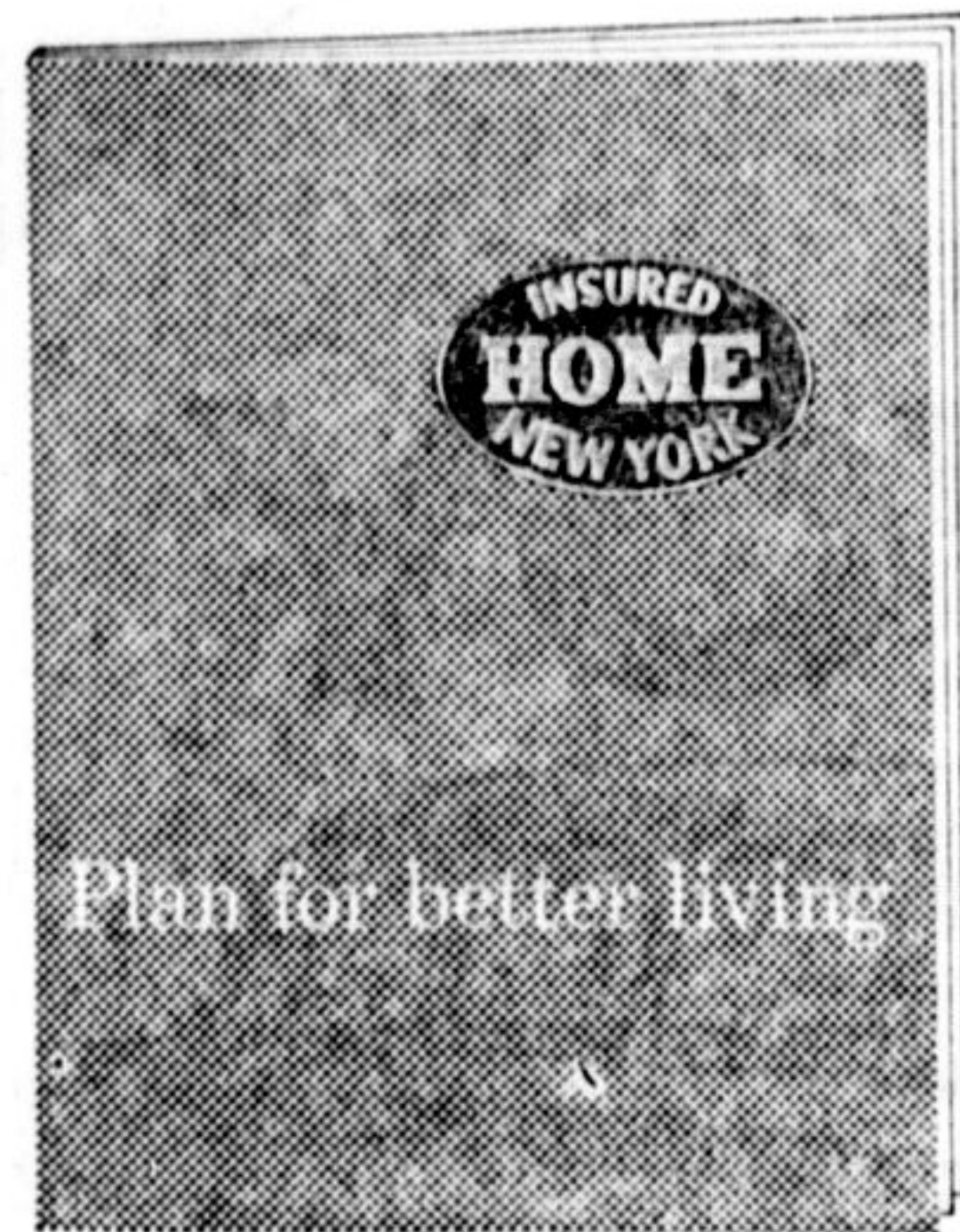
Women's Travel Authority
Really effortless touring depends on good driving habits becoming so ingrained that they are as automatic as breathing. But before your driving habits are formed, try to eliminate those common everyday faults which experts say are among the most frequent causes of accidents. Here they are:
(1) Failure to reduce speed on streets lined with parked cars.
(2) Entering an intersection the instant the lights turn green, without looking.
(3) Depending on the driver ahead to signal what he intends to do.
(4) "Tailing" the car ahead too closely.
(5) Relying on just the rear-view mirror when making a turn.

(6) Turning up the right lights to "get even" with an approaching driver who has his headlights on full.



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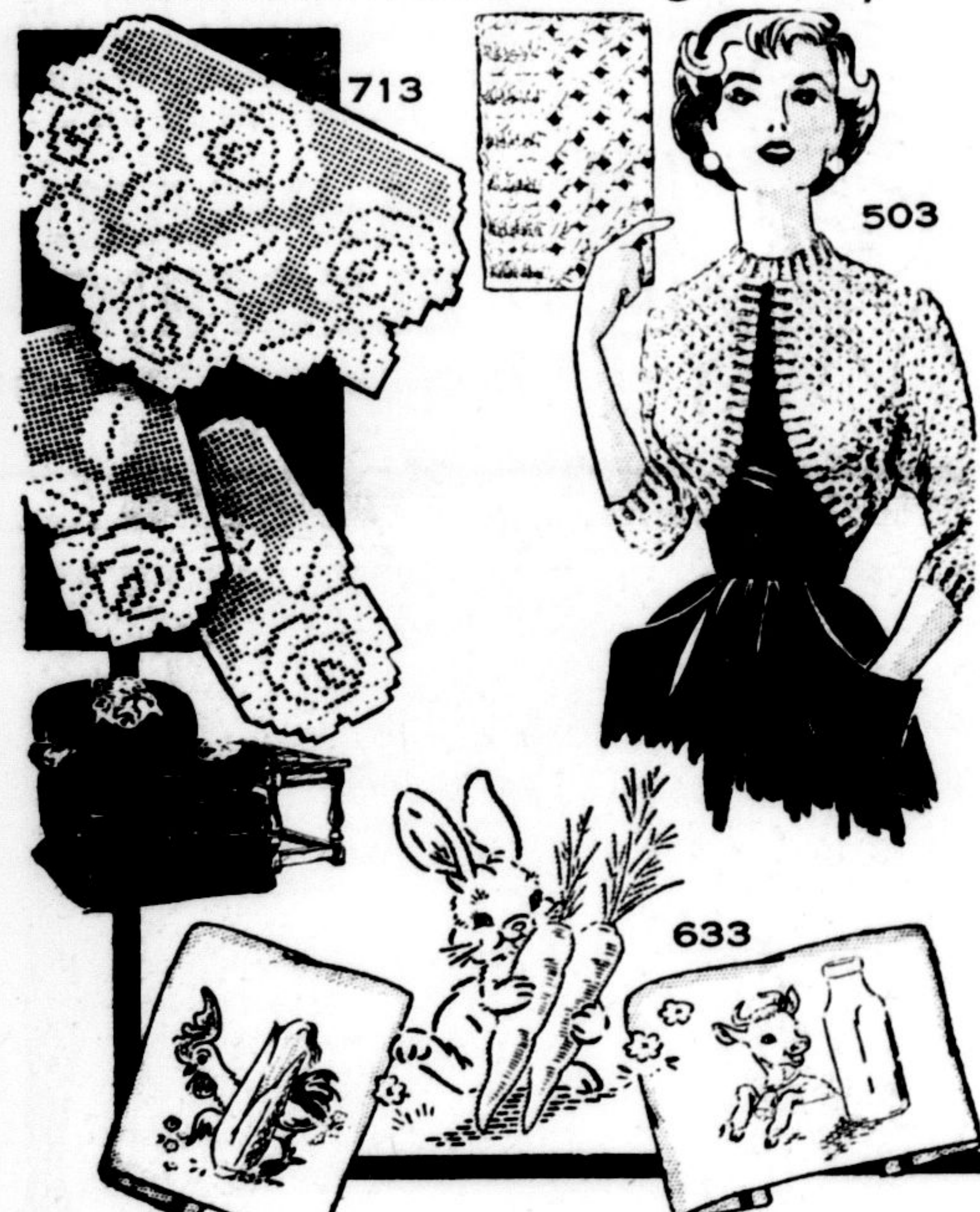
