John R. Beckett Palermo Realtor

Funeral services were held in the chapel of the Robinson Funeral Home Tuesday for John R. Beckett of Palermo. Mr. Beckett, Hamilton district realtor and former bakery operator died at his home Friday at the age of 82. Burial was in White Chapel Memorial Gardens.

Owned Bakery

Born in Wainfleet, Ont., Mr. Beckett operated a bakery in Hamilton near the turn of the century. He sold out to Canada Bread and later moved with his family to Winona, where he operated Dairy Bread from 1930 to 1934.

He moved to Ancaster in 1934 and entered the real estate business, which he continued until his death. He moved to Palermo in 1945.

Mr. Beckett was a member of Philipott Memorial Church in Hamilton.

SUPPLIES LOW

If you haven't bought your seed potatoes yet — better not wait any longer. Seed supplies are pretty low in Ontario, especially the B and C sizes, says G. R. Johnston, potato researcher at the O.A.C. This means prices will be on the rise in the next few weeks. When Ontario's seed supply runs out, seed potatoes have to be shipped in from P.E.I., where supplies are still good.

SALMON STIR
A fish caught in Lake Ontario and brought into Picton has been identified by officials of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests as an Atlantic salmon. It weighed 15.9 pounds and measured 35 inches from snout to tail-tip. Its age was placed at four years. The catch, made by commercial fisherman Glen Van Cott, has created considerable stir among biologists of the department who for many a year have tried to restock the salmon in the lake where they were once very common. Actually, the first public fish feeding station in North America was created in 1866 at Newcastle to stop the decline of the fish by stocking, but all efforts failed. As recently as 1945, efforts to stock Dunst's Creek at Pickering, 25 miles east of Toronto, failed to restore a spawning population.

have started a minor fire at the home of A. Restivo, 375 Main St. on Friday morning. Fire Chief A. E. Clement said about \$100 damage was caused. Mrs. Ethel Geneaux was the tenant.

Trigger Committee

County Asks Building Report

Halton County Council triggered its county buildings committee into a definite action when it requested Tuesday that the committee report next month on either temporary accommodation for overcrowded courthouse employees, or a long-range plan for future expansion of the county buildings.

Esquering Reeve Cam Sinclair touched off a heated discussion when he asked what progress the committee had made on a new building. (Last year's attempt to locate the proposed new administration building in Victoria Park was unsuccessful.)

Buy Home

Milton Reeve Art Desjardine explained the committee had studied the purchase of a Milton house with ample accommodation to last for another five years. Price, he said, was \$35,000 with another \$10,000 earmarked to renovate the home to the county's use.

An attempt to have a new special committee study the matter was overruled when Milton Deputy-Reeve Mrs. M. Pettit said it would embarrass the building committee by taking their power away from them. Council told the committee to keep working on the problem.

No Support

Burlington Reeve F. I. Ryck-

man objected to the Milton member (Reeve Desjardine) sitting on committee when Milton property was involved, but councillors gave no support to the move.
