age resulting from an accident at Parkway and Ontario St. when a driver reportedly swerved to miss pot holes. The correspondence was referred to the municipality's insurance company.

Recommend Warning
The Board of Warning Commissioners reported that following an accident at the Bronte St. C.P.R. crossing the Board's district director had investigated and recommended consideration of warning signals for the crossing.

Council agreed to investigate the cost of the installation and the cost sharing involved. They also instructed investigation of the installation of warning signals at the Ontario St. four track crossing.

Council approved the questionnaire from the Department of Planning and Development that had been partially completed on the west entrance to town. The plan covers areas in Milton and Trafalgar and council dealt only with that section in the town.

A damage claim of \$135.60 from Alex. Tonelli was approved following a drain backing up. The insurance company had denied the claim arguing the damage had been caused by an occurrence and not an accident. A culvert had not been replaced and the company suggested the town had taken a calculated risk

in not replacing the culvert. Heavy rains had occurred and the water backed up.

Council took no action on the plan of the C.N.R. to discontinue passenger service on the Milton line. Members noted they had received no complaints regarding the reported cancellation with the exception of the one expressed the previous week.

The streets and walks committee was instructed to study the town's method of patching the hard top roads that some of the bumps might be removed before applying the asphalt mix.

Outlines Route

Councillor Wilson outlined the proposed route of an industrial tour through Milton and an expenditure of \$50 was approved as Milton's share of the project initiated by the Oakville-Trafalgar Chamber of Commerce.

Councillor Wilson reported costs were being investigated on the installation of a sidewalk on Ontario St. from the Halton Manor to the existing sidewalk on one of the east-west streets.

The councillor also reported several loads of fill were being placed in front of a Barton St. property to alleviate a flooding problem.

Mayor Childs expressed the town's commendation to the Milton or Hockey team that had won the consolation class in the recent Huntsville Tournament.
