

New High School's Completion, Use, Teacher Appointments Occupy Board

Finishing of the new Milton District High School, use of the gymnasium for a high school dance this week, acceptance of four staff resignations and appointment of seven new teachers occupied the main portion of the regular meeting of the Milton District High School Board on Tuesday evening.

John Noble, Board inspector on the new high school construction reported the contractor was awaiting the final inspection of the architect. He noted the basketball back boards were being installed and the balance of the building was completed.

Use of Gym

The need to get permission from the contractor to allow use of the gymnasium and service facilities by the Student Council for an annual dance was discussed. The secretary was to contact the contractor asking permission but noting this permission was not to be taken as the Board's acceptance of the school as complete.

Temporary parking facilities were to be arranged and any necessary supervisory personnel was to be engaged.

Staff resignations were accepted from W. D. Coates, Lawrence Darby, Michael Haza and John Lutendorf.

Appointments confirmed included Phillip Caddick as shop teacher in conjunction with Aetion at a salary of \$7,000 to be shared; Edward T. Price, a science specialist with six years experience at \$5,700; Lionel Magnam, to teach French and History a graduate of O.C.E. at \$4,500; Mrs. Barbara Mathewson to teach home economics and girls P.T. with two years experience at \$5,100; George C. E. Pate to teach Latin and French with one year experience at \$5,100; Mrs. Margaret VanGray, a French specialist with six years experience at \$6,300; and Eric M. Neil to teach Geography and History at \$5,600.

Many Specialists

"We've been very fortunate in getting the teachers we have," Chairman C. A. Martin commented. He noted when details were worked out on the proposed timetable it might be necessary to seek two more teachers to complete the staff. "There are some very fine teachers in those we have hired. We have a specialist in almost every department," he explained.

Members agreed to advertise the position of caretaker of the new High School with applications to be received by May 4. An application for the position was ordered filed and the position advertised.

Trustee K. Y. Dick reported a request from a Chamber of Commerce committee on Beautification, for a representative of the Board to assist in the planned town-wide program. Members suggested the project was worthwhile but the campaign would be coming at a time when high school students would be busy with examinations. No representative was named.

Constable Ron Rupert appeared to express the thanks of the Milton Safety Council to the Board for the use of school facilities for a completed driver improvement course. Chairman Martin commented the project was a very worthwhile thing and the board would consider a driver improvement course at the high school if a teacher on the staff had the necessary training.

Praise Caretaker

The chairman reported the school had been broken into and paint spilled on blackboards and damage estimated at \$150 done. Apparently nothing had been stolen. Dr. Martin praised the work of the caretaker in getting the damage cleaned up and the board approved a motion of commendation for the prompt and effective clean up by the caretaker.

Members agreed broken tile in a drain running south off the school property should be replaced since there was no knowledge of what the drain served.

Accounts

Accounts approved for payment totalled \$10,807.11 for operating expenditures and \$34,490.58 from the building fund.

A long term rental agreement covering leasing of 19 typewriters from the Underwood Co. was to be returned as the Board was considering the outright purchase of 34 typewriters.

Seventh Annual

This will be the seventh annual conference since O.A.R.C. was founded by the first 14 local associations organized in Ontario. Composed of parents of retarded children and many others who are concerned with helping them, the local associations developed out of a need for schools and other special facilities tailored to the demands and capabilities of retarded children. About five or six new local associations are being founded in Ontario each year.

Pass Petition In Burlington

A survey on population and assessment was circulated through north-east Burlington this week by members of a group wishing to have a large chunk of rural Burlington annexed to Milton. The group is presently attempting to collect these figures before presentation of a petition to Milton council to annex about 14 square miles from the area, including nearly 1,000 residents.

The petition will be circulated to district ratepayers later, said group chairman Fred Walker.

Tentative boundary of the Burlington section to be annexed is west to the Appleby Line and south to 5 Sideroad, then west to the Guelph Line and south to 10 Sideroad. Trafalgar residents have also asked to be included in the plan.
