Coconut Oatmeal Cookies

1 1/3 cups flaked coconut
1 1/2 cups rolled oats
2/3 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 cup butter or shortening (melted)
1 tsp. salt
1 egg, well beaten

Combine all ingredients thoroughly. Press firmly into a greased 8 x 8 x 2 inch pan.

Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes or until golden brown. Cool in pan and cut into squares. Makes about 20 cookies.

Will Junior Pass or Fail?

"Will Junior pass or fail?" Parents wonder a bit uneasily from time to time. An unsatisfactory term report, a note from the teacher, Junior's own complete lack of enthusiasm for school, his resistance to doing homework regularly and thoroughly may all be danger signals, warnings of the possibility that Junior may have to repeat his school year.

Children in one classroom can vary greatly in their ability. This intellectual ability is rated by IQ (intelligence quotient) tests. If a child is emotionally upset or in poor health his standing may be lower than it normally would be.

Parents should also consider the close relation between a child's mental health and his school standing and do what they can to improve conditions in this field. Sometimes a severe emotional upset will adversely affect a pupil's powers of concentration. Worriers are inefficient workers at anything including school work.

Not infrequently there is a physical cause for low marks. The child may have poor hearing or only partial eyesight. He may be undernourished, or growing too quickly for his strength. A thorough physical examination by a competent doctor is one of the first things parents should plan for. The doctor's suggestions should be followed faithfully.

Colds and other illnesses keep children at home, and if they are ill that is the place for them. Part of a mother's job is to try to keep the family well. She knows that regular attendance at school is an important factor in keeping up with the work and passing into another grade.

Pupils who come from a home where the parents constantly bicker or are threatening to separate are poor "scholarship material." A mother's critical ill health, a father losing his job or becoming a heavy drinker—family situations like these are likely to pull down a child's school standing.

A child's school work is bound to improve if home conditions become more satisfactory. He needs more to go off to school, happy and secure in the knowledge that "things with Mum and Dad are O.K."

A child must have the desire within himself to study. Supervision of homework by parents, coaching after school hours, may all be factors improving a child's school labors. But the drive to apply himself must come from within.

Tips on Touring

A plain six-inch ruler can save you many dollars in costly brake or clutch repairs if you know how to use it.

Now that fair weather is luring us to longer trips, it's a good idea to get that ruler out immediately. And here's what to do, according to automotive experts.

Brake Problems

Press down on your brake pedal. With your ruler, measure the distance your brake goes down before it takes effect. It should be at about two inches. If the measurement is less, your brakes are too tight and need adjusting. If it is appreciably more, your brake lining has probably worn a bit, so brakes need adjusting again. If your foot goes right down to the floorboard before you feel results, chances are your brakes need fluid or relining.

Under any circumstances, it's wise to have the brake fluid in your master cylinder checked every thousand miles and replenished if necessary. Lack of the correct amount of fluid is likely to impair seriously your brake's effectiveness.

Clutch "Play"

The clutch pedal should go down about one-inch on the ruler before it disengages. Less "play" can create a high rate of clutch wear.

You may save yards of money by measuring those inches now.
