A parade led by the Lorne Scots pipe band will move off from Victoria Park at 8.35 a.m. Saturday. They will march east on Main St., then north on Martin St. to the Ontario Steel Products parking lot. The rodeo will commence at 9 a.m. but if rain should occur, it will be postponed for one week.

Bikes as Prizes

Besides the large school trophies and cups, two brand new bikes donated by Milton Sports and Cycle and Canadian Tire will be awarded for the best girl and boy riders. Other prizes will be awarded to the next 10 best competitors. Prizes will be awarded by councillor John Charlton representing town council, and William McGinnis, president of the U.A.W. local 1067, who are sponsoring the six silver cups. The rodeo's administration will be assisted by 20 members of the local union.

Safety Director, O.P.P. Constable Ron Rupert, in reviewing last year's 30 bike fatalities in Ontario, stressed the importance of children learning safe riding habits, as many of the accidents were caused by the children's lack of knowledge of simple safety rules. Ages of the victims ranged from five to 14 years old.

Constable Rupert further emphasized the necessity of teaching our children simple rules of the road as soon as possible. This will help to prepare them for the day when they take the wheel of an automobile.

Safety Council officials noted that parents, by watching the various tests, can get a much better idea of what they should stress in their child's every day bike riding activities. Such enthusiasm in attending will also do much to sharpen the competitors' desire to win.

Brewing Industry Progress Kinsmen Speaker's Subject

Man's progress in the brewing industry over the past 12,000 years was reviewed for Milton Kinsmen and their guests on Monday evening by Jack Duncan of O'Keefe's. Mr. Duncan, who has been a brewer with the company for nearly 25 years and is well versed on the history of beer, presented a detailed story of the industry "since man first thirsted for a more palatable drink than water."

Early Discovery

From the early discovery that barley sprouts made a frothy drink to the current complicated scientific process was termed "tremendous progress" by the witty speaker. References to beer in the Bible, the fact that beer had a part in Egyptian religious rites, the origin of such sayings as "here's mud in your eye," and "getting plastered," price fixing, licensing, inspection, and Canada's first brewery in 1607 were all explained by Mr. Duncan.

"In some 12,000 years of the brewing industry, we are now privileged to consume the best beers that the world has ever seen," he concluded.

Expect Occupancy Of Office in July

Canadian Felling Zinc Oxide Co. is planning to move into its new office building about July 1, said manager Glyn Roberts this week.
