

# Gervais Hurls Red Sox To 8-2 Bronte Victory

Nip Gervais continued his mastery over the Bronte Braves Thursday as he pitched the Milton Red Sox to a 8-2 win in an abbreviated six inning contest at Bronte Park.

Gervais, a slim right hander, had his assortment of pitches working to perfection as he limited the Braves to six hits. He gave up three free passes and was in command all the way.



**Raps Pitchers**  
The Sox jumped on Bronte starter J. Quigley for three runs in the first inning, added another run in the third and had a pair of two run innings in the fifth and sixth. The winners rapped Quigley and his relief man Anderson for 10 hits. The pair gave up six walks and struck out three. Bronte committed three errors and the Red Sox booted two.

Bruce Thomas, Bronte right fielder, got the only extra base hit off Gervais, as his first inning triple drove in McDonald who singled ahead of him. Every batter in the Red Sox lineup with the exception of pitcher Gervais hit safely.

**Big Hitter**  
Stu Hannant with a triple and a single in four trips and Primo Rigo with a pair of sharp singles led the Rex Sox hitters. Nip Gervais laid down a perfect bunt in the fifth inning to score Rigo with the Sox' sixth run.

Several fine catches in the outfield backed up a fine pitching job. Don South hauled down a couple after a long run and centre fielder Doug Cully again provided the fielding gem as he flagged down McDonald's long drive and doubled Orsborne off first base. Orsborne, thinking it a sure hit, was perched on third base when Cully caught the ball.

## Acton Snowed Under 22-0

Jack Roberts, chalking up his second win of the year, scattered five singles as his shut-out was never seriously threatened. He didn't walk a single man, hit one batter and struck out 10.

**Hitless at Last**  
Cunningham, Lindsay and Dore were hit hard over the first five and a third innings when McLaren came in and hurled hitless ball for the last two and a third innings. Between them the Acton hurlers gave up 22 runs off 20 hits. They walked nine, hit one batter and struck out nine.

Campbellville won the game in the first inning when they scored three times on a walk, Henderson's single and Earl Cairns' home run. In the second, they scored six times to stretch the lead to 9-0 as Roberts doubled, Early singled, Henderson homered, Henderson doubled, a couple of walks were thrown in and Laking and Laverne Hamilton singled.

**Upped It to 10-0**  
In the fourth, Campbellville scored again to make it 10-0. Cairns was safe on an error, a walk pushed him to second, a passed ball got him to third and he scored on Laking's single. Three more in the fifth made it 13-0 as Early singled, Wingrove doubled and Henderson and Laverne Hamilton singled.

30,000 in L. Erie Dist. AYLMER WEST, Ont. — On May 16, the first of about 30,000 pheasants will be moved out of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests Normandale Pheasant Farm for eventual release in the Lake Erie district.

These will be day-old chicks to be brooded and raised until they are ready for release by various interested individuals and sportsmen's organizations equipped to give them proper care. Egg production at the pheasant farm was nearing its peak May 2, and about a thousand eggs a day were being collected for incubating.

## Second Loss

### Drop 4-2 Decision to Acton

Campbellville suffered their second defeat of the season on Saturday when they dropped a 4-2 decision to Acton.

Harry Hamilton hit two doubles and a single for Campbellville. Stan Henderson had a double and two singles. Al Wingrove singled twice and Lloyd Early and Denny Eaton each singled once.
