Milton Junior Red Sox added yet another win to their string of victories Monday night when they collected a 6-4 win over Dundas to run their win margin to 11 as compared with only two losses and a tie.

Monday's game lasted only six innings however, as the Dundas manager Roy Ytzen pulled his team off the field in protest of a fly ball which he claimed was foul but had been ruled fair. The umpires then awarded the game to the locals.

**Big Triple**  
Jim Knight was the big man at the bat in Monday's game when he came through with a bases loaded triple in the fifth inning to put the Sox in front after the visitors had jumped into

the lead. John Hopkins was on the hill for the Red Sox and hurled good ball in allowing only five hits in the tilt.

Sunday the Red Sox were defeated for their second loss of the year when Burlington, the only club to do it this year, beat them 5-2.

**Bill Walker**, new hurler with the Milton squad drew the loss with his teammates managing only four hits against the sharp Burlington lineup.

**13 Strikeouts**  
Jim McTavish came through with 13 strikeouts for Burlington to completely stun the locals' bats.

In one of their busiest weeks the Junior Sox played both Wednesday and Thursday night, win-

ning over Carlisle 6-4 and then on Thursday Don Currie pitched them to a 9-7 victory over Waterdown. In both games the Sox had to come from behind to gain the wins after getting off to a shaky start in the opening innings. John Hopkins drew the win Wednesday in allowing only four hits, two each in the first two innings when the home side gathered all their runs.

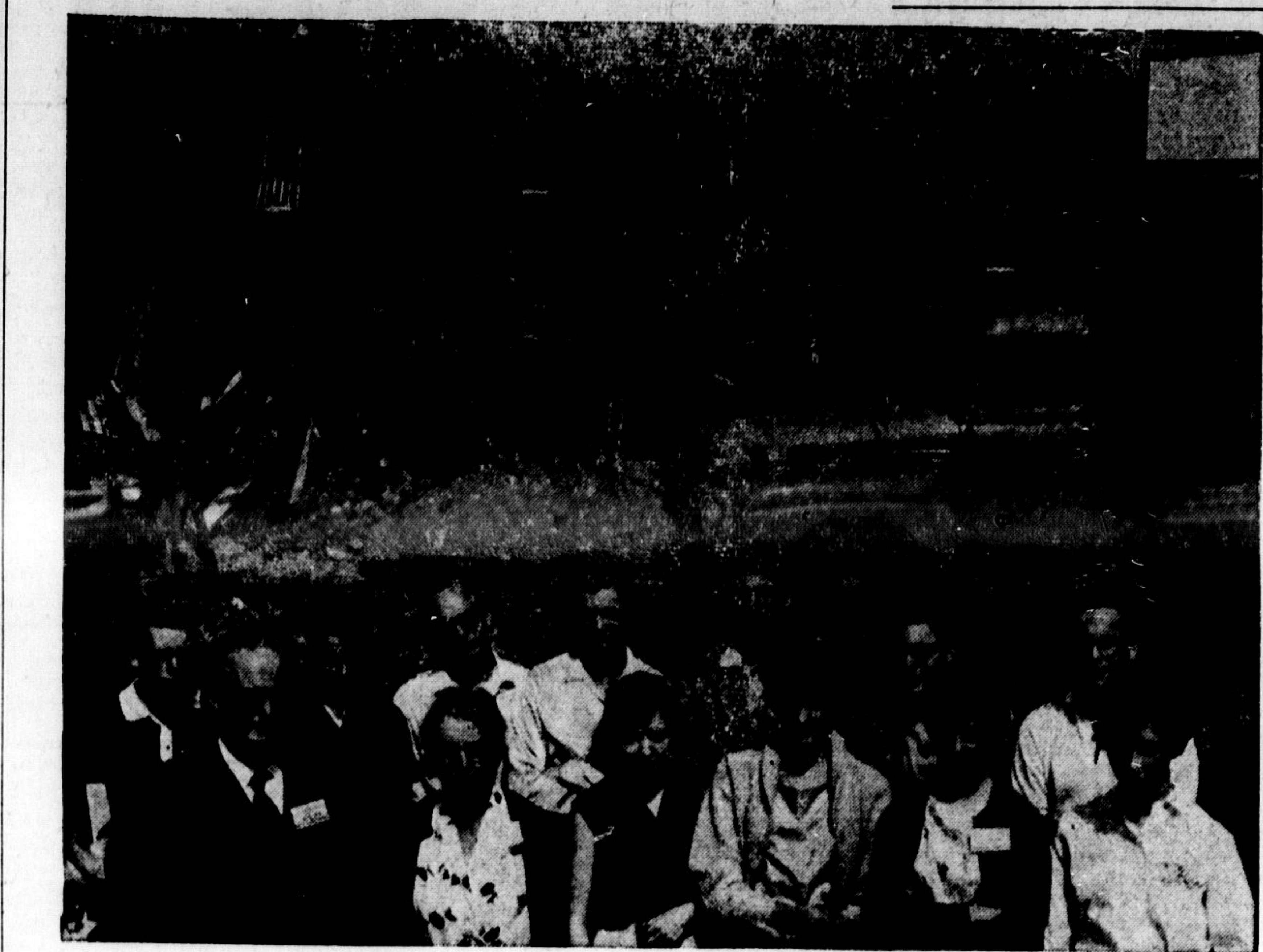
#### Fast Trial

**Only Five Hits**  
The little right-hander Nip Gervais again was the winner, holding Bronte to just three runs on five hits. His mates committed one error behind him. Nip breezed through the early innings and only a two base error by left fielder Don South, and took it just out of reach, caused the first run. Unusually bad control by the right-hander led to the other two runs in the fifth inning when he walked the bases loaded and a good single by Jim Swinn scored the two. A perfect throw by Milton's right fielder Tom Barrett to the plate held Bronte from scoring any more.

Barrett also threw Gary Hughes out at second base with a perfect strike to Ron Shannon as Hughes tried to stretch a single into two bases.

Milton scored two in the first on singles by Doug Culley and Primo Rigo and two walks to Tom Barrett and Stu Hannant. The Sox went down in order in the second and third but erupted for four runs in the fourth on a walk to Don South, an interference call on the Bronte catcher which put Nip Gervais on

base and three consecutive singles by Culley, Hyatt and Hannant.

**Tremendous Homer**  
No runs scored in the fifth but four more in the sixth when a walk to Don South, a single by Wayne Hilson and a fielder's choice to Nip Gervais set the stage for a tremendous home run by Doug Culley (his first of the year) far out over the left fielder's head.

Bronte then called on a relief pitcher, Ougley, but he failed to stop the Sox as Hannant singled, stole second and Primo Rigo singled him home for the final run of the game.

## Refuse Acton School Request For Three Levy Payments Yearly

A suggestion from the Acton District High School Board that Esqueping township pay the school levy in three yearly payments, was not well received at council's regular meeting Monday. The board suggested the payments be received in March, June and September, but councillors noted they would have to borrow the money, as taxes were not due that soon.

Councillor Wilfrid Bird suggested taxes could be collected twice yearly, but the clerk noted this would mean additional bookkeeping.

**Pollute Creek**  
Correspondence from the Ontario Water Resources Commission explained that a township sand and gravel pit was discharging excessive solids into the creek, and asked that dikes be repaired to prevent over-pollution.

Ratepayers Joe Wright and M. McHarg complained to council that their fences on the Fifth Line south of Limehouse were broken when the road was repaired recently. Council agreed to have a new fence erected.

Another complaint was received from Bill Cook, Tenth Line, who said dirty red water was flowing into his clean pond, and claimed the dirty water was caused by new ditches. The council and Department of Highways engineer are to check the matter.

**Pay for Food**  
Two representatives of the Georgetown Hunters' and Anglers' Association persuaded council into paying half a \$54 feed bill for 450 pheasants, which are pen-

ned in the township and will be freed later.

More information was asked on a county proposal that a \$24,000 deficit in the new Milton District High School financing be added to the township's county levy next year.

Permission was given the Credit Valley Conservation Authority to erect five directional signs to the Terra Cotta Conservation Area.
